



Liligation Atling Out of Risk Taken on Third Contingent.

Ottawa, May 4 .- The case of the Provident Life Assurance Society vs. Bellew was heard by the supreme court yesterday. Bellew was a Dr. Agnew's Catarrhal Powder a of the Blood general insurance agent who procured applications for insurance from 235 members of the third contingent sent from Canada to South Africa, 1902. The Provident Society had agreed to insure a minimum of 200 and accepted these risks on payment of a war premium of \$25 on a thousand. The company would not issue the policies until the premiums were paid, and Bellew borrowed money from a bank on security of an indorsed note and of assignments of pay by the insured and paid the company less his com-mission, and the insured got their policies. The war was ended when the contingent arrived in South Africa, and Bellew, not being able to collect the war premium from the department of militia, brought action to recover insured were about to engage in war, which they never did, so the consideration failed. France's dream of empire in the new world was shattered on the Plains of Abraham. Her sale of Louisiana to the United States in 1803, which was virtually a surrender, followed as a matter of necessity, though sorely against Napoleon's will. He had visions of restoring French colonial power and shifted his designs from America to the Orient. His invasion of Egypt was intended to be a step toward the conquest of India, from which France had been driven by England, as from the northern half

of this continent. Shut out of Asia and America, France turned toward Africa. Her great chance came with the conquest of Algeria in 1833. Since then she has been steadily carving out a great colonial domain in the dark continent and has secured a lodgment in Indo-China, where her sway extends over an area of nearly 200,000 square miles. The collision of France and Britain in North America and India in the eighteenth century was transferred to Africa in the nineteenth. Egypt has been a bone of contention for twenty years, and the Fashoda incident brought the two nations to the verge of war. In their scramble for territory, they have jostled each other in the Sudan, in Nigeria, in Gambia, and in all parts of northern and middle Africa.

The partition of Africa among the European powers is now almost comto France and Great Britain, and their boundaries meet everywhere north of the equator. 




