STILL SOME MORE MONTEAL PAPERS

Evening News Refused Franchise By Canadian Press

PROMOTERS PROMISE FIGHT

A. M. Dewar, M. E. Nichols and B. A. McNab Interested—Two Other Evening Papers, Both Financial, and a New Weekly

(Canadian Press) Montreal, March 18—The Canadian Press Ltd., yesterday meeting in Toronto, refused a franchise to a new evening paper in Montreal, to be called the Evening News. The application was made by A. M. Dewar, news editor of the Mail, supported by M. E. Nichols, who stated that he and B. A. McNab, publisher of the Mail, were behind the new proposition. It was not their intention, however, to run the paper as an evening edition of the Mail but to organize a separate company and print it on the Mail plant.

On the application being refused by the Press Ltd., the promoters decided to go ahead with the publication notwithstanding. He threatened to appeal both to the shareholders of the Canadian Press and to the Canadian courts in protest against what he described as a monopoly.

Whether the Evening News is published or not, Montreal is soon to have both other evening papers. It was announced a few days ago that the Journal of Commerce, a weekly financial publication, was to become a financial daily with Hon. W. S. Fielding as editor. Now it is reported that the Financial Times, another weekly, said to be backed by D. Lorne MacGibbon, will enter the daily field as soon as a new plant, which is being erected, arrives.

Another new publication is to be the Daily News, published by Edward Beck, former editor of the Herald, and printed on the press of La Patrie. This will make its appearance this week, and it is reported will make use of hitherto unpublished charges of civic graft uncovered by Burns detectives.

CONCRETE WORK ON MARBLE COVE SEWER STARTED TOMORROW

Concrete work on the new Marble Cove sewer will be started tomorrow at the foot of Kennedy street, the contractor having now been brought to the place. This sewer, which will be one of the most extensive operations of its kind ever carried out in St. John will be the main artery for draining the north end and will have as tributaries several smaller sewers, each of which has now a separate outlet in the cove. The sewer will be 1800 feet in length and will be 40 inches in diameter and will be concrete, lined in the lower part with brick. Trench digging for the sewer has been carried on rapidly for some weeks.

MORE EVIDENCE IN DISORDERLY HOUSE CASE

The case against Paul Picard, charged with keeping a disorderly house in Erin street was continued in the police court this morning and he and the three people in the house were further remanded. Detective Lucas and Sergeant Scott corroborated Deputy Chief Jenkins.

Mr. Murphy said she went to the house to see Gertrude Elbert, but that she had known the police were going to raid the place, she would not have gone. She asked to be given her liberty, as she wanted to go with her mother and help to look after her boarder. Mrs. Elbert told the court that she had only known the police were coming, she would have washed up a bit. As it was, she said she did not wash up when they came, and she asked permission to be allowed to take her clothes off before she went up to her room.

Deputy Chief Jenkins said that he had previously warned the owner of the house that the place was a dive for both whites and blacks, but he had taken no notice of it.

The magistrate said that the owner of the house was liable if his tenants were using the place for immoral purposes. The deputy also said that there were four other houses in that locality in almost the same condition, and that each had only two rooms.

Grand Master Makes Home Rule Reference

Annual Meeting of Grand Orange Lodge of New Brunswick at Andover — Mr. Wallace's Address

Andover, N. B., March 18—With a large attendance, the 71st annual meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge was opened in the Masonic Hall here last night with Grand Master Wallace presiding. The past grand masters and county masters were appointed to draft the standing committees.

Mr. Wallace, of St. John, grand master, after welcoming all, said: "Founded on the principles of the Christian religion, we firmly advocate Protestantism, loyalty to our king and country and the upholding of that which proclaims British liberty to all nations. Maintaining and respecting the laws of our dominion, and opposing special privileges, tyranny and factions, we teach our members to practice charity to all mankind, cherish those faithful to our precepts and denounce impostors. Our association has done much in advocating and advancing our principles, keeping them prominently before the eyes of the busy world, lest they forget, lest they forsake."

