### NITRO-GLYCERIN MAGAZINE EXPLODES AT PETROLEA

Big Plant Completely Wrecked Early This Morning And Oil Town Given Bad Scare.

HEAVY PROPERTY DAMAGE, BUT NO LIVES LOST

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Petrolea, Oct. 17 .- Citizens of Petrolea and vicinity were awakened about 4 o'clock this morning by a terrific detonation and it was soon learned that the magazine on the property of the Petrolea Torpedo Company had exploded. The magazine was located on the 12th line about two miles north of ine town, but so powerful was the concussion that plate glass and other windows were shattered all over the town and also in Wyoming, a village five miles north of the scene of the explosion.

The magazine where the explosion occurred was built of concrete and brick. It contained about three to four hundred quarts of nitro-glycerin and the force of the explosion scooped out a hole in the ground fully twenty feet deep. The building was entirely demolished, not a piece of either concrete or brick larger than a man's hand being found. The factory was situated some fifty yards north and west of the magazine, and is nothing but a pile of kindling wood. There are several residences in the vicinity of the explosion and none are left with a whole window. Doors were torn off their hinges and walls moved, but fortunately no person was seriously hurt, A young lad named Glass was cut about the face with glass, a window being blown into the bed in which he was sleeping. The Glass home was practic-

CAUSE A MYSTERY.

The cause of the explosion cannot be learned. The owners of the property claim they have not been manufacturing glycerin since May last. Some of their employes were working around the magazine yesterday morning, but left the premises at 11:30 and no one was near it since, to their knowledge. A rumor is current that too great heat was the cause, but this cannot be verified. The damage cannot be estimated yet. At the property, the plant is a complete wreck and a total loss. The damage to the various residences in the vicinity will run up into the thousands, one man alone having fully a thousand dollars damage done to his barn and pumping station. In Petrolea also ,and in Wyoming, the chief damage is from broken glass.

Petrolea, Oct. 17 .- The plant of the Petrolea Glycerin Works was completely destroyed at 4 o'clock this morning by the explosion of 400 quarts

Fortunately, because of the early hour, there was nobody about the premises, and, as the factory is situated at an isolated spot, two miles outside the town, there has been no loss of life connected with the disaster.

The shock was a terrific one, dozens of plate-glass windows in Petrolea were shattered, while everything breakable in residences within a half mile of the spot was reduced to atoms. Of the building there is scarcely a board or brick left, while beneath is a hole in the ground ten feet deep and

The loss has not yet been ascertained. The plant is controlled by

"There is nothing new in the probhistory of the Christian church when this was not its greatest problem. As now, so always, there has been amongst men the struggle for existence, the race for gold, and class antagonisms, which have stood in the way of the church; and the peculiarity of the situation is that while we believe that Christianity, and Christianity only, can meet and overcome these great problems, yet Christianity and the church cannot set themselves directly to the solution of these problems, but must content themselves with operating indirectly against opposing forces. Our Lord found himself surrounded by the most adverse social conditions, and the apostles worked amidst similar conditions. but they inaugurated no crusade against the social and political institutions of their day. They found the rich and the poor pitted against each other, and designing men fattening upon the spoils of the simple, but they refused to take any part, directly or indirectly, in the great labor and capital struggles of the day. Christ himself refused to pass judgment upon the legality or justice of the tribute Rome demanded of the Jewish people. The Apostle Paul was never known as a political or social agitator, and the general fact corresponding to these statements is that while nearly all the great social and political reforms of the world have been the outcome of Christianity, they have been the indirect results of its ministry, and not the primary object towards which its energies have been directed. Christianity strikes at the root of all such evils, by aiming at the regeneration of the

The Gospel and Class. "The Gospel, or Christianity, or the church can never be the champion of a class. 

### DOOMED TO DIE FOR KILLING SQUAW

Chief of Tribe Tried in Far North for Crime Incited by Devil Worship.

Selkirk, Man., Oct. 16 .- Commisoner Perry, R.N.-W.P.M., and his party arrived here tonight after an absence of a fortnight. The commissioner sat as judge with special powers which had been agitating the far north for the past few years. Chief Fiddler, or Pa-cje-quan, credited with 26 murders in as many years, committed suicide at the police barracks by leftly strangling himself with his waistband a few days before the head of the police arrived at Norway House hold his trial However hi rother, Joseph, Pa-cie-quan, the secand high priest of the awful cult. was irraigned, and on his arraignment pleaded guilty the morning after the commissioner's arrival at the ancient Hudson's Bay post. The trial of Joseph occupied thirteen hours and at its conclusion he was found guilty by the special jury of six, and condemned to death by hanging on January 7, 1908, at the police barracks at Norway House. On account of the remoteness of the prisoner's tribe from the habitation of the white man, and his consequent ignorance of the white man's laws a recommendation for mercy was added to the verdict. The most sensational evidence was that given by two Indian youtns, mere boys, who had married
