1. That the Rev. J. H. Robinson be President of this Conference.
2. That the Rev. John Histon be Clerk.
3. That the Rev. G. Brown be the Recording Clerk.
4. That the Rev. James Shaw be Conference Reporter.
5. That the Rev. F. G. Weaver be the Officer of Order.
6. That brethren Revs. J. Bell, H. Wilkinson and J. C. Watts, with W. Berry and Johnson Zimmerman, be a committee to receive and consider applications for the division or increase of circuits, and that they report thereon to Conference.
7. That Rev. J. C. Watts write the English address this year instead of the Rev. D. Savage, who is absent.
8. That the Revs. T. Goldsmith and H. Wilkinson, with brethren Berry and Graham, be a Committee to examine the probationers to be received into full Connexion.
9. That Bexley and Laxton be taken up as a new mission, to be called the Laxton Mission.

22. That after mature deliberation we do not see our way clear to make any change in the present mode of appropriating the mission grants, but would earnestly recommend the Conference to carry out this plan faithfully.

23. That with regard to the current payment of mission grants by the Superintendent of Missions, we are of opinion that the Stationing Committee should specify the more needy circuits to which the funds in hand shall be paid during the year, and that the rest of the circuits shall wait for the payment of the grants till the succeeding Conference.

24. That the Committee recommend that the travelling expenses and other incidental expenses connected with several of the stations be paid out of the Contingent Fund, and that a sum adequate for this purpose be reserved by the Stationing Committee, and appropriated to that Fund.

SECOND REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.—All the members being present, the subject of Connexional debts, and especially of encumbered chapel estates, being taken up for consideration, it was resolved,

25. That the Superintendent of missions be instructed to set apart for the payment of chapel fund debts the \$600 granted by the English missionary committee for chapel fund purposes.

26. That he shall pay the shares in the Building Society, and the interest on the debt accruing, and that he shall then pay the interest of other loans and hand over the balance of the grant from England to the Treasurer for mission purposes.

27. That the sum raised by the Chapel Fund in Canada be appropriated in the ordinary way.

After a discussion about the *Evangelical Witness*, it was resolved—

38. That we beg most respectfully and cordially to express our high appreciation of the *Evangelical Witness*, and to present our warmest thanks to the Rev. J. H. Robinson for his able management of that paper, and that he be re-appointed to the editorship of the *Evangelical Witness*.

39. ADDRESS

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE CANADIAN WESLEYAN METHODIST NEW
CONNEXION CHURCH.

VERY DEAR BRETHREN:—

We give thanks to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ for the exceeding riches of his grace in bringing us together again in our annual assembly for mutual consultation upon the interests of the church whose ministers and representatives we are. Amidst the toils and perils of another year we have been graciously preserved, and meet at its close with our ranks unbroken by disease or death. For these tokens of favor we offer our grateful acknowledgements to him in whose eyes the life of his people is precious, and who grants to his devoted servants a kind of immortality until their appointed work is done, and a preparedness to enter upon the promised rest is secured. With the benefit of prolonged life has also been conferred that measure of grace which has kept us from being overborne by the evils by which we, in common with all our brethren in the world, are beset; and though much of deep humiliation is associated with our retrospections of the past, yet we devoutly thank the God of all grace, who has aided us in our conflicts, and enabled us to stand in the salvation of his Son. With these mingled emotions we address to you, agreeably to our usage, a few words of exhortation and encouragement, in the hope that we may be the helpers of your faith and joy, so that when called to render up our trust we may rejoice with you "as heirs together of the grace of life, that we have not run in vain, neither labored in vain."

hope of a blessed immortality. Church membership merely, without the grace that joins you to Christ the living Head, and makes you living members of his body, will avail nothing but to augment the wretchedness of that soul who shall in the hour of final decision be weighed in the balance and be found wanting. God is able, dear brethren, "to make this grace to abound toward you in all riches to the full assurance of faith," to prepare you, in your various spheres, to work the works of Him who has called you into his Kingdom, and sent you forth as laborers into his vineyard.

