## Four German Destroyers Sunk

Oct. 18.

New light cruiser "Undaunted," Capt. Fox, with destroyers "Lanox," Commander Beaton, "Lennox," Commander Dale, "Legion" Commander Alop, "Loyal" Commander Barger, "Witson," engaged and sank four German destroyers off Dutch coast seventeen October.

## 'Emden' Still Sinking Ships

London, Oct. 21.—The German cruiser Emden has again been sinking British steamers at a point 150 miles south west of Cochin, British India.

According to a report received by the Admiralty from Colombo, Ceylon, she has sunk to bottom the British steamers Toler, Clan Grant, Beunoh and Dredger, bound for Tasmania, and captured the Exford.

## Portugal Preparing

Lisbon, Oct. 27.—Portugal is excited at the possibility of taking part in the war as the Ally of Britain under the Treaty which requires this country, if asked, to supply 10,000 troops.

The Government, anticipating a winter campaign, has ordered 10,000 thick uniforms, and is buying great numbers of mules.

## Heligoland Good Lobster Fishing Centre

Heligoland, under whose fortifications the German fleet is sheltering, says the Fishing News, was once the religious centre of the Frisian race. Heligoland, or Heligoland, as the Germans call it, means the Holy Isle. From 1803 to 1890 it was a possession of Great Britain. In the latter year it was ceded to Germany in exchange for a portion of German East Africa. It is questionable nowadays whether John Bull got the best of the deal. The island is quite small, being only three-quarters of a mile square, with a high rocky cliff on one side, sloping down to a sandy beach. It is very sparsely populated—at least it was so when I visited it in its second year under German rule. Times have changed since these days, and the island has become one of the Kaiser's many strongly fortified islands. The fortress will likely be an important factor in the present war, as the great range of its powerful guns dominates the approach to the mouth of the Elbe, from whose entrance it is 40 miles distant. It is the "key to the Kiel Canal," 50 miles off, and a defence for the great shipping port of Hamburg, 125 miles away. By the way, the islanders carry on a large and lucrative lobster fishery, or rather I should say did, for on the outbreak of hostilities all the civil population of the island were promptly transported to Hamburg, where, I understand, they arrived on August 4. The lobster fishery of Heligoland are therefore enjoying an unexpected rest cure. Thanks to the efforts of the British Navy, they are having what may be termed a "close time," in which German Drednoughts are evidently thankfully participating.—Canadian Fisherman.

## Price of Fish

The fish prices have weakened during the week and quotations are lower this morning. When we last wrote good salmagundi and Madeira was worth \$8.00 a quintal; to-day the highest price that will be paid is \$5.75, and some buyers are offering only \$5.50. The men who have been holding back their share fish for a month or more at the suggestion of people who assume to know everything realize that they have been fooled, and, accordingly, they are not very thankful to the people who misled them. They will probably be wiser in future.

### Slop Labrador

The most of the outport schooners, arriving in port the last few days, are bringing what is now known to the trade as slop Labrador, i. e. fish which has been given only one or two days drying. Owing to the lateness of the Labrador season, this had to be brought home instead of shipped from the coast, and thus there is much more of it than usual in the market. Ten days ago fishermen who brought this class of fish along got \$4.25 to \$4.40 for it. The men who foolishly listened to bad advice and held on their fish cannot get more than \$3.75 for it in the market to-day.

### Good Advice

Those who are the real friends of the fishermen have been asking them for some time to dispose of their voyage as early as possible, as under the extraordinary market conditions at present prevailing, high prices could not be maintained all through the season. And we are not the only fishing people affected; a few days ago a fishing firm in Iceland wired a local concern offering seventeen thousand quintals of fish at much lower prices than it could be bought for in the Newfoundland market. The local concern declined to deal at any figure knowing that it will take us all our time to market our own goods this season.—Trade Review, Oct. 17.

## Lumber Contraband

London, Oct. 23—German warships yesterday captured four Swedish steamers in the Timber trade, bound for British ports. The German naval commander stated that Germany considers that all wood cargoes bound for Britain are contraband. A despatch from Helsingfors, Sweden, announces that one Norwegian and six Swedish steamers had been seized off Falstebot, a small seaport off the Swedish Coast on the Baltic Sea. The wood cargoes mentioned above, were understood, were chiefly pit props bound to Great Britain. This seizure ought to make the demand for pit props greater in Newfoundland.—Editor.

## Shipping Men Make Protest

New York, Oct. 9.—Shipping men are not taking kindly to the activities of the former Cunard liner Caronia, which was converted into an auxiliary cruiser by the British government and which has been lying outside Sandy Hook for more than two weeks, carrying what shippers term a 'siege of New York.' Her officers have been boarding incoming and outgoing liners despite the fact that they were under neutral flag, coming from or going to neutral ports without contraband of war. The Englishmen simply said they were searching for Germans among the passengers or crews. The delays occasioned by these holdups have not only inconvenienced travellers, but have cost the steamship owners a large amount, the latter assert. No preference has been shown in the selection of vessels to be boarded. In fact, most of those stopped have been British ships. If an approaching vessel has carried wireless she has been ordered by wireless to stop. If not, she has been signalled to do so. If the command has not been obeyed instantly a blank charge has been fired as a warning. As far as is known, that has been sufficient inducement for all to heed her command. When a vessel steps a cutter is put overboard from the Caronia, with a British flag in its stern and their crew wearing life-preservers. British naval officers are then rowed to the vessel that is to be searched. The captain is ordered to show his papers, the passengers are locked overhead and the crew is lined up for inspection, then the ship is searched for contraband.