Mr. Wallace referred sympathetically to the death of Philip E. Heine, a past provincial grand master, and mentioning the fact that St. Patrick's Day was inadvertently selected for the meeting, made some references to the early history of Ireland and to the good work of St. Patrick—an apostle whom all should revere—and then declared:

Home Rule "Today home rule, like a darkening cloud, hangs over her destinies, and she is disturbed. Civil war threatens like the roll of distant thunder, and fear, suspicion and distrust lurk within her borders. The Grand Orange Lodge of Ireland have resolved that they will not have home rule, because the ultimate result will be to deprive them of their rights as subjects of our beloved king and citizens of the British Empire. The lionist leagues have been formed and many established in Canada to assist the Irish patriots, but so much has been said, and so many resolutions passed in our lodges in opposition to home rule, that it is unnecessary for me to refer to this subject. Lately there seemed to be a rift of light in the cloud, and the form will pass over, and some of our political parties, and their subsequent utterances, appeared to indicate that our fraternal organization has been rejected by the lionists, and the sky is again dark and lowering. We all trust and hope that the form will pass over, and some agreement be made that will preserve to Ireland's loyal citizens their cherished rights and liberties."

Referring to propagation work, the grand master said: "I called a meeting of the executive, and we decided the pressure between us, allotting the counties of Charlottetown, Victoria, Carleton and York to the Senior."

Water Almost Up TO DECKS IN LOST CITY OF SYDNEY

Constant Pounding Shatters Bottom of Steamer on Rocks Near Halifax

Halifax, N. S., March 18—The bow of the steamer City of Sydney, which was abandoned yesterday, after running on the Sambro Rocks, fifteen miles east of Halifax, was still clinging to the jagged edge of the rocks today. The constant pounding had shattered the bottom of the steamer and in the after part the water was almost up to the decks. There was no hope of saving the vessel.

Captain Macdonald said that the City of Sydney was enveloped in fog during the whole of her run up the coast from New York, while he was trying to pick up the lightship Halifax, southeast of Sambro Island, the steamer struck the rocks. She was several miles out of her course.

At midnight yesterday afternoon the balance of the crew of the steamer was taken off in the tug Togo and the vessel was abandoned.

KAISER'S DAUGHTER IS HAPPY MOTHER

Son Comes to Home of Duke and Duchess of Brunswick

Berlin, March 18—A son was born this morning to the Duke and Duchess of Brunswick.

The Duchess of Brunswick was formerly Princess Victoria Louise of Hohenzollern, only daughter of the German Emperor. The marriage of the princess to Prince Ernest August of Cumberland took place on May 24, 1913. The prince assumed the throne of the Duchy of Brunswick last November.

Ernst August, Emperor William today ordered a general school holiday in Berlin in celebration of the birth of his new grandson.

NEW WORKMAN'S COMPENSATION BILL

Provisions of Measure Introduced in Legislature by the Provincial Treasurer

Toronto, March 18—The workman's compensation bill was introduced in the Ontario legislature yesterday by Hon. J. E. Lucas, provincial treasurer. The following are the chief provisions: Compensation for total disability, call for weekly payment equal to 85 per cent of average wage for previous twelve months.

Not contributions by employers to funds directly or indirectly. Heavy penalty to employers in case premiums are deducted from wages. "Waiting period" set at seven days. Compensation only allowed if worker is off, due to accident more than seven days.

Burial expenses a straight gift of \$75. Allowance of \$30 a month where a widow or invalid husband is sole dependent; \$5 additional for each child up to sixteen years.

Farmers are the only employers exempted from operation, according to the bill.

Clerical staffs of all manufacturing concerns included under same liability and rates as other employees.

Board of management to consist of three members, appointed for ten years each. Decisions will not be subject to appeal or review in any court, nor can it be annulled in any way by injunction or otherwise.

Employers will be grouped for payments to accident fund. Board will maintain accident fund, with adequate reserves to prevent "heavy burdens" in future.

Employers will have to notify the board within three days of any accident.

HURT ON BOARD SHIP David Swinton, a stowaway on the C. P. R. liner Montfort, was struck on the head by a chain on one of the lifts and received a nasty wound on the scalp. He was taken to the Emergency Hospital, where Dr. F. L. Kenney put three stitches in the cut and Mr. Swinton was taken to his home in Winslow street, West End.

JUST MR. TOM An unusual oversight on the part of a correspondent caused the lady secretary of the board of trade to be more familiar in her answer than he was. The brother-in-law of a Canadian living in the states wrote the board of trade here requesting information as to conditions in this city and enclosing a letter from his friend in exile. The enclosure was signed "Tom" the surname being omitted, so a letter went out of the board of trade office yesterday addressed, "Mr. Tom"—faute de mieux. Needless to say due apologies were made in the letter for this obligatory friendliness.

