

FRANCE'S RECORD STATESMAN Lloyd George's Gallic alter ego, M. Aristide Briand, with whose face and mannerisms the Locarno pact film has made millions familiar, is the real doy-on on French statesmen. Though not so venerable in years as M. Clemen-ceau, France's G. O. M. and "the Tiger" of the boulevard gossips, M. Briand has held ministerial office longer than any countryman of his own. The present is technically the sixth, actu-ally the eighth, time he has been presi-dent of the council, or Prime Minister of France, and he has held ministerial office of different sorts 15 times. His reign as prime minister totals now mearly 10½ years. In a country where cabinets are so "descate" as France, this is an amazing record, though one or two British Premiers have equalled it here. Two former French presi-dents of the council hejd the office five times—M. Charles Dupuy and M. Alex-andre Ribot—but neither ruled for two years, and both are dead.

The probable extent of the late Queen's bequests will be a life-inter-est in her beautiful seaside villa, Avi-dore, to her sister, the Dowager Em-press Maric, and beyond merely per-sonal souvenirs, her small fortune to her daughter and constant companion, the Princess Victoria. 
GORMAN TO NEWBURGH
