ITALIANS AND EMIGRATION.

Toronto, May 13.—(Special)—The Telegram's special cable from London says: "The Italian government, at the suggestion of the consul at Montreal, has sent circulars through the labor districts of Italy, announcing that work is scarce in Canada, but that Italians with means wishing to emigrate to Canada, are told the warning does not apply to them."

Reinforcing Russian Fleet.

London, May 14.—"It is asserted here," says the St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, "that at the request of Admiral Alexieff, the Russian government is sending two more battleships and four cruisers to reinforce the Russian fleet in Chinese waters, in anticipation of serious troubles."

Charged With Embezzlement.

Ponce, P. R., May 13.—Carlos and Ramon Julia, respectively postmaster and assistant postmaster at Juana Diaz, have been arrested on the charge of embezzlement. The amount involved is not mentioned. The bondsmen of the prisoners will reimburse the government in full.

MURDERERS SLAY FARMER, HIS WIFE, AND DAUGHTER AND BURN THEIR HOME.

Maine Stirred by Another Horrible Tragedy—Four Strangers Who Recently Held Up Stage Coach Suspected of Murder and Worse.

Shirley, Me., May 13.—One of the most revolting crimes in the history of Northern Maine came to light today, when the body of J. Wesley Allen, a prominent and prosperous farmer and member of the board of selectmen of this town, and those of his wife and 14-year-old daughter were found lying among the smouldering embers of their home on the lonely stage road leading from Monson to Moosehead Lake.

MR. BRODERICK'S ARMY REFORM MEASURE.

War Secretary Moves His Scheme in British Commons—An Amendment.

London, May 13.—The war secretary, Mr. Broderick, in the House of Commons today, moved his army reform measure providing for six corps with 50,000 militia as a reserve and increasing the Yeomanry from 12,000 to 35,000 men.

MEETING OF KINGS ON DECK OF MAN-OF-WAR.

Charles of Roumania and Georges of Greece Desiring to Draw Their Countries Into Closer Friendship.

Abbasia, Austria, May 13.—King Charles of Roumania, and King George of Greece met here this afternoon on board the Greek warship Bearn. The object of the meeting in Austrian waters as officially set forth in Athens May 1, is to draw Roumania and Greece into closer friendship.

DOCTOR HELD IN BAIL.

Must Answer Grave Charges Made Against Him.

Philadelphia, May 13.—Dr. Thomas E. Eldridge, a specialist and electrotherapeutic physician, who is accused by the police authorities of having conceived a plot to drug his wife with morphine or to blow her up with dynamite in order to secure two letters which are in her possession, was today held in \$1,500 bail for court.

Simla, May 13.—A detachment of the South Waziri militia has been fired on by unknown persons. Three of the Waziris were killed and two others were wounded.

HOME RULE FOR IRELAND DISCUSSED IN CONNECTION WITH THE BOER WAR.

Lord Salisbury Feels That Conquest of the Green Isle Would Have Been Necessary if the Irish Leaders Had Unlimited Power.

London, May 13.—The Marquis of Salisbury, speaking at the banquet of the Non-Conformist Unionist Association, said: "It is a sad retrospect when we think of the number of young lives that have been quenched, the splendid hopes cut short and the amount of blood shed in the war in South Africa. It is a grievous retrospect. Yet, from it, any suggestion of wrong on the part of our empire is absolutely absent. Indeed, there are circumstances which can make every lover of his country look back with exultation and gratitude upon the two years just passed."

ATLANTIC TRANSPORT AND LEYLAND LINES.

President of Former Says There is No Legal Combine Yet, But Hints at Future.

New York, May 13.—President Bernard N. Baker, of the Atlantic Transport line, arrived here from London tonight on the steamer Minnetonka. He went to England a short time ago for the purpose of securing, through the aid of J. P. Morgan, the consolidation of the Atlantic Transport and Leyland lines, the fleets of which will next year aggregate 750,000 tons.

THE CHINESE PLENIPOTENTIARIES.

Express Astonishment at Size of Indemnity but Will Undertake to Pay.

London, May 14.—Dr. Morrison, writing to the Times from Peking, May 10, says: "The Chinese plenipotentiaries are drafting a reply to the ministers of the powers, expressing astonishment at the amount of indemnity demanded, and urging a reduction, on the ground of the empire's financial difficulties, but undertaking, if the full amount is expected, to pay in 30 annual instalments of 15,000,000 taels on the Likin, salt tax and native customs."

SOUTHAFRICAN CAMPAIGN.

Report that Lord Kitchener Will Try Burying the Veldt as a New Plan.

London, May 14.—According to a despatch from Pretoria, dated May 12, says: "Lord Kitchener is about to try a new plan of burying the veldt, in order to compel the Boers to surrender. Hamilton, Bermuda, May 13.—The British government has rented Tucker's and Morgan's Islands to be used as detention camps for Boer prisoners."

Refusal by Venezuela.

Willmstrand, Caracas, Thursday, May 9.—It is learned on good authority that the Venezuelan government, in face of the draconic demands made by France in the protocol for the resumption of diplomatic relations with Venezuela, has refused to consider the protocol.