SURPRISE PARTY At the home of Mrs. Charles Colwell, 18 Chapel street, last evening, a pleasant time was spent when several friends tendered a surprise party to Mrs. R. G. Kincaid of Providence, who has been visiting here. It was Mrs. Kincaid's birthday and in honor of the event she was made the recipient of a handsome gold bracelet with her monogram engraved, and a beautiful bouquet of flowers. The presentation was made in behalf of the gathering by George Gray. Refreshments were served, and all had a nice time with music, cards, and dancing.

Benton Stabbed and His Body Mistreated

Facts About Killing of Englishman in Villa's Office Are Learned by Washington—Quarrel Over Deal With 'Rebel Leader

(Canadian Press) Washington, D. C., March 18—The facts of the killing of W. S. Benton, the British rancher, became known here today. Benton went to Juarez to get Villa's permission to bring some of his cattle out of Chihuahua, for sale in Texas. What had not been known heretofore is the fact that Benton sought to make a deal with the rebel chieftain to let him get his cattle out, offering return for his permission, to see that Villa got a certain amount of arms and ammunition.

This proposal was favorably received by Villa. Discussing the terms of the arrangement, however, led to a quarrel. This quarrel ended in Benton being killed, not by a revolver as previously reported, but by a knife. The Britisher was attacked with knives by those in Villa's office during the discussion. He was stabbed in many places and after he was dead his body was mutilated in the unspeakable manner of such frequent occurrences in Mexico.

Whether Villa personally aided in the stabbings of Benton is not definitely known. The body of Benton was buried in Juarez and is still there, according to this official information. The investigations of the last few weeks, have not only established these facts, but have also resulted in the precise place of burial being made known.

El Paso, Texas, March 18—Mexican refugees in the Huerta political following last night said that General Villa was decisively defeated at Escalon. They say that that information came confidentially from Torreon via Laredo, and assert that General Aguirre Benavides, commander of the Zaragoza brigade, was killed in action.

A Constitutional officer who arrived in Juarez from Chihuahua last night evaded questions as to the reported battle, but asserted that General Villa was in Chihuahua on Monday night. This is not inconsistent with the report that he went south on Sunday night, however, as he can move very rapidly up and down the railroad line.

SCANDALOUS PRECEDINGS IN COPY ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

Ferguson Saved By Force of Government Majority and Legislation Is Overridden

Toronto, March 18—Headlock reigned in the Ontario legislature yesterday evening until 4:45 this morning, in the legislature and the opposition minority battled for hours. They were saved by the government majority and legislation is overridden.

The Ontario legislature was held in session until 4:45 this morning, when the government majority saved the government from defeat by introducing a bill which is almost unprecedented in the history of the legislature. The bill was passed by the legislature in a vote of 45 to 35.

The bill, which is a measure to amend the act respecting the Ontario Land Office, was introduced by Mr. Ferguson, M. P. for Greenville.

A. A. WILSON IS SHERIFF

Well Known St. John Lawyer Gets The Appointment

Amos A. Wilson, K. C., has been appointed to the office of high sheriff of St. John and is receiving congratulations today. Mr. Wilson has for years enjoyed the esteem of his fellow citizens and has been recognized as a lawyer of prominence and distinction. He has been particularly well known through the province as well as in St. John for his activity in the cause of temperance. He is a prominent church worker and has been especially active in the interests of the Leinster street Baptist church.

Mr. Wilson was admitted as a barrister in 1910, and as a solicitor on April 29, 1914, and as a notary public on April 21, 1914. His commission is expected to arrive at any time.

Mr. Wilson was born in Cambridge, Ontario, and came to St. John when quite young. After receiving his education in the public schools he entered the law office of Dr. Silas Alward, K. C. He was admitted as attorney in 1910 and as a barrister in '11. He has practiced in St. John all his life. His first business association was with the firm of Hanington, Millidge and Wilson, a partnership which continued for about ten years, and when it was dissolved he practiced alone.

Mr. Wilson was created a Queen's Counsel in 1910. He was married in 1901 to Miss Maria I. Potts, who died about five years ago.

