Referring to the session at Ottawa, he said he heard the presentation of the budget and was much impressed with the splendid showing made by Hon. Mr. Fielding. So far the session has been a very quiet one. Mr. Burchill said the people of Northumberland county were much interested in the election of the I. C. R. to Chatham, since the Junction, as it is called, landmen are looking forward to a good season but are also anxiously looking for snow. Mr. Burchill himself expected the winter cut would be a little short of last year.

ST. JOHN, Dec. 22.—The local Tories here have virtually forest J. H. Crockett out of the management of the Standard. COMMITTEE FINDS COOK IS A FAKER

Records Do Not Show That
Cook Reached North
Pole.

COOK IS HIDING

St. John, Dec. 22.—The report of the special committee of sportsmen which the University of Queen's appointed to scrutinize Dr. Frederick A. Cook's claim that he had discovered the North Pole was submitted to the committee of the University of Queen's yesterday. The report states completely and without reservation that the explorer's title to such discovery is made with regard to the figure of the North Pole is not in the eyes of the scientific world. The committee was prepared for a verdict of "no opinion," but did not expect its report to be so branded as in its poster. Many cling to the belief that Cook acted in good faith, but harbored a delusion. Explorers and scientists almost unanimously have lost faith in Cook's honesty, while one of his warmest supporters, Knud Rasmussen, helped to frame the report. The evening papers attack Cook and severely reproach him for hiding, which they regard as a sign of a guilty conscience.

LABOR FAMINE IS FEARED NEXT YEAR.

Toronto, Dec. 22.—The Canadian Manufacturers' Association fears a labor famine next year. Of 463 manufacturers, who have answered the association's recent query, 166 want more help. These 166 manufacturers say they want 5,962 employees, 2,254 male and 3,708 females. Of the 156 employers that need labor one is in British Columbia, four are in Manitoba, two in New Brunswick, three in Nova Scotia, thirty in Quebec, and 116 in Ontario. Of employes needed, 150 are wanted in British Columbia, forty-two in Manitoba, twenty in New Brunswick, thirty-two in Nova Scotia, 2,216 in Quebec and 2,993 in Ontario.

QUEENS GIFTS TO THE LONDON POOR

Her Majesty the Unknown
Doner of Much Good Cheer
To Homeless.

A ROYAL REGIMENT

London, Dec. 22.—Unknown men for the past two nights have collected the homeless destitute who frequent the Victoria Embankment and given each man a knitted jacket, gloves, a scarf and a shawl, and a shilling. They refused to give the name of their donor. The "Daily Mail" today says: "The Queen, stirred by newspaper stories of wanderers who seek refuge on the embankment, has taken this means of providing them with 'Christmas presents'."

Hamilton, Ont., Dec. 22.—Lieut. J. M. Moore, commanding officer of the 24th Battalion, was notified that King Edward has consented to allow the regiment to be named the 19th Royal Regiment. The honor is conferred because of the regiment's efficiency in shooting and other matters. London, Dec. 22.—The Russian Court Bulletin has announced that the Czar walked about Lavalade for two hours wearing the uniform and carrying accoutrements of an infantry soldier in order to see the equipment. Another story has now reached St. Petersburg to the effect that while the Emperor was strolling in the Park with his adjutant he noticed that one of the sentries had been attacked with hemorrhage. He sent the adjutant to tell the man to go to the doctor. The man replied that he dare not and that he was under oath to die rather than leave his post. The adjutant then told the man that the same oath compelled him to obey the Emperor, who was empowered by military code to relieve sentry. The Czar then ordered the sentry to surrender his rifle to him, and instructed the adjutant to accompany the man to barracks and explain matters. While the Czar mounted guard until he was relieved.

MONTREAL, Dec. 22.—Robinson Watson, brother of William Watson, the poet, will leave for Havana tomorrow, where Watson and his wife are now staying. He states that he is the only one who can do anything with the poet when he gets into his present unbalanced frame of mind. Mrs. Watson, he states, is ignorant of the poet's former experiences, and naturally denies statements about her husband's alleged insanity.

BRITISH NAVAL SUP- REMACY IS SECURE

Premier Asquith Declares For Years
to Come

London, Dec. 22.—Premier Asquith yesterday speaking at Liverpool, said as regards the navy: "Let me say once and for all, and I speak with full deliberation, after careful and prolonged enquiry, that the navy today is able to maintain not only this year, but for many years before us, our supremacy at sea, and should the necessary arise, which God forbid, to guarantee the integrity of our shores, the protection of our commerce and the inviolability of our empire."

SALTINGS' ART TREASURES TO NATION AFTER ALL

LONDON, Dec. 19.—By the will of George Saltings, the eccentric and miserly art collector who died last Monday, his entire collection valued at from fifteen to twenty million dollars, is after-all left to the British nation.

Among other eccentricities he is known to have been averse to making a will and it was feared that although he had said that he would leave his collection to the people he would not provide for it. To art connoisseurs the will is a great disappointment, as they had looked forward to one of the greatest art sales in the history of the country.

Some idea of the great value of the collection may be had when it is known that the portion of it which is now in the South Kensington Museum on loan is valued at \$5,000,000. Saltings' collection of Oriental porcelain is inferior only to those of J. Pierpont Morgan and Benjamin Altman. His Limoges and enamels were unrivalled in any private collection in the world.

The Convent School here closed today for the holidays and the boarders who remained will be entertained to a Christmas tree celebration this week.

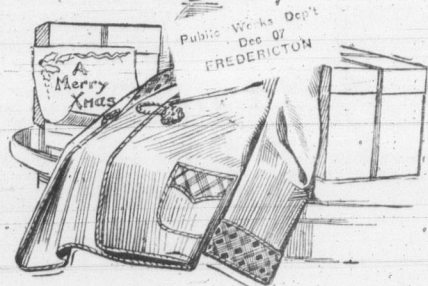

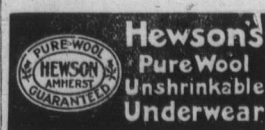
