



HALIFAX, Sept. 28—A Royal Gazet-te extra, issued today contains a pro-clamation bringing section of the new provincial roads act into effect or

The proclamation says: "The provisions of this act relating to the collection of the provincial high-way fund, the organization of the board, the power to make any appointment rules or regulations, fo give notices, prescribe forms or do any other thing deemed necessary for the heider of med necessary fo rthe bringing of the act into operation, shall become effective on from and after a day to be named in a proclamation by the governor-in-council; such sections and acts shall respectively become and re-main in force or be repealed accord-ing to the tenor of such proclamation; Ing to the tenor of such proclamation, the remaining provisions of this act shall become effective on from and after a day to be named in any subse-quent proclamation by the govenor-in-council.





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



Proclamation will announce the day

A proclamation will issue calling out the bachelors and widowers referred to and fixing a day on or before which every man must report for service to the military authorities unless he has before that day made an application for exemption.

How to apply for exemption

Applications for exerting them to be made by written notice on forms which will be available at every post office, and will be transmitted free of postage. They will not, however, be required to be made in this way, but may be presented by the applicants in person to the exemption tribunal. The cases of those who have given written notice in advance will lake precedence, and appearance in person will therefore be likely to involve considerably more inconvenience and delay to the men conserved, but fit is the recommended that advantage be generally taken of the facilities for written application.

Notice to join the colors

As reinforcements are required, notice to report to the nearest mobil-isation centre will be given from time to time to the men found liable and passed as fir for service. Disobedience of such notice will render the offender liable to punishment, but punishment for failure to report for military service, or to report subsequently for duty when called upon, will be imposed ordinarily by the eivil magistrates; offenders, hewever, will remain liable for the performance of their military dutes notwith-standing any civil punishment which may be imposed and will be liable to military punishment in cases in which civil proceedings are not taken.

Watch for the Proclamation

Notice of the day appointed for the miking of a claim for excemption or for report for military service will be published as widely as possible but, as no personal notice can be given uptil the individuals called out have so reported themselves or claimed exemption, men possibly con-cerned are warned to inform themselves with regard to the day fixed, either anglet may involve the loss by them of important privileges and individually contact the loss by them of important privileges and individually and the second s
