

AUSTRIA RUSHES TROOPS TO FRONT

Railways Monopolized By Thousands of Men Pouring to Border.

[Canadian Press.] Berlin, July 28 .- Reports from the Austrian border today state, that the transport of the Eighth and Ninth Austrian army corps from

toward the Servian frontier began yesterday, and that there was no other traffic on the Bohemian railroads except troop The two army corps of Bohemia consist of 32 battalions of infantry with a large number of quick-firing machine guns, six regiments of cavalry, two regiments of field artillery and two regiments

of the army service corps. Telegraph Demoralized.

Telegraphic communication with Marienbad and Carlstad was still open today, but only by one direct line from the Saxon frontier. The telegraphic service between Berlin and Vienna was demoralized.

The Militaer-Wochenblatt, the official military weekly newspaper, today prints a noteworthy article comparing the Austro-Hungarian and Russian armies, to the disadvantage of the latter. It says the fighting strength of the Russian army is usually overestimated, and that numbers alone are not decisive. More important factors, it points out, are morale, higher leadership and armament.





THREE CHEERS FOR WAR GERMANY AND AUSTRIA CAUSE GREAT CONFLICT

Their Brutal Refusal to Mediate With Smaller Nation Plunges Europe Into War---Every Nation Is Preparing Its Weapons.

London, July 28.—Announcement of the declaration of war by Austria-Hungary on Servia came today almost immediately after Germany and Austria had notified Sir Edward Grey, the British foreign secretary, of their refusal to join in a mediation conference.

It is assumed here that the efforts of the European nations will now be directed toward localizing the area of hostilities.

THE DUBLIN RIOT.

THE conflict between the mob and the military in Dublin is not only an unfortunate occurrence in itself, but it will have a bad effect by intensifying the bitterness in Ireland, and rendering a peaceful settlement more difficult. Hitherto the Nationalists have behaved with moderation, in striking contrast to the bluster of Ulster. The avowed threats of rebellion, supplemented by the importing of arms and the drilling of men has been for a long time a marked feature of the agitation in the northern province. Throughout the remainder of Ireland there was perfect quiet. When at last the Nationalists undertook to imitate Ulster, and formed to the Bible. And yet she appears to a volunteer force, the movement was discountenanced by their leaders, and it was only after considerable hesitation that Mr. Redmond and his colleagues gave it their sanction. Gun running is illegal in the North as well as in the South, and the Government has ostensibly tried to prevent it. But in the North it seems to have been very sucunfortunately, there has been bloodshed. A heavy burden of responsibility rests

on those who for political reasons have encouraged armed rebellion against the state. It is quite possible their original intent was simply to trighten the Gov-

ernment, and perhaps encompass its defeat. But they undertook to play with dangerous weapons. Whatever the leaders and the Tory Opposition in the British parliament may have intended, the general populace of cities like Belfast are doubtless in earnest. And, if they may sincerely believe in their right to resort to arms, then the Nationalists are not to be blamed, if they learn the lesson taught by Carson and

It all adds seriously to the troubles of the Government, especially, in view of the complications in southeastern Europe, which may start a continental war. And it renders the peaceful settlement of the Irish question more difficult than ever. One is inclined to speculate, whether more prompt and energetic action on the part of Mr. Asquith to crush out the first outbreak of rebellion by treating as traitors to the country the men who were advocating armed resistance, might not have been the wiser plan. But of that it is hard to judge. The evident desire of the premier and his colleagues was to use the most peaceful and lenient measures, and trust to the common sense of the people. Whatever the result may be, their intentions were certainly both Christian and patriotic.

MR. BOURASSA ON ULSTER.

TN a considerable letter, recently I published by the London Times, Mr. Henri Bourassa takes ground against the Ulsterite faction. He asks whether "the law of popular will and majority rule" is to be allowed by the aristocracy, and its toadles to "prevail only in favor of English and Protestant majorities." And "is it to be understood that officers of the army and navy are to decide when they shall or shall not obey the supreme authority of the State?"