CARLETON COUNTY'S NEW JAIL WILL BE BUILT IN WOODSTOCK.

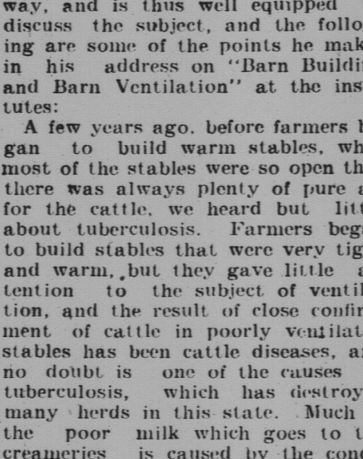
Meeting of Council Last Night Decides the Matter on a Close Vote --- Looks Like Woodstock for a "Dry Town."

A few years ago, before farmers began to build warm stables, when most of the stables were so open that there was always plenty of pure air for the cattle, we heard but little about tuberculosis.

The best material with which to build a stable is pine lumber. I do not mean the subject of ventilation, and the result of close confinement of cattle in poorly ventilated stables has been cattle diseases, and no doubt, a great deal of tuberculosis, which has destroyed many herds in this state.

They must be tight and thoroughly insulated in order to maintain a temperature of the air high enough to prevent condensation. One flue, one foot to two inches in diameter, will be necessary for every 10 to 12 cows.

How to Prepare Insecticides. Make kerosene emulsion by stirring together one gallon of warm water and two gallons of kerosene.

Diseases of House Plants. House plants become diseased more on account of too much water being used on them than too little. It is at no time necessary to drench the earth in the pots.

Lime Water for Preserving Eggs. T. F. Shurt of the Canadian Experiment Station at Ottawa after testing a number of egg preservatives, concludes that the superiority of saturated lime water for this purpose is beyond question.

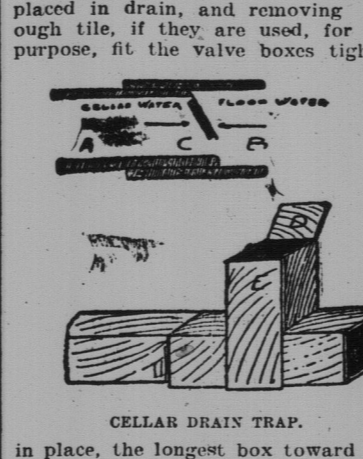

MACADAMIZED ROADS. They Can Be Built at a Very Moderate Expense.

The road question seems to be quite a puzzle to the engineer, and the trouble appears to be the enormous expense of some of the roads recently built under the supervision of the State.

Commence to build a road at the end where you get the material. First spread out six inches of coarse broken stone (commonly called spalls) or cobble stones, making the surface six inches higher in the center.

Sensible Method of Dairying. At a recent farmers' institute at Knapp, Wis., one of the points brought out was that the most profitable method of dairying in Wisconsin is for farmers to procure small separators, separate their cream by tread-mill power at home, preserve the cream from day to day in refrigerators, and deliver it to the factory once or twice a week.

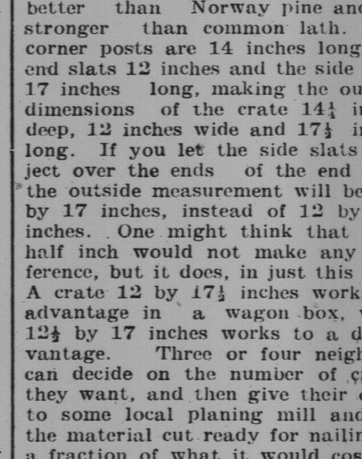

CRATES FOR THE FARM.

Indispensable Where Orchard and Garden Work is Carried On in a Strictly Up-to-Date Manner.

Every farmer should have a few bushel crates. The illustration shows one of the crates ready for use. It is a slat crate throughout. The corner pieces are of elm 2 1/2-inch corner sawed, thus one piece after it is sawed will make two pieces to order.



A BUSHEL CRATE. pieces the bottom slats are nailed to are not lath, but elm fence pickets 2 1/2 inches thick. These hold nails better than Norway pine and are stronger than common lath.

LOAD OF BUSHEL CRATES. A load of crates, which are placed with the long dimension parallel with the long dimension of the wagon. Each layer will then hold not only crates for potatoes, but a rack for the crates.

Practical Dairy Dels. The good cow is a comparatively lean one. Breed is well enough, but it will take to show what there is in the breed.

Good and regular milking is of the utmost importance, as it develops the milk-secreting organs, and makes the cow more contented and happy. Concentrate your efforts on a small area, thus economizing material and stock, as well as labor.

The chief advantages of the creamery system are the greater amount of product from the saving of labor. The function of milk-giving is maternity and the mother needs shelter, warmth and protection.

The churn should never be filled more than half full and when the temperature is right it will churn easily. It is very important that milk or cream is not exposed to anything which would contaminate it by absorption.

Butter will come much quicker sometimes than when it is due to a difference in temperature; use a good thermometer.—Hiring Out.
