





The municipality is not required to levy the tax. It merely has the power to do so, and London has chosen to exercise this power. London motorists will exert all their powers to bring about a repeal, as they think it is an injustice to be compelled to pay both a provincial and municipal tax.

Opposition to the tax this year has caused payment to be very slow, so that with only three months of the year remaining only about 2,200 licenses have been taken out, in comparison with the 3,000 sold last year. Some of the offenders have been brought into court, but the prosecution has not been at all general or vigorous, which many persons feel it must be if the remainder of the tax is to be collected by the end of the year. 





Former Attache of Peace Mission Testifies Before Committee.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Sept. 12 .-Villiam C. Bulwitt of Philadelphia attached to the American mission, testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that United States Secretary of State Lansing told him in Paris last May that "if the Senate and the American people knew what the treaty meant it would be de-feated."

"Mr. Lansing told me the day I re-

the treaty meant it would be defeated."

"Mr. Lansing told me the day I resigned," the witness said, "that he was opposed to that part of the league covenant relating to a mandate for Armenia. He said he considered the Shantung award and the league of nations bad—that the league would be entirely useless; that the nations had arranged the world to suit themselves and that Great Britain and France got what they wanted.

"After saying he believed the Senate would defeat the treaty if it realized its meaning, Mr. Lansing expressed the opinion that Senator Knox really would understand the treaty; that Mr. Lodge would, but that Mr. Lodge's position would become purely political."

The committee senators burst into a round of laughter, and Bulwitt said he begged to be excused from reading any more from the memorandum of his conversations.

VETERANS SATISFIED WITH PROMISE OF A SPECIAL COMMITTEE

Will Now Turn Attention To Getting Evidence To Submit.

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.-Great War

Veterans' Assocaition officials in Ottawa feel that their request for a commission has been adequately met by the statement made in the House today by the Hon, N. W. Rowell, when today by the Hon. N. W. Rowell, when the president of the privy council stated that a special parliamentary committee would be forged to deal with the whole matter and make recommendations to Parliament.

C. G. MacNeill, Dominion secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association, said that the members of the special committee now in Ottawa to represent the association in this matter "consider Mr. Rowell's statement a satisfactory reply in so far as the appointment of a commission is concerned."

Mr. MacNeill said that all Great War Veterans' Association commands had been advised to that effect by telegraph and the members of the committee would now turn their attention to getting together all the evidence, which will be placed before the special committee of the House in its sittings. In reference to Mr. Rowell's statement as to what Canada had done for her returned soldiers, Mr. MacNeill emphasized that it was admitted by the Great War Veterans' Association that Canada had been exceedingly generous in her treatment of her war veterans, but there were still some deficiencies and inequalities which required remedies, and to remove these inequalities as the aim of the Great War Veterans' Association officials in their present demands. These remedies could be found at comparatively little expense, Mr. MacNeill said, and their application would have a great effect on the feelings of the returned men throughout the Dominion.

Green; forests, waterways and water powers, R. J. Manion; official report of debates, R. L. Richardson; library, Hon. E. N. Rhodes.

There are only two changes from last year. Mr. Cockshutt succeeds Sir Herbert Ames as chairman of the committee on banking and commerce and E. K. Spinney replaces Hon. W. S. Fielding on marine and fisheries.

SUPPOSED DROWNING VICTIMS PICKED UP BY LAKE STEAMSHIP

TORONTO, Sept. 12.—Eight young persons started out from the foot of Morley avenue, this city, to Scarborough Bluffs in a motorboat last evening for the purpose of holding a corn roast on the bluffs, and were missing last night and all day today. Fears were entertained that they had all been drowned in Lake Ontario, but tonight word came from St. Catharines to the effect that the party had been picked up this evening by the steamer Dalhousie City ten miles off Port Dalhousie. There were four young women and four men in the drifting motorboat, very much exhausted from the long exposure and lack of food, and more or less drenched, but shortly after having been rescued they appeared to have completely recovered.



The Peace Treaty Approved

Without knowing to what the country ha been committed the House of Commons has approved the peace treaty with Germany. The Liberals fought for light on the question and the most they got was a statement from Hon. C. J. Doherty to the effect that the council of the League of Nations could not order the expenditure of a single dollar or the enlistment for war of one Canadian soldier without the sanction of the Parliament of Canada. While there is no reason to doubt the accuracy of this statement, it would have been infinitely more satisfactory if Sir Robert Borden had taken the House into his confidence and told the members just what had been done. Correspondence on this point was asked for, but the House was informed that there was no correspondence. Vague statements were made to the effect that Canada had reached the status of nationhood and that an imperial conference would be held at an early date to determine what that status was. In direct contradiction of this and also in direct contradiction of Hon. Mr. Doherty's stafement the Government members voted down an amendment offered by Hon. W. S. Fielding as follows: "That in giving such approval the House in no way assents to any impairment of the existing autonomous authority of the Dominion, but declares that the decision of what part, if any, the forces of Canada shall take in the war, actual or threatened, is one to be determined at all times, as occasion may require, by the people of Canada through their representatives in Parliament."

