

Millionaire Banker Makes Valet His **Boon Companion; Leads Strange Life**

Boston, Nov. 23—Strange indeed was the private life of the late Charles A. Vialle, a director of the National Shawmut Bank who recently died leav-ing a fortune of over \$2.000,000. The carefully worded will with over a half million in public bequests did not disclose the story of the strange companionship that this millionaire enjoyed for 20 years with his colored valet and chauffeur.

Ben Davis, the colored man who assists depositors from their motors as they alight at the National Shawmut Bank was really the man closest to the banker in the past score of years of his life yet a list of the bequests does not disclose his name. Mr. Vialle had his own way of doing things for Davis receives an annuity of several thousand dollars while he lives. While Davis was hired as a valet yet he was nothing short of a com-panion for the old man who for 45 years made his home in the Hotel Brunswick. A bedroom and "paslor" was enough for this frugal million-aire boss. Everywhere Mr. Vialle went his valet accompanied except to his club and an occasional visit to a few intimate friends. Busings was Mr. Vialle's chief pleasure in life. His private life was very rigid. He retired early and was up with the sun. The colored man spent most every evening with him for 20 years. Another favorite with the millionaire was A. Augustus Carroll, a col-ored waiter who served him for 40 years at the Brunswick. The million-aire became attached to Carroll when he first came to work at the Brunswick, and he never had any other mas wait upon him. He occupied the same table at breakfast, lunch and dinner in all that time. Only occasionally he would come up town from business, but Carroll was always on the job waiting for him.