ON QUI VIVE FEAR OF TROUBLE

Tense Situation in Paris Over Shooting

WOMAN CLOSELY WATCHED

Some Idea That She May Attempt Suicide—Another Reason Given For Act That Has Caused Tremendous Sensation

(Canadian Press) Paris, March 18—The appearance of armed detachments of republican guards posted at strategic points of Paris today, added to the tense excitement aroused among the various political factions by the assassination of Gaston Calmette, editor of the Figaro by Mme. Caillaux, wife of a prominent French statesman.

Everywhere in those quarters where there was likelihood of trouble, the police were supported by military in readiness to be called on to suppress disorders.

The offices of the Figaro, the chambers of deputies, the residence of M. Caillaux and St. Lazare prison, where his wife has occupied a cell since she killed the editor to clear her husband's name, all were magnets which attracted the populace today. In the vicinity strong bodies of police were on duty prepared to act sharply in quelling disturbances.

Paris, March 18—M. Labori, who will defend Mme. Caillaux, had an hour's interview with her in prison. He described her as tired, but otherwise well. Mme. Caillaux has decided to use every effort in her own defence. She thanked M. Labori for having undertaken her defence, and told him how deeply she felt the death of M. Caillaux, which was a cruel blow to her. Her one idea had been, she said, to defend her husband who had been daily pilloried by the editor of the Figaro. Leaving home with the intention of wounding Calmette, she had lost her head completely under the influence of indignation. Now she deeply regretted her act.

Guarded Day and Night The strictest precautions have been taken to prevent Mme. Caillaux from committing suicide. She is guarded day and night by two gendarmes, who not for a moment let her out of their sight.

These guardians compelled Mme. Caillaux, when she visited her wife yesterday, to show that he had nothing in his possession that could be used for suicidal purposes, such as the former's inkstand.

As a special privilege Mme. Caillaux is allowed to have her meals sent in from a restaurant, but she has tasted little food.

The funeral of M. Calmette will be held on Friday and it is likely that the Royalists will attempt to make it the occasion of a big demonstration similar to that which occurred at the funeral of Victor Noir, a noted French journalist who was shot by Prince Pierre Bonaparte in 1870. Arthur Meyer, a Royalist leader in an article published in the evening of that date draws a parallel between the Calmette tragedy and the shooting of Noir.

It is now said that Mme. Caillaux's act in killing Calmette was dictated by other motives than desire to shield her husband's political reputation. Besides being one of the ablest financiers of Europe, Caillaux had a reputation for irresistible gallantry.

A woman of great beauty is said to have stood between Mme. Caillaux and the Calmette's sword. This is said to account for the relentless attacks which the Figaro made against the finance minister. Calmette's sword was pointed, it is said, to stop at nothing in the campaign against his rival. This given as a fact, it is not surprising that the Calmette tragedy since Charlotte Corday killed Marat.

LINEMAN'S CLOSE CALL

Receives Shock While Working at High Wire

A lineman for the Western Union Telegraph Company had a very narrow escape from death this morning when he was putting in new wires in Union street at the head of Chipman hill. The accident occurred about eleven o'clock when B. McDonald came in contact with a wire which was not properly insulated and which was estimated to have a current of 2,500 volts.

The men working in the street below saw him double up and he fell to a set of wires a few feet below, and he was brought to the ground by his fellow-workmen. He was revived a short time afterwards and was taken to his home. In a short time, however, he was as well as ever and was able to resume work this afternoon.

ROYAL EDWARD HERE TOMORROW; SHE HAS NEARLY 1,000 PASSENGERS

With 938 passengers, the largest number brought by any ship to St. John this season, the Royal Mail Liner Royal Edward, is due in St. John tomorrow morning at 6 o'clock. At 5 o'clock this morning she was aboard Sable Island.

The Edward has thirty-five saloons, 193 second cabin and 723 third class passengers and 1,586 bags and 818 packages of mail matter, as well as a full cargo of general freight.

**MAY GO BACK HOME WITH WIFE HE LEFT TO ELOPE WITH OTHER**

Niagara Falls, Ont., March 15.—Through the good offices of his ill-fated wife, Rev. J. T. W. Williams, eloping Congregational preacher from Newcastle, Pennsylvania, may return to that place, and a white elephant is taken off the hands of the Canadian immigration department.

Williams was arrested in Toronto on February 19 in company with the wife of George Thomas, a Newcastle grocer, on a charge of entering Canada under false pretences. He was brought here and convicted, and the intention was to deport him to the United States. The immigration authorities of Niagara Falls, New York, however, refused to accept him on the ground that he was not a citizen of the United States and was subject to exclusion from that country.

