NORTH PERTH STANDS FIRM. The bye-election to fill the vacancy in the Dominion House of Commons caused by the unseating of Mr. Grieve, the Liberal representative, took place yesterday, and resulted in the re-election of that gentlenan by a majority increased from 71 to 87. Mr. Grieve had opposed to him a very trong Conservative candidate, an ex-mayor of Stratford, and possessing other elements that added to his popularity, and his opponents declared from start to finish that the Liberal candidate had eally no chance of securing re-election. To add somewhat to the uncertainty of the result, the voters' lists were found to be augmented by over 3,000 names when compared with the antiquated list ipon which the general election was fought. it was contended that the new voters, and specially the young men, were opposed to increased freedom to buy and to sell, and favored trade restriction; but the result points to quite a different conclusion.

Doubtless some of the electors who have in the past supported the men now in power were influenced to vote for Mr. Grieve by the fact that within the past two weeks Sir John Thompson and his supporters in the House have deliberately burked investigation into two of the gravest seandals that have ever been brought before Parliament. When the independent public-and there are independent men in the Conservative ranks-witness the spectacle of a Minister of Justice gravely deciding that there shall be no justice if it interferes with the wishes or designs of an associate, as has been decreed in the Judge Elliot case and in the charges against Sir Adolphe Caron, they have a right to believe the worst. No honest citizen, be he judge or be he layman, fears the search light of public investigation. The independent electors of North Perth doubtless took note of this fact. In refusing to be cajoled or browbeaten by emissaries of Sir John Thompson into voting for trade restriction and the robbery of the consuming public which it implies, the electors of North Perth have set a noble example to other constituencies.

By condemning the burking of investigation into grave wrong-doing against this free people they have earned the gratitude of every lover of fair play in London and throughout the Dominion.
In re-electing Mr. Grieve they have

shown that they desire an able, upright, progressive farmer to represent them at Ottawa. They will not be disappointed.

WILL NOT STAY GERRYMANDERED

How far the electors of North Perth. through their verdict of yesterday, intended to condemn the infamous attempt to stifle public opinion, by the cutting, carving and pitchforking of the constituencies, we cannot tell. But it is certain that North Perth itself is an example of the fact that where the electors are intelligent they will not always stay gerrymandered.

From 1872 till 1891 North Perth returned Conservative candidates by majorities ranging between 25 and 200. In 1882, however, Mr. Hesson made up his mind that the constituency was not sufficiently safe, and so the township of North Easthope, with a large Liberal majority, was hived in North Oxford, and it was in North Oxford, and it was supposed that a big Conservative mojority was for all time assured in North Perth. The result was the re-election of Mr. Hesson at the general election of 1887 by a majority of 200. But the stalwart Liberal leaders in the riding were not dismayed. They did not like the indefensible breaking down of the county boundaries—they regretted very much to part with the banner townships; but they stood to their guns, and we now know the result. Mr. Hesson was the first victim, and in the election just held a stronger than he was shown that it cannot be kept from declaring for freedom of trade and conomical and pure government by any mayed. They did not like the indefensible cal and pure government by any gerrymander that may be devised. The gerrymander now before the House is meant to gag other independent constituencies, and it cannot honestly be defended. But if it is forced through, and the right of a party in power to pass a measure so much at variance with British fair play is maintained by the Governor-General, it will not surprise us if in many instances public opinion is found, as in North Perth to be too strong to be stifled by the tactics of Gerrymander John.

London, May 19 .- Advices from Mauriius state that a hurricane unprecedented in violence passed over that island on April 29, causing enormous damage to shipping. A majority of the vessels at the island were blown ashore. The western half of Port Luis, the capital, was devastated. Houses were blown down, gigantic trees were uprooted, and that part of the town was about wiped out of existence. The loss of life was appalling. A large number of persons were caught in the falling houses and crushed to death, while others lost their lives by flying debris while they were attempting to seek places of safety. Never before in the history of the island has such a warring of the elements been known, and never was there such widespread fear among the inhabitants. The exact number of dead is not known. Half of the crops of rice, coffee and pepper were nearly ruined, and the loss in this direction is extremely heavy.





TOO MUCH MONEY WASTED.

THE LATEST DISCOVERIES.

For various ornamental purposes wood with a mirror polish is now being satisfactorily employed in Germany as a substitute for metal. In carrying out this plan the wood is suitably prepared by being first submitted to a bath of caustic alkali for two or three days at a temperature of about 175° Fah., then dipped into hydrosulphate of calcium for 24 to 34 hours, after which a concentrated solution of sulphur is added. After being subjected to another dip in an acctate of lead solution at about 100° a shining metallic surface is imparted by polishing when dry with lead, tin, or zinc.

