STORAGE OF EGGS

Interesting Experiment Succe fully Tried by a Leith Firm.

The Hen Fruit was Sealed up in a Pat ent Apparatus and Four Months
After Very Few Were Unfit for Use.

An interesting experiment in egg storage was recently brought to a successful conclusion in the warehouse of Messrs. Christianson of Bernard street, Leith. In Jine a batch of 50,000 Scottish, Irish and Danish eggs were scaled up in patent storage apparatus, and were opened and examilar proportion of the eggs being found unfit for use. The secret of the method is to keep the eggs cool, to allow free access of air around each egg—to keep them upright in position, and to turn them periodically so that the yolk of the egg is constantly embedded in the albumen. These desiderats are brought about by placing the eggs in frames, which by the action of a lever can be turned over in half a minute, without risk of breakage. ORIGIN OF NONSENSE.

As a literary form, manufactured or intentional, nonsense is a comparatively recent art iff English. The French in the seventeenth-century began the cultivation of a form of verse which they called amphigouri and which in the eighteenth grew into extraordinary popularity. An amphigouri was a bit of rhyme without reason, a meaningless rigmarole in verse. It was not until our own age, however, that nonsense literature was brought to perfection by Lewis Carroll and Edmund Lear, who still hold their ground against all imitators. It was in 1846 that Edmund Lear commenced the publication of those famous little five line nonsense verses which made his first fame.

The form was not original with him. Mr. Lear himself, in the preface of his sthird book, where he laughs at "the persistently absurd report" that the Earl of Derby was the author of the first "Book of Norsense," is careful to acknowledge his indebtedness to certain nursery rhymes beginning, "There' was an old man of Tobago," which were suggested to him by a valued friend as a form of yeige lending. 

Juring colonial times a greater part of the county names adopted were those of British shires and localities and of members of the English royal family. Thus all of the original 13 states have their Cumberlands. Montgomerys, Somersets and the like, and the whole nomenclature of Massachusetts, Connecticut and some other states is composed of English geographical names. Virginia and Maryland in the south adopted more extensively than the northern colonies the custom of naming counties after princes and rulers for whom the Puritans ever had but little love. Thus Virginia has not only a King and Queen county, but King George, King William, Prince Edward, Prince George, Prince William and Princess Anne besides. In Maryland counties there are found thus remembered Prince George and Queen Anne.

With the murder of his grandmother, Caroline Pearson, Robert Pearson's mother, it was different. Harvey insists that Robert killed her for taking his part in a petty quarrel on the might of the midrer and that he killed Robert. The jury found that Harvey himself killed his grandmother.

The tastimony of ail of the witnesses, except two, was simply a recital of what everytoly in town knew and what had been printed in the newsparers about the murders. The two are Mrs. Clera Stoughton and Mrs. Hillagar, who were at the Loudenslager house, watching over the body of Mrs. Laudenslager, who died Wednesday morning. Mrs. Laudenslager was Mrs. Harvey's mother. The Harveys were to have taken her bofy to Otesgo Thursday morning on a strain for burial.