If there was any attempt at opposition our city, towns and villages would be destroyed; cathedrals, churches, and public buildings battered down; our houses levelled to the ground; our men, old and young, murdered; our women would meet a fate compared to which death would be happiness; our children killed with brutality and, if any escaped the slaughter, they would become slaves of German taskmasters, and the slavery would be more bitter than any the North American Continent has ever dreamed of. Of course all property rights would disappear; whilst every cent in gold, silver, or copper would be seized, and bank notes would be but "scraps of paper."—Daily News.

### Lockjaw Anti-Toxin

Order For 6,000 Packages For French and English Troops Placed

Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 14.—An order for 6,000 packages of lockjaw anti-toxin for the French and English troops has been placed with a local firm of chemical manufacturers by the British government, it was announced last night. The anti-toxin is to be used especially for the immunization of troops who are obliged to fight in trenches.

A member of the contracting firm said that tetanus germs are particularly prevalent in earth and that the French and English military authorities propose to inoculate the soldiers before they are allowed to go in the trenches.

The order is one of the largest ever placed in this country for lockjaw anti-toxin, and it will take from six to eight months to manufacture it.

### Proclamation

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

WHEREAS We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms and Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court for the Northern District of Our Island of Newfoundland, at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned:

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loyal subjects within Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island, shall be open and hold:

At Brigus, on Friday, the 20th, and Saturday, the 21st days of November next;

At Harbour Grace, on Monday the 23rd, Tuesday, the 24th, Wednesday, the 25th, and Thursday, the 26th days of November next;

At Carboneau, on Friday, the 27th, and Saturday, the 28th days of November next.

And the said Court shall be kept open for the sittings hereinafter prescribed at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the presiding Judge shall have business to do therein; and if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.

And We do hereby prescribe, farther order and direct that in the event of a Judge who may be present in the said Court, in the Northern District of Our said Island, being prevented by unforeseen circumstances from opening Our said Court on any of the days hereinafter appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places hereinafter named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and shall deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those hereinafter specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods hereinafter stated, as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols and other Officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Witness Our trusty and well-beloved Sir WILLIAM EDWARD DAVISON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. George Michael and St. George Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies, at Saint John's, in Our said Island, this 11th day of August, A.D. 1914, and in the Fifth year of Our said Majesty.

## WAR NEWS

After severe fighting the past week the Germans have met with very serious setbacks on both the eastern and western battle-fronts. The allied troops have pushed the Germans back and inflicted heavy losses on them. They lost 2,000 killed and wounded in a night attack, while the French casualties numbered only 100. The Belgians near Dixmude and Nieport are putting up a splendid fight. Sixteen British warships joined in the attack on the German right wing. On the west the German and Austrian troops have been forced to withdraw before fresh Russian troops. The Russian army on the left wing completely defeated an Austrian cavalry division. Greece has occupied the southern end of Albania. Italy may do the same. The Brayley Concert Co. left for North River Monday morning last.

## NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPHS

On and after the 26th inst., Telegraph Addresses registered prior to 1st July, 1914, may be used as the Address, but not as the signature in telegrams (a) between any two places in British territory including Egypt, (b) between each and any of the following:—British territory including Egypt, United States of America, provided in all cases that either Sender or Addressee of both are resident outside Europe. In the case of telegrams emanating from British territory and destined for the territory of an allied power or for the United States of America, the full name and address of the addressee will be given by the sender, but not telegraphed. When the Censor is located at the office of destination he may at his discretion require the office to give the full name and address at which a telegram is to be delivered.

## Published by Authority

Under the provisions of the Stamp Acts, 1898-1914, the following Rules and Regulations respecting Stamp Duties, in substitution for those of date September 15th, 1914, have been approved by His Excellency the Governor in Council.

JOHN R. BENNETT, Colonial Secretary, Dept. of the Colonial Secretary, October 6th, 1914.

1. Every instrument shall be stamped on its face, when possible.
2. Cancellation of stamps made by the person cancelling, or initials with date across the stamp.
3. Bills of Exchange, Cheques, Promissory Notes, Bills of Lading, Shipping Receipts, and Charter Parties shall be stamped and the stamps thereon cancelled as follows:—

- (a) Bills of Exchange, Cheques and Promissory Notes drawn or made in the Colony by the person signing the same, provided that in the case of a cheque the Banker to whom it is presented may, if it is unstamped, stamp the same and cancel the stamp.
- (b) Bills of Exchange, Cheques and Promissory Notes drawn or made outside the Colony by the person in the Colony into whose hands any such bill, cheque or note shall come unstamped hereon in any manner negotiable, save the same.
- (c) Bills of Lading executed outside the Colony by the consignee in the Colony into whose hands any such Bill of Lading may come before he in any manner negotiable the same.
- (d) Bills of Lading executed outside the Colony by the shipper, provided that if any Bill of Lading is sent to any person or Company for signature unstamped, such person or Company may stamp the same and cancel the stamp.
- (e) Shipping Receipts by the shipper. Provided that if any Shipping Receipt is presented to any person or Company for signature unstamped, such person or Company may stamp the same and cancel the stamp.
- (f) Charter Parties by the person in the Colony last executing the same.
- (g) Charter Parties executed wholly outside the Colony by the person in the Colony into whose hands any such Charter Party comes unstamped before he in any manner negotiable, save the same.
4. The person upon whom the obligation to stamp and cancel any instrument is imposed by these Rules shall be deemed to be a person issuing an instrument, and, if he fails to stamp such instrument with its proper stamp, or to cancel such stamp, he shall be liable to the penalties imposed by Section 22 of the Act 61 Victoria, Cap. 34, entitled 'An Act respecting the Payment of Certain Fees and Charges by Stamp's.
5. Any Rules and Regulations which may have been heretofore made under the Provisions of the Stamp Acts, 1898-1914, are hereby repealed.