Until a comparatively recent date the use of graphite has been confined to the production of lead pencils, the manufacture production of lead pencils, the manufacture of crucibles, and to various preparations of stone polishing, etc. Of late, however, its other qualities and adaptations have been made apparent, and utilized, opening up to the mineral entirely new and extensive fields of usfulness, prominent among these being its consumption as a lubricant. For the bearings of heavy machinery it makes a superior lubricant to oil, being clean, leaving no dripping grease, and one proper application lasting as long as the bearings themselves. When the discovery was first made that graphite possessed the property in question, some difficulty was experienced to keep it as a lubricant, in place—it being, as originally employed, mixed with oil and applied to smooth surfaced bearings, but, though serving the mixed with oil and applied to smooth surfaced bearings, but, though serving the purpose well for a while, the substance would creep out and escape, requiring constant renewal. This is obviated by the use of grooved bushings, the grooves being filled with a 75 per cent. graphite composition, the box requiring no refilling, and the bearings needing no new application until the box is worn out. For some time past graphite has also been made into a paint for smokestacks, boilers, and other metal for smokestacks, boilers, and other metal surfaces.

papers a perfectly satisfactory substitute for ivory is now being produced by using, n combination, the precise materials of which the natural article is composed, namely, tribasic phosphate of lime, calcium manely, tribasic phosphate of lime, calcium carbonate, magnesia, alumina, gelatine, and albumen. In carrying out this process quicklime is first treated with sufficient water to convert it into the hydrate, but prior to its becoming completely hydrated, or slaked, an aqueous solution of phrosphoric acid is poured upon it, and, while the mixture is being stirred, the calcium carbonate, magnesia and alumina are incorporated in small quantities at a time—the gelatine and albumen, dissolved in water, being finally added; the chief point being to obtain a compost sufficiently pisstic and as intimately mixed as possible. After being set aside to allow the phosphoric acid to complete its action upon the chalk for a day, the mixture, while still plastic, is pressed into the desired form in moulds, and dried in a current of air at a temperature of about 150 dagress continged. pressed into the desired form in moulds and dried in a current of air at a temper ature of about 150 degrees centigrade. In three or four weeks it becomes hard. The proportions of the ingredients are 100 parts quicklime, 300 parts water, 75 parts phosphoric acid solution, 16 parts calcium carbonate, 1 or 2 parts magnesia, 5 parts precipitated alumina, and 15 parts gelatine. For the composition of the board, as above, we are not responsible; it was not of our seeking. It was the action of the annual meeting on nomination of the board of the previous year. There is an excess of Methodist laymen on the general committee which we have expressed our readiness to remedy at once by the acceptance of the names and services of any reasonable number of additional representatives from of the names and services of any reasonable number of additional representatives from the other churches. We are willing also to limit the ministerial representation on the board to the pastors in the active work. The board proposed for the current year is constituted as follows: 16 Anglicans, 13 Presbyterians, 18 Methodists, 2 Congregrationalists and 5 Eaptists. This makes a board of 56 persons, and as there are but six regular meetings in the year, we think six regular meetings in the year, we think six regular meetings in the year, we think it not overly large. If the board were constituted merely for business efficiency we think that a committee of 3 or 5 would we think that a committee of 3 or 5 would best serve the purpose, but as it is constituted to be representative of an important common Christian interest, we think it should not be reduced.

Concerning the election of depositary, dear brethren, we make the following statement: At the time of the election the choice, was between Messer.

choice was between Messrs. choice was between Messrs. McEwen (Presbyterian), Softly (Anglican), Orme (Methodist), and one other. After the second ballot the choice remained between Mr. Softly and Mr. Orme. We cast our votes on that occasion under an honest conviction of the suitability of Mr. Orme, especially as he had a daughter with a business education suitable to qualify her for work in the depository when the agent might be away.

THE AMERICAN METHODISTS.

Several Things the Conference Did Not Do.

Election of Official Editors-Debate on the Itinerancy Question.

OMAHA, Neb., May 19 .- There is to be OMAINA, Neb., May 19.—There is to be no limitation of the tenure of the episcopacy by the Methodist General Conference, no districting of the bishops, no man elected to the episcopal office on the sole ground of color, and no new bishops of any description, excepting, possibly, at the last moment, a missionary bishop for Europe. There were many who said that the episcopacy would emerge from this conference with its wings badly clipped. So far, however, it has not lost a feather, but, if anything, it has gained both in dignity and strength.

Yesterday a resolution was passed expressing the satisfaction of the conference at the presence of the fraternal delegates from the Methodist Episcopal Church south and the Independent Methodist Churches, expressing hope that in the near future all branches of the great Methodist Church would become one body in the Lord.

Jesse L. Hurlburt was elected secretary of the Sunday School and Tract Society, Or. J. W. Mendenhall editor of the Methodist Review, and Dr. James Monroe Buckley, editor of the New York Christian Advecate, all by acclamation.

There was a debate on the report of the Itinerancy Committee, proposing to strike out that section in the discipline providing for the five-year limit on the pastorate and to allow the bishops the option of sending a minister back to the same place year attryear, if expedient. Dr. Arthur Edwards, of Chicago, editor of the Northwestern Christian Advocate, favored abolishing the five-year limit. It was held, he said, by some that this would abolish itinerancy. It would do no such thing. Every pastorate would close at once at the end of every year just as they do now. This would simply give the bishops and presiding simply give the bishops and presiding would close at once at the end of every year just as they do now. This would simply give the bishops and presiding ciders power to keep men in these places where they could be of the greatest benefit to the church, and it would entirely remove the apparent claim of the pastors upon the right to be kept in the same place for five years.

Rev. Ackerman, of Tennessee, made some pretty lively thrusts at the presiding elders and the bishops. The speaker created a good deal of merriment. The conference guved him, crying "louder" when he was yelling at the top of his voice.

A minority report from the committee

A minority report from the committee was presented opposing the abolishing of the present limit, five years.

Dr. Caswell, of Southern Callifornia, held that the needs of the church and the judgment of the bishops and presiding elders should decide upon the appointments and almanaes. 
