Something is brewing here against England. The Cardinals will not overlook the insuits heeped upon the Pepe and Romanism since the appointment of Cardinal Wiseman. The opposition to the chapel has been very strong, and Cardinal Antonelli has been beset on all sides to suppress it, but as far in vain. The arrival of such an enthusiastic defender of religious liberty as Bishop Hughes, ought certainly to put a stop to this classor against it. We shall see.—Extract from the Correspondence of a New York paper.

It strikes us that the Cardinals will do nothing half so stupid as to meddle in any way with English visitors, and so draw down Lord Palmerston's wrath; and a visitation from a British squadron. As for the Austrians, they are so situated topographically, that they could not re-taliate upon England, nor interfere with any of her proceedings, while they themselves are more open to English attack than any nation on the Continent. A dozen frigutes, after having demolished the half dozen cock-boats, which Austria calls a navy, could blockade every por in her possession, and gut a compl stop to her commerce. The present Government of France is not at all inclined to quarrel with England, no mind to go to war; if England intends to bring the Romish Government to its enses, should it presume to exercise any tyranny towards British subjects, she will do it by a blockade of all the ports in the Papal States, and a very small force will be sufficient for this purpose