Permit us to remind you, dear brethren, that whilst you should seek "first the Kingdom of God and his righteousness," in all the relations of domestic and social life you are not to overlook the important relations you hold to the state. Your Christian citizenship does not render you any less citizens of the country in which you live, and your subjection to Christ does in no way weaken the bond of your allegiance to the state. Whatever part, then, you may be required to act in the exercise of your civil rights, ever keep it in mind that you are the servants of Christ as well as members of the body politic, and that, as such, you are set as "the light of the world."

We would, dear brethren, most affectionately impress upon you the importance of faithfulness in your attendance on the social and public means of grace established among us, for much depends on your careful and scrupulous attention to this. Remembering then, how much your frequent absence from the services of the House of God will affect your brethren to their hurt, and hinder the Church in her efforts to extend the light and power of the Gospel, "forsake not," we beseech you, brethren, "the assembling of yourselves together."

It affords us very great pleasure to advertise you that our present Conference is the fullest, and, on the whole, the most gratifying we have ever held; and in view of this fact we are constrained to say, "Not unto us, not unto us, O Lord, but unto thy name give glory, for thy mercy and thy truth's sake." In all its deliberations and debates wisdom and love were happily blended, and though every subject presented for consideration was thoroughly discussed, yet throughout it was pleasingly manifest that diversity of sentiment did not induce alienation of affection.

The religious services held during the session were uniformly seasons of great spiritual interest and power; the Divine presence was singularly manifested in them, refreshing, quickening, and saving the brethren, and preparing the ministers and representatives to return to their several departments and enter with renewed energy and zeal on the arduous labors of the coming year.

It is matter of much satisfaction and thankfulness to God that we can announce to you that the success which He has accorded to the devoted labors of the brethren in the various de-

partments compares favorably with that of former years. Reference to our published statistics will show you that we record an increase of 18 Chapels, 7 Parsonages, 37 Classes, 33 Congregations, 5 Travelling Ministers, 11 Local Preachers and 439 Members. In the Sabbath School department also there has been a most gratifying advancement made during the year.

Our work continues to enlarge in almost all directions. Several circuits have been divided at this session of Conference, and three new missions have been entered on our list of stations, while other parts of our rapidly extending country are presenting us invitations to enter them, and supply the people with the Word of Life. To meet these growing demands, in answer to the prayers of the faithful, God is raising up within our borders, from among the youth of the families of our own people, men who offer themselves willingly for the work of the ministry, and six in addition to our former number have been admitted into our itineracy this year. And here, dear brethren, we would draw your attention to the action of our last Conference on the subject of an Educational Institute for the more effectual training of the young men whom our Churches have tried and recommended to be taken into our Ministry. It is scarcely possible to over estimate the value of such an institution to our Ministry and Connexion; such benefit, however, as it would be the happy means of supplying cannot be realized, unless you, dear brethren, give it your vigorous support. If it be said, "We can do very well without it," we urge in reply that the rapid advance of our fine country not only in material wealth and commercial activity, but also in educational facilities placing the means of a sound and even of a polite education within reach of all who desire to secure such advantage to their youth; the pleasing fact that our people are every year more extensively availing themselves of their rich privilege in this respect, thus increasing the intelligence of our congregations,—these, we think, demand a commensurate advance in the educational standard of candidates for our Ministry. Four young men have been under the tuition of the excellent tutor, Rev. W. McClure, during the past year, and one of them will receive an appointment to a circuit at this Conference.

Our Connexional Funds were never in a more sound and hopeful condition than at present, the Mission Fund showing an increase of \$653 over the returns of the previous year.

And now, dear brethren, in conclusion, we "commend you to God, and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you an inheritance among them which are sanctified."

ADDRESS

OF THE CANADIAN CONFERENCE TO THE ENGLISH CONFERENCE.

BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN IN THE LORD:—

With unabated affection we once more address you from our Annual Conference, and greet you fraternally in the name of our common Lord.

The toils of the year are past, and we rejoice together in the loving-kindness of our God; "Our labor has not been in vain in the Lord." The word proclaimed by us in much weakness has been accompanied with holy unction and Divine power, and throughout our whole Connexion we have been favored with showers of blessing, and now we come together "with rejoicing, bringing our sheaves with us." 439 have been added to our ranks during the past year. "Now thanks be unto God which always causeth us to triumph in Christ and maketh manifest the savor of his knowledge by us in every place."

One brother has reached us from you who has entered upon his ministerial labors amongst us very acceptably, and of whom we cherish the highest hopes. In addition to these we have accepted 6 additional candidates for our Ministry. Our strength is increasing, our field enlarging, our numbers rapidly multiplying and our prospects brightening every year.

During the past few years we have suffered much through the financial embarrassments of the country. We have experienced great difficulty in the maintenance of our whole staff of laborers and the retention of all our circuits and missions, but through the self denial of the former and the enterprising liberality of the latter, and above all, through the blessing of Jehovah, we have not only kept our ground but have made most encouraging progress. We have struggled through our difficulties and now we may sing—

"Out of all the Lord
Hath brought us by his love;
And still he does his help afford,
And hides our life above."

Several new chapels have been erected during the year; our members are manifesting great interest in the comfort of their ministers by providing suitable parsonages; and all our funds are in advance of last year, while in our Mission Fund especially there have been displayed many noble instances of liberality.

We rejoice to hear of the great revivals with which God has been pleased to bless some of your circuits. Such news thrills our hearts with joy. Surely we ought to humble ourselves before God that we are not more humble, more earnest, more faithful, more enterprising, more fully consecrated to the work of salvation, that we might enjoy richer and more frequent and extensive revivals.

But as we gird on the armor afresh for renewed assaults on the strongholds of Satan, we do so, not in the desperation of the forlorn hope, but with the inspiring conviction animating every heart and rising from the myriad voices of our beloved Israel, "The Lord of Hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge."

The *Evangelical Witness* prospers and is of great service to us as a herald of our progress, an exponent of our principles and a repository of Connexional news and revival intelligence.

Our Theological Institute, located at Toronto, under the Presidency of the Rev. W. McClure, though in its infancy, gives promise of much usefulness in future. During the past year there have been four occasional students under tuition, while the experience and ability of the venerable Tutor warrant the hope that if he be so circumstanced that he can devote the whole of his time to this important educational enterprise, the Institute will become of invaluable service to our Church.

Our beloved brethren, the Rev. J. H. Robinson, General Superintendent, and the Rev. W. McClure, Assistant Superintendent, enjoy as ever the affectionate esteem of our ministers and members.

And now, dear fathers and brethren, having told you of our affairs and hopes, we again bid you farewell. We are laboring in a common cause. We are bound together in holiest sympathy. We are identified in church fellowship. We are heirs together of the grace of God, and our prayer is that the incoming ecclesiastical year may be the most prosperous and glorious that our Connexion, at home and abroad, has ever experienced. The times in which we live are intensely exciting and pregnant with the most marvellous events. "There is thunder on the horizon as well as dawn." This continent in its immensity is heaving under a mighty political earthquake. All Europe is agitated. Jehovah is shaking the nations. Statesmen seem bewildered. Men's hearts fail them for fear; but the heavens do rule; and when these storms have passed, we shall learn that "God stilleth the noise of the seas, the noise of their waves and the tumults of the people."

Ominous as are the signs of the times politically, they are full of hope and promise spiritually. Never then was there a time which so imperatively demanded and abundantly rewarded the consecration of the full energies of the Church of Christ, and blessed be God she is rising from the dust, putting on her beautiful garments and preparing for the day of her visitation." May we be strengthened to do our duty and eventually share in the everlasting triumphs of the Saviour.

May the peace of God abide with you evermore. Amen.