It was learned that he was a native of Wales, and a resident of the United States of less than two years. It seemed evident that the Canadian Government would have to convey him back to the land of his birth, if he were to be got rid of at all, and arrangements to do so at the public expense were pending when word came that he might be escorted across the bridge to American soil.

Mrs. Williams, it appears, made an appeal at Washington for the restoration of her spouse, and a special ruling has been made in favour of the order of the immigration authorities at Niagara.

**PENSIONS IN AUSTRALIA**

Mr. Knibbs, commonwealth statistician, dealing with the old age pensions in Australia, says that in its invalid and old age pensions scheme Australia makes more liberal pension provisions than any other country in the world. Approximately 1-4 per cent. of the population of Australia has the age qualifications requisite for an ordinary old-age pension. Of those having the requisite age qualification, 88 per cent. are in receipt of old age pensions. The number of old age pensioners in Australia represents 1-8-4 per cent. of the total population.

**Mock Cherry Pie**  
Cut open 1 cup of cranberries and pour cold water over them to remove seeds, then drain. Take 1-2 cup chopped raisins, 1 cup sugar, 1-2 cup boiling water, 1 tablespoon cornstarch dissolved in cold water, 1 tablespoon vanilla. Boil all together a few minutes until berries are done. This makes one pie in deep plate with two crusts.

**Fruit Marble Cake**  
Cream two-thirds of a cup of butter; add gradually two cups of sugar and the beaten yolks of three eggs, then alternately one cup of milk and three cups of flour, sifted with one teaspoon of soda and two teaspoons cream of tartar and one salt spoon of salt. Flavor with lemon, fold in the stiffly beaten whites and put half of the mixture in a long narrow pan. To the remainder add one tablespoon of molasses, one teaspoon of cinnamon, half teaspoon each cloves and allspice, one cup of chopped raisins mixed with one tablespoon of flour. Spread over the white part and bake in a moderately hot oven. This will make two large loaves.

### PRESBYTERY ENDS MEETING

The business of the St. John Presbytery was ended yesterday afternoon. In the afternoon the assembly committee and elders were elected as follows:

Assembly committee—Rev. J. J. McCaskill, Rev. T. A. Mitchell and Rev. James Ross; substitutes, Rev. J. H. MacVicar, D. D. Rev. Mr. Calhoun, Rev. Mr. Harrison. Elders—His Honor Judge Forbes, Dr. Murray MacLaren, C. S. Everett, J. A. Murray, Charles Baird and J. R. Brown; substitutes, S. H. Jack, H. P. Baird, J. M. Hay and A. MacKinnon.

The report of the home missions was read by George Knight. It showed a very busy year. Sixty visits had been paid to the hospital and services had been conducted in a boarding house at Court-street. A moving picture machine had been installed in the mission hall at Courtyard Bay. A means of instruction and education had been provided and twenty-five Bulgarians had been taught English.

Rev. J. A. MacKinnon recommended that some Sunday be set apart for the observance of 100 years of peace between Great Britain and the United States.

The report of Sunday schools showed a decrease in the regular attendance and it was recommended that strenuous efforts be made to bring the Sunday schools up to a proper standard of excellence.

Rev. J. A. MacKinnon read the report of the finance committee, which was very encouraging. St. John's church, Moncton, was authorized to sell the manse property and apply the proceeds and \$10,000 to be raised by mortgage to the rebuilding of the church, which was recently destroyed by fire.

The budget of the allocation committee showed allocations for the year amounting to \$18,800, an increase of thirty-seven per cent in a year. A request from Grand Falls for a loan of \$2,700 from the manse building fund was granted.

The superannuation committee was instructed to deal liberally with Rev. J. S. Mullin of Stanley, who recently met with an accident.

It was agreed that the presbytery negotiate with the Methodist body in regard to mission work at Courtyard Bay.

CHILD WELFARE.

The report of the Superintendent of Neglected and Dependent Children in the province of Nova Scotia is an extremely interesting book. There are Children's Aid Societies in Springhill, Windsor, Wolfville, Yarmouth, Amherst and New Glasgow, all but that at Amherst having jurisdiction over the county as well as the town. The Nova Scotia S. P. C. A. has also been approved as a Children's Aid Society.

