Valuation and Assessment.

To the Editor of the Chignecto Post, Sir.—I presume that you are aware that the present assessment law of New Brunswick was the outcome of three prize essays one of them the work of your humble servant. I thought when I wrote my essay that from my long acquaintance with the local affairs of Westmorland that I had some idea of what was required, and in addition to that I had carefully read the assessment laws of Great Britain and of some of the United States. My essay differed so far from the others that although I was awarded one of the prizes I was informed by the executive that many of my ideas were too radical. The essay that contained the valuation idea was written by Mr. Lorrain and that idea was embodied in the present assessment law. To that idea I was then hostile and have never seen any good reason to change my hostility to it. I thought I was in the greatest measure of cost with out any corresponding benefit. I believe that now the rate-payers throughout the Province have arrived at a similar conclusion so that the table you have published and your excellent editorial only show a part of the injustice done, and my purpose is to disclose a remedy for the wrongs that are perpetrated if our assessment law is not amended. I shall not however go beyond the matters mentioned in your editorial, although there are others in the law that ought to be removed.

Property and income forms the foundation for local taxation, and when countries are divided into parishes as we are in New Brunswick justice demands that each and every parish be placed on an equality in the apportionment of the tax. No parish should be assessed and another or others overburdened. To avoid this the board of valuers should be so constituted that a member, even if he desired to ease his own parish, should be placed so that his other parish should be so placed that his desire would be neutralized. What I proposed in my essay was a board of valuers and assessors made up of a member from each parish, this in Westmorland would give the county a board of seven. The moment that one attempted to exempt his parish from the tax the board would be in a position to prevent him. To place partially out of the question instead of making up the valuation of each parish by parishes as it is now done, in the first instance the list of ratepayers should be made up from the whole county without taking into consideration here or in each parish they lived, and then from the best information within the reach of the board the real and personal estate and incomes of persons on the list should be ascertained and the rate of each ratepayer made out in the ordinary way. The apportionment for each parish should be made in only one correct way in which it can be made and that is by placing the ratepayers of each on a parish list made out from the general or county list and previous valuations could be averaged opposite the name of the ratepayer.

It may be asked what about the cost of your proposed system? I believe that in all respects the result would be satisfactory that the cost of valuation would be decreased more than fifty per cent. Take if you will the County of Westmorland, where under the law as it now is we have three valuers and twenty-one assessors, twenty-four in all. The system recommended would reduce that number to seven, thus saving what is now paid to the seventeen that would be dispensed with. The seven could each be paid much better than the twenty-one severally are now paid and still a very large saving effected.

I have only referred, and that perhaps too briefly, to one of the amendments I discussed in my essay, but I have said enough to show how the injustice done to some of the parishes by the last and previous valuations could be avoided. I will say in conclusion that there are other radical defects in our assessment law, and it is to be hoped that the committee now at work on a new law will, when their work is done and becomes law, remove them.


