Country Districts Offset Adverse Majority of 16,000 Polled in Cities, Triumphing With 3,000 Votes to the Good.

in this city and Oakland, the voters of country districts have given victory to the cause of woman suffrage by a margin of something more than 1,000. With returns missing from 400 precincts, suffrage has a majority of about 1,500, which is growing steadily as the figures come in.

The result came as a big surprise, as the early returns indicated that suffrage was badly beaten and the majority was placed at 5,000 last night. Then came returns from the country. Nearly every agricultural county was sarried by the women, and although the majorities were not large, they selled up a total vote that wiped the unit-suffrage majority out in the city.

Unquestionably the strongest element in this city in opposition to suffrage was the saloon. In the country, granges and other farmers organizations indozed suffrage, and much to the surprise of the politicians the farmers went to the polis.

Instead of the light vote that was expected the vote in the country was heavier than in the city.

## EGGS AND POULTRY IN CHINESE EMPIRE

or geese—and certainly a large number of eggs.

For considerable portions of the population poultry is the only animal food used, and for the more well-to-do-classes it is an ordinary meat diet the year around. Ducks are pickled, dried tinned and otherwise preserved, and shipped to many parts of the world to Chinese who are away from a home supply. Eggs of all kinds are used fresh and are cured by burying in clay and lime until they acquire something of the quality of cheese, and are a great Chinese luxury.

There are few families in China, even in the larger cities, that do not have at least some chickens. Near the ports open to foreign trade there are a few rather good-sized poultry farms as a rule.

There are rejected in immense numbers.

Ducks are raised in immense numbers on farms along the canals and rivers of Central and South China, and are much more common than chickens. One of the customary sights along the Grand Canal in Mid-China, for example, is that of a Chinese duck farmer in his boat watching his flock feed in and along the canal. The ducks are trained to obey him, and, armed with a long bamboo pole to guide them, he controls their movements and takes them back to shelter for the night.

The surplus of poultry and poutry products which China can export annually is immense. Up to the present exportation has taken the form largely of egg products, mostly dried albumen and yolks. The trade in eggs and egg products is rapidly increasing, as may be seen from the fact that the exports of egg albumen and yolks in 1908 were valued at \$483,038 gold, and the shipments of fresh and preserved eggs at valued at \$463,038 gold, and the shipments of fresh and preserved eggs at \$1,234,785 gold, while in 1999 the values were \$818,829 and \$1,529,685 respectively. During the last year several cargoes of Chinese meat and game products were sent to the United Kingdom with great success, and in these shipments were included poultry and eggs. The quantities of poultry thus exported, however, cannot be given with any degree of accuracy, since the returns include such products under the general term of "provisions". Celestial Empire For Hundreds of Years Supreme in Production.

For hundreds of years China was the greatest poultry-raising nation in the world, and probably this is true today, not only as regards the total production, but also in per capita use.

Of the more than 300,000,000 population of China shown by the last census there are few indeed who do not in the course of a year consume something in the way of poultry-chickens or ducks or geese—and certainly a large number of eggs.

For considerable portions of the population poultry is the only animal food used, and for the more well-to-d classes it is an ordinary meat diet the year around. # PASTOR BIGAMIST SOLEMN TRIFLER

The Chinese gunboats are anchoring off the foreign concessions for their own safety.

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





The third son and seventh child of Queen Victoria, the Duke of Con-naught was born at Buckingham Pal-ace in 1850. On leaving Woolwich Academy in 1868 he entered the Royal Engineers, and subsequently transferred to the Royal Regiment of Artillery, and, later, to the Rifle Brigade, of which he is Colonel-in-Chief. As a subaltern, he served in Canada during subaltern, he served in Canada during the Fenian Raid of 1870. He was created Duke of Connaught and Strathearn in 1874. Five years later he married Princess Louis Marguerite of Prussia. In the Egyptian War of 1882 he commanded the Brigade of Guards at Tel-el-Kebir. From 1886 to 1890 he commanded the troops in Bombay, and he has since held the Portsmouth and Afdershot commands, and that of the Forces in Ireland. In 1904 he became the first Inspector-General of the Forces, and in 1908 he was appointed to the Mediterranean command, which, it will be remembered he resigned. 

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# WATER SUPPLY DECLARED PURE

Board of Health Desire to Assure the People On This Point.

## NO TYPHOID FEVER GERMS

Contamination in Two Ponds Was Not of This Type-Ponds May Be Better Protected.

The report of the provincial analyst, Dr. J. A. Amyot, on the water supply was discussed at some length at special meeting of the board of health held Thursday afternoon. The members expressed themselves as being confident that the water of the city of London was as nearly pure as possible, and that there was no cause for alarm whatever.

Mayor Beattie reported that the analyses had been shown him, and as a precautionary measure, he had in-structed Superintendent Glaubitz to close two ponds at Springbank. This had been done.

had been done,
"The impression has been given that
the colon bacilli discovered were typhold fever germs," said Mayor Beattie, "This is distinctly not the case.
There is nothing to show in the report
that there are typhold germs in the
water."

No Cause For Alarm.
Dr. Hutchinson and Dr. Williams
corroborated this statement, and de-lared that so far as they could see. here was no cause for alarm, Superintendent Glaubitz said that h had a conversation over the telephone with Dr. Amyot, of Toronto, who stated that there was no reason to b alarmed at the water supply. There were colon bacilli present, but in such were colon bacilli present, but in such small quantities as to be practically negligible. Samples of water were being taken from the sources of supply both to the Colville and pump-house ponds in order to discover if possible the source of infection.

"There is no danger, and the people should be told so," said Mr. Glaubitz. "There were no typhoid fever germs in the water, and I want that understood."

Mr. John Graham asked if a cemen wall about the ponds now closed would not protect them from any sur-face drainage. Mr. Glaubitz thought that the suggestion would be proper, but he did not consider it necessary to go to the expense of building a cement wall. A clay bank would serve