The Liberals did not seek to block the ratification of the treaty. Their efforts were directed entirely toward finding out what the treaty meant, and for this they have had to run the usual gamut of abuse from their opponents. They learned from Government statements that the autonomy of Canada would not be impaired and from Government votes that it would, and the country has learned from long experience that votes speak louder than words.

Nor has it yet been explained why it was necessary to hold an extra session of parliament at an approximate expense of one million dollars to ratify the treaty. Mr. Fielding characterized the pretense that Canada must approve it as "arrant humbug." If Canada were an independent nation in the full sense of the words the necessity for ratification would be apparent, but in spite of all that has been said by the Government members Canada is not independent and never will be so long as the present British Empire exists. No more definite evidence of Canada's position is required than the clause of the peace treaty itself which specifies the parties to it as follows:

States of America, by:

India follow in the same way. India, which has very little to do with the management of her own affairs, ranks the same as Canada. In spite of all the camouflage of Sir Robert Borden and his associates, for a purpose still to

be disclosed, His Majesty the King and Emperor was the party to the treaty for the entire British Empire, and his ratification was sufficient for the Empire.

Larger Fair Grounds

The Western Fair directors have a difficult problem on their hands in seeking to provide ad ditional room for the exhibition. They must strike a balance between economy and efficiency, which is none too easy at any time, and is particularly hard at present. By adding seventeen acres, which is practically all bonded, to the east of the present park they will be able to turn around in a year and have so much extra room for the 1920 fair. They will dispossess one hundred families for whom accommodation must be found elsewhere. Director McCormick estimates that the cost of this acquisition would be about \$225,000, added to which would probably be the cost of one hundred building lots elsewhere and the removal of the houses

The advantages of this plan lie in the fact that the present fair buildings could be used, and the other necessary buildings could be erected so that the enlarged grounds would be available complete for next year. McDiarmid, in announcing the suspension, stated that it was due to the enormous increase unable longer to face the heavy bills which are the lot of every newspaper. The price of newsprint has practically doubled in two years bound to look out for her. print has practically doubled in two years, wages have doubled in many cases and other items entering into the cost of the business have gone up in price from 100 to 300 per cent.

Publishers faced with these rising costs have not increased the price of their product in proportion, and as a result many of them have had to go out of business. Many other papers are liable to meet the same fate unless an adjustment in prices is made. A metropolitan daily should not sell for less than \$10 a year, yet most of them are selling for \$4 or even less. The advertising rates in most cases are 50 per cent. below what they should be. At the low rates prevailing publishers are able to pay expenses only by giving up the greater part of their space to advertising, which at one time was regarded an edifice. as a mere side issue. It is not in the best interests of the country to reduce the number of papers to a minimum, but this is what the country is facing unless costs can be lowered or revenue greatly increased.





Toronto Dealers Warned That a \$1 Reduction Barrel Must Be Made.

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 12 .- A warning against further profiteering by Toronto retail dealers in flour has been issued by the Canadian wheat board. This warning is given in a statement handed to the Canadian Press, Limited, this evening, which is by way of reply to a statement made in a public meeting of the Canadian wheat board in this city that the board had permitted an increase in the price of flour.



As for any impropriety or misconduct on the part of the minister of justice in regard to his son, Marcus Doherty, any thought of that had been publicly disclaimed by the men formulating the charges.

With this also Mr. Justice Middleton agreed.

Passing Incident.

Mr. Justice Middleton said that the finding could be delivered at once and the evidence attached to it later.

Sir Sam Hughes and Mr. Ferguson protested against this, as the warrant of appointment stated that the evidence and the finding should be delivered together.

Mr. Justice Middleton said that in that case it would take several weeks.

DUBLIN, Sept. 12.-Following closely opening of the October term. A few months after his graduation he was elected circuit court commissioner on the Republican ticket, and held this office for four years. In 1880 he was elected prosecuting attorney of Ingham County, and held this office for two terms. From 1895 to 1896 he was city attorney of Lansing, and two years later was elected mayor of the city, and office which he held for two years.

When the state board of law examiners was created in 1895 he was appointed a member of this board, and held the office until he became a member of the supreme court. At the Republical state convention in Lansing last spring Justice Ostrander was renominated without opposition and was re-elected in April for a term of eight years. His new term would have begun January 1, 1920.

The vacancy on the bench caused by his death will be filled by appointment by Governor Sleeper.





McGuire and W. R. Redden experimented with 151 patients on a serum from convalescents, and, with only six resultant deaths, found that the serum greatly reduced mortality and shortened the course of the disease. Whether the recurrence of the "flu" is to prove as generally fatal as it did when it first raised its head a year ago, depends almost entirely on the progress the country's medical men can make in the perfection of a serum to fight the disease, and practicing physicians are greatly encouraged in this connection by what has been done by experts in the big medical schools.

The uncertainty as to the nature of the infection, the varied character of the effects found in the lungs of different patients, and the mutiplicity of the various complicating organisms which invade the lungs when weakened by the influenza, have combined to make extremely difficult the task of finding a serum, but recent experiments by prominent members of the staff of the Harvard Medical School indicate that science will face a new epidemic with a far greater hope of success than before.


