

After many futile attempts to obtain congressional grants in 1852 the Federal Government gave Michigan 750,000 acres of land to aid in constructing the canal.

A corporation organized under a New York charter, began work on June 2, 1853, and in twenty-two months constructed a canal with two locks, each 350 feet in length, 100 feet in width, and 13 feet in depth (the largest in the world), at a cost of \$999,802 45. The engineer and superintendent of this great work was Charles T. Harvey, chief marshal of the semi-centennial celebration. The St. Mary's canal remained under state control until 1881, when it was transferred to the federal authorities, and in September of that year a second lock, known as the Weitzel lock, and constructed by the United States at a cost of \$2,180,000, was

pened. This lock is 515 feet long, 80 feet wide, and with a depth of 16 feet over the miter sill. The original lock was n existence until 1886, when the Gov ernment began the construction of the oe Lock, 800 feet long and 100 feet wide, with a depth of 21 feet. 

## A Blow at the Pulp Industry.

A ruling by the United States treasury department, if sustained by the courts, will injure our flourishing export trade in wood pulp. This ruling is that a retaliatory duty, over and above the regular duty, shall be imposed upon Canadian pulp, because the Frovince of Quebec allows a rebate of age a secret. 25 cents per cord in the stumpage dues upon all pulp wood which is converted into pulp within the province. This is held by the United States treasury department to warrant the application of the clause in the Dingley Act which the executive to collect an extra.




