WHAT DOES CARLETON WANT?

A great deal of foolish talk is being indulged in by some of the alleged leaders of public opinion in Carleton, and there are threats of legal proceedings to annul the act of union and other measures, with a view to doing the work just accomplished by the Legislature in making Portland and St. John one city.

The Gazette, which has stood up for the carrying out of terms voted upon by the people of St. John and Portland, and which has opposed the addition of a clause to the union bill, which would have made it imperative to build a bridge at Navy Island, has received as its reward the threat of a number of Carleton people, who seem to be of the same opinion as the other day that they wanted a bridge built, and he did not care how much it cost the people of the east side.

It is quite easy for Carleton to feel that way when they know that they will only have to pay about five per cent of the cost of such a structure as they desire, but we submit that this is not a good spirit in which to view the proposed clause of the bill.

The people of the west side are just as much interested as those of the east side in the economical administration of public affairs, and they will share in any prosperity which Saint John may win, unless they exercise positions against Carleton by their display of hostility to the interests of the people of the east side.

Of course if it comes to be understood that Carleton is desirous of dragging the city into unnecessary expense for the benefit of the west side alone, that will necessarily be a disposition on the part of the east side to consider as little as possible. The people of Carleton ought to understand that 4,000 people on the west side cannot take 40,000 people to the city at large. There must be mutual forbearance shown and claims of both sections of the city must be fairly considered, in connection with the ability of the city to pay for needed improvements.

We think that the people of Carleton would find they had made a very poor bargain, if they had succeeded in obtaining a free bridge at the cost of losing the ferry. The latter, although it would have its disadvantages, as all ferries have, is certainly more beneficial to Carleton than a bridge at Navy Island would be. We are well satisfied that a one cent ferry, efficiently conducted, would be found to answer all the reasonable demands of the Carleton people, and would be especially beneficial to the working population. At present the Carleton people pay a dollar a month for their ticket. If he is working on the east side and has to cross twice a day he has to pay about two cents for each trip, even if working full time. If he only gets three weeks work on the east side during the month, every trip costs him four cents. The monthly ticket system is therefore a sort of lottery to the working man, which at the best only gives him a reduction of one third from the regular fare, or which may actually cost him more than the regular fare. A workman who takes out a monthly ticket regularly pays \$12 a year, which is a very considerable tax on his resources, and if his wife or children want to cross to the east side they have to pay full fare. The purchase of a monthly ticket who has a wife and five children, each of whom crosses once a week, would pay \$302 a year for his ferriage, whereas with a one cent rate, with the same service it would cost him only \$900 thereby saving \$1042 a year. We commend these figures to the consideration of the working people of Carleton, who want an efficient ferry at the lowest rate possible. Let them agitate for a one cent ferry and they will be successful.

The people of the Upper Provinces are already manifesting much interest in it, and their ideas on the subject are very well expressed by the Montreal Star in the article which we republished the other day, which spoke of the new line as likely to effect a social and commercial revolution. Certainly no railway that has ever been constructed in Canada, is so important to St. John as this one is likely to be. It gives to this city and the port the advantage which naturally belongs to it of being the nearest Atlantic port in Canada for the shipment of freight from the West. If in any fair competition Halifax, with 27 miles of additional railway haulage for freight, can take this business from St. John, it will be a most extraordinary circumstance, and unless we actually see it we will not believe that this can be done. To enable Halifax to compete with St. John in freight, it would be necessary for the Intercolonial to haul freight over 827 miles of railway as cheaply as the Canadian Pacific Company can afford to haul it over 480 miles from Montreal to St. John, or if it would be necessary for the government to haul

freight going to Montreal over the 277 miles of railway between Halifax and St. John free of charge. Unless the Halifax people can contrive to get this accomplished they cannot hope to compete with St. John after the completion of the Short Line.

MORE WRECKED MALICE