Mr. W. S. Calvert, who is interested in the syndicate which will develop the oil shales in Albert county, expresses the view that this work will be of very great importance to the city of St. John. The project is a long time taking shape, but if the deposits are as valuable as Mr. Calvert and many others have declared them to be, the development on a large scale must come in due time.

Dr. Anglin expresses the view that indiscriminate charity is at the root of much of the 'unfitness of the human race. It is perhaps not so much charity as indifference and selfishness, and yet selfish interest rightly understood would prompt society to segregate and care for the feeble-minded and degenerate, who under present conditions reproduce their kind and lower the general standard of the race.

The British navy was never in such shape for war as at the present time. We have that on the authority of Mr. Winston Churchill. In view of this fact and the steady growth of friendly relations between Britain and Germany, the wisdom of the Canadian senate in refusing to endorse a vote of thirty-five million dollars for the benefit of British shipbuilders and armament makers is made so clear that none may question it.

While Superintendent Carter was unable to assure the friends of the kindergarten that it would immediately be made a part of the public school system, he at least expressed his sympathy with their aims, and made it clear that the chief difficulty in the way is financial. The Free Kindergarten Association may therefore be assured that the accomplishment of that which they desire is merely postponed until such time as the conditions are favorable.

The only persons who might possibly object to the appointment of Mr. A. A. Wilson as sheriff of St. John would be children or persons for the position. Mr. Wilson is thoroughly qualified to perform the duties of the office, and enjoys the respect and good-will of his fellow citizens. He has claims on his party which have now been recognized. Mr. Wilson had for some time been regarded as in line for a judicial position, but there will be no lack of candidates for judgeships when vacancies occur. He is placed out under indenture, but that a number of these from one cause or another will probably have to be removed.

Mr. J. L. Stewart told the house of assembly yesterday that the people of Northumberland were not satisfied with the way in which the work on the bridges was being conducted and the Highway Act administered. Mr. Swim of Northumberland joined with Mr. Stewart in condemning the manner in which the government had treated Northumberland country. It is refreshing to observe that there are at least two members of the government, who are not afraid to speak their mind.

BRITISH MONEY FOR WESTERN MODEL FARM. Edmonton, Alta., March 18.—British capitalists, represented by Albin Hunt and Hal Carleton of London, have just acquired 14,000 acres of land adjoining the town of Kinleith, 73 miles east of Edmonton, where a model rural community and demonstration farm are to be established. The plan is to teach settlers from Great Britain how to grow live stock, grain, grasses and produce at a profit. The tract will be operated upon a co-operative basis, the projectors supplying the land, houses, machinery and seeds and facilities for marketing.

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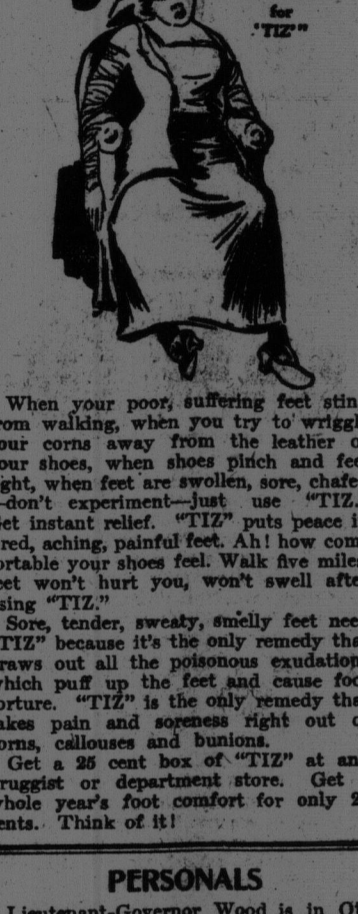

