A Rome despatch of Tuesday says:—Pope Pius X had a fainting fit this morning while celebrating Mass. His holiness soon revived.

The pope has been over-exercising himself to such an extent that his naturally strong constitution was unable to bear the strain put upon it by the convalescent ceremony. Such has been the effect upon his nerves that he has been unable to sleep for three nights, while numerous receptions yesterday night matters were so late that his holiness was very much agitated, but still he insisted upon admitting this morning to his home, 100 Vaticanists who had journeyed to Rome to see the coronation.

Pope Pius was seen to grow paler and paler, finally throwing out an hand as if to ward off the crowd.
