A Bill entitled, an Act to enable the inhabitants of Berwick to supply hemselves with sewerage, electric ighting, and water for domestic, fire and other numbers.

BILLS—SECOND READING.

Hon. Mr. Mack, chairman of the Committee on Law Amendments, reported up favorably:

A Bill entitled, an Act respecting Rural Telephone Companies;

A Bill entitled, an Act to amend Chapter 44, Acts of 1907, entitled, an Act in relation to the Registration and Identification of motor vehicles, and Identification of motor vehicles, and the use of Public Highways by such vehicles, as amended by Chapter 29, Acts of 1911.

Hon. Mr. Armstrong, Chairman of the Select Committee on Bills, reported up favorably:

A Bill entitled, an Act to amend Chapter 74, Acts of 1882, entitled, an Act to incorporate the Grand Council of the Provincial Workingmen's Association;

A Bill entitled, an Act respecting the Charter of the City of Halfax.

Hon. Mr. Armstrong — The last named bill respecting the charter of the City of Halfax enacts nothing new. When the legislation was passed a year ago creating the Board of Control, it became necessary to adjust the charter to the changes in the city government, anticipating the time when the Board of Control Act would come into effect. Commissioners were appointed by the Bill entitled, an Act anticipating the time when the Board of Control Art would come into effect. Commissioners were appointed by the Governor-in-Council to revise and consolidate the city charter accordingly. This occurred last year. The Commissioners have prepared their revision and consolidation, and reported the same to the Governor-in-Council, and this was brought into force by proclamation on April 1, 1913. This revision and consolidation has been printed, but has not yet been reduced in the form of a book. Besides, it is necessary to incorporate in this revision and consolidation certain statutes relating to the City passed during the present session, and for giving the force of law to the body of such enactments when so further consolidated. This Bill which is now before the House, empowers the Governor-in-Council to select the Acts passed during the present session and to incorporate them with the enactments contained in the report of the Commissioners. The present Bill might accordingly be said to be whelly formal in its character.