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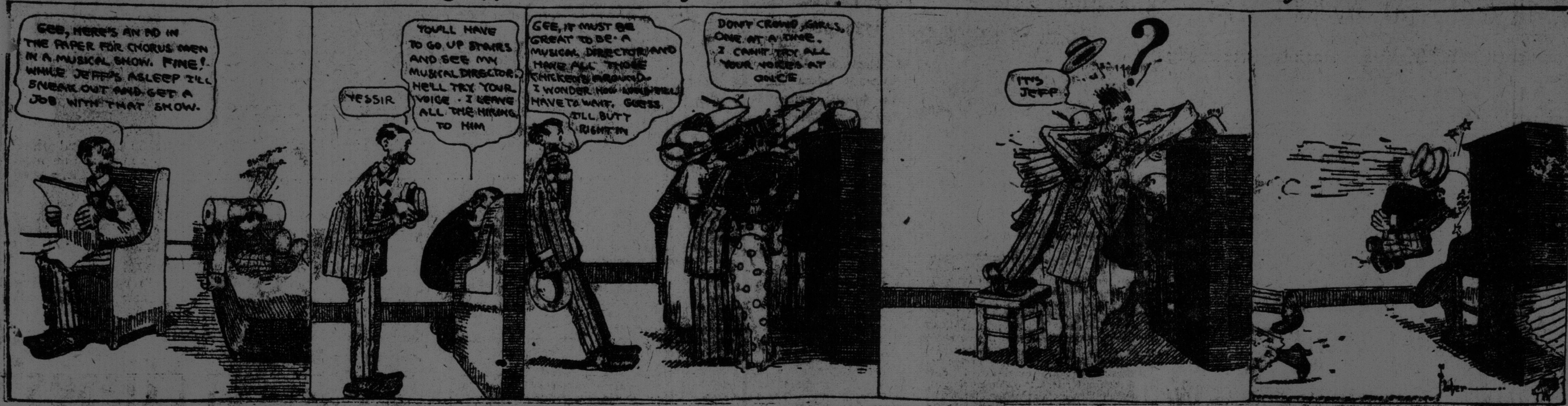

PRIZE DOGS BROUGHT OVER ON CASSANDRA

Advent of Five Puppies Into World at Sand Point Makes Number 25

Donaldson Line steamer Cassandra, Captain Brown, arrived in port early this morning from Glasgow direct and docked between strand seven and eight at No. 4 berth, Sand Point. The dogs have been shown all through the British Isles and have taken altogether about 1,000 prizes at Crystal Palace, Alexander Palace, Belfast, Edinburgh, Ayr, Glasgow, Manchester and the Crufts shows in London, and are valued at about \$5,000. After leaving his pets at his home in Calgary, Mr. Thomson will go to Moosejaw, where he will judge all classes in a dog show on March 28.

The Lake Manitoba, of the C. P. R., sailed this morning at 9 o'clock for Liverpool direct with twenty-three second and fifty third class passengers, and a good cargo of general freight. Steamer Manchester Exchange sailed this morning at 4 o'clock for Manchester via Philadelphia with complete cargo, including about fifty standards of lumber for Manchester. The Furness Line steamer Kanawha, Captain Kellman, arrived in port and docked at the Pettigill wharf this morning. She is from London via Halifax and brought about 1,500 tons of general freight. The Montfort, of the C. P. R., steamed this morning at 6 o'clock for London and Havre with a part cargo of general freight and provisions. The Montfort will complete loading cargo at Halifax. R. M. S. Victoria, of the Allan Line, is due to sail this afternoon at 8 o'clock for Liverpool direct with twenty first class, seventy-five second class and about 200 third class passengers, besides mails and a full cargo of general freight and provisions.

CLAIM FOR \$12,000 ON PROMISSORY NOTE

In the case of Thomas Noble vs the Quebec and St. John Construction Company and the St. John and Quebec Railway Company, a summons was issued this morning by Chief Justice Lantry, calling upon the defendants to show cause why their appearance should not be set aside, and judgment entered for the plaintiff. The claim is for \$12,000 due on a promissory note of which the plaintiff is a bona fide holder for value in due course. The summons is returnable on Wednesday next. H. O. McInerney is the plaintiff's solicitor, and F. A. Guthrie is a solicitor for the defendants.

MORE I. C. R. COMPLAINTS

There has been no let-up to the number of complaints with regard to the I. C. R. freight service since the institution of the newest form of expense in railway circles under the Gutelius management—the running of an engine light for sixty-six miles to bring a string of freight-cars twenty-two miles to St. John.

Consignments which have been intended to reach the city for a certain selling of the American boats have missed connections, and in some cases it is said the freight has been delayed in transmission for a week or more. The same is true with regard to local freights. Some dealers here are ordering Upper Canadian houses to ship through C. P. R. because of the lengthy hold-up at Hampton. There are no inspectors at Hampton, and it is feared that some of the freight may suffer. A car of horses, it is said, was recently left at Hampton for about a whole day, although it is said that the Munton office were apprised of them being there.

