Vera Cruz, May 18—Dr. Aureliano Urrutia, who was once provisional president, Huerta's most trusted counsellor in the cabinet and who as minister of the interior is popularly believed to have been the author of many orders for the disappearances of his chief's political enemies, arrived today among the refugees from the capital. He had fled from the wrath of General Huerta.

Dr. Urrutia said he had not been subjected to any overt act of hostility by General Huerta, but had decided that to remain within reach of the provisional president was to court death. He had been convinced of this by the testimony of friends and by what he himself had seen. He declare the he professed to the truit of the hostility of the United States authorities in Vera Cruz. He was accompanied by his family and said he expected to remain here indefinitely.

The former minister of the interior declared he had stolen away from the capital in the same way as any other fugutive and had succeeded in eluding General Huerta's agents and arriving within the American lines without his identity being disclosed so far as he knew. Once on board the American train on the Vera Cruz side of the gap in the railroad he made himself known to the guards, and surrendered a pistot which he had managed to keep when the Mexicans searched the train.

Reginá, Sask., May 18—Inspector Beytes of the R. N. W. M. P. force here has been given a three years' commission to go to the northernmost part of Hudson Bay and find the murderers of Redford and Streek, two oxplorers who are believed to have been killed by eskimos two years ago.

Beytes will go to Chesterfield Inlet, the farthest north part of the Hudson Bay inhabited by white men, and from there take three years supply of provisions and travel thousands of miles through the interior. The trip will be one of the most dangerous and trying ever undertaken by an officer of the mounted police, involving investigations among savage eskimo tribes at swhose hands the two lost explorers met death.