A meeting of trustees on the I. C. R. is to be held this week to protest against the standard rates, as the men on the I. C. R. are becoming discouraged because of what they declare the impossibility of promotion owing to favoritism for C. P. R. men.

RECEIVED EVERY CARE

A correspondent of the Times, says he has read complaints made by patients who had been in the hospital about the treatment they receive from the nurses and the doctor. He says such statements could not be well founded, as he was a patient in a room where there were three others, and the care they received was a credit to the institution.

ENTIRELY CLEARED.

The young lad who faced a serious charge in the police court yesterday was entirely cleared of suspicion as definite proof was shown that he had been at his work when the assault was alleged to have taken place. He was completely exonerated by the magistrate.

BIRTHDAY SURPRISE

Mrs. William Ferris, 16 Autumn street, was agreeably surprised on Monday evening, when friends gathered at her home to help celebrate her 78th birthday. Refreshments were served and a most enjoyable evening spent by all. Mrs. Ferris received many useful gifts.

DID NOT LECTURE

Owing to a misunderstanding at Bathurst with regard to the engaging of an assembly hall for the lecture to have been given by H. O. McInerney, of this city, he did not go there yesterday. It was found that the only available building for the purpose had been previously engaged and, though with much regret, the lecture was cancelled.

FROM TROUBLED MEXICO

Letter Received Here From Wife of Capt. W. F. Young

Every Man in Tampico Carries Revolver—In Railway Journey Bodies of Many Mexicans Seen Hanging From Trees

Mrs. R. D. Christie of this city has just received a letter from Mrs. Young, wife of Captain W. F. Young, formerly with the Donaldson Line and last year captain of the Canadian government vessel Alletta, which took a cargo of lumber from Halifax to Port Nelson. Mrs. Young being the second wife woman to visit the scene in the far north. Captain and Mrs. Young are well known in St. John. The captain is now in command of a steamer running between Port Arthur, Texas, and Tampico, Mexico, and Mrs. Young accompanies him. In a letter from Tampico dated March 11, Mrs. Young says of the intense heat experienced in that climate even at this season. The crew on board the captain's vessel are composed of Norwegians, Swedes and Americans, only the steward, the captain and his wife being British. No smoking is allowed on board these vessels, on account of the gasoline and Mexican oil in their cargoes. Mrs. Young says that on the first day from Tampico the mate went down forward for something and was almost suffocated by gas. On their previous visit to Tampico the town was invaded by rebels, and foreigners had to seek refuge in boats on the river. Mrs. Young writes: "Tampico is the most foreign-looking place I have ever visited. The men are going around with revolvers sticking out of their hip pockets and cartridge belts around their waists. The place I noticed most in the town was the prison, where a soldier walks up and down with fixed bayonet guarding what looked to me like cages, and the prisoners stand looking through the bars. When we were last in the place the rebels had cut off the water supply. Two American battleships and one Mexican are stationed in the harbor." In another portion of the same letter, dated Port Arthur, March 9, Mrs. Young writes that she had arrived back at Port Arthur, Texas. Referring to their experiences before leaving Tampico she said that she ventured on a train, which had to stop frequently to repair the line, and at frequent intervals they would see the body of a Mexican hanging from a tree, riddled with bullets. One, it was said, had been hanging for three months. American and British subjects are not interfered with, but there is always the risk of being hit by stray shots. The people in Canada, Mrs. Young says, have no idea of what is taking place in that part of Mexico. It is a lovely country, rich in soil and minerals. Three crops can be raised each year and roses bloom all the year round. Accompanying the letter is a clipping from the New Orleans States of January 21, containing a fine picture of Captain and Mrs. Young and their cat "Pickles," which was with them on their journey to Port Nelson, which is described in an interview with Mrs. Young. The Alletta was caught in an ice floe, where the boat was stuck so that she had to be beached and Captain and Mrs. Young with "Pickles" and the crew were landed on the ice. The ice was broken up and the Alletta was able to get away. Mrs. Young goes with her husband on all voyages, and the sentiment of the line "Forever and Ever and Aye" may fairly be applied to her:— If she loves him she'll follow him, follow him, Follow him, follow him on, Down the deep, rough track, to the mid-night black, And up through the gates of dawn Like a faithful star she will follow him, To the end of the earth and sky; Hither and yon she will follow him on Forever and ever and aye.
