Government statement states a... Sir Geo. Foster... North Toronto this... In simple, telling language he defined the issue in the pending electoral contest. He showed that there would have been no war-time election but for Sir Wilfrid Laurier's course in declining the extension and union government proposals made to him by the Prime Minister.

Sir Robert Borden's only thought in making these offers was to consolidate the country behind the men at the front by abolishing party politics for the duration of the war. In order to facilitate the project of union government Sir George Foster and all his colleagues placed their resignations in the prime minister's hands when it was first broached. These resignations stand today as a proof that the members of the cabinet are still willing to forego their personal and party ambitions in the interests of Canada and of the great cause to which Canada is committed.

Sir Robert Borden has not abandoned the hope of including in his administration representatives of the war liberals. In any event the country will be divided at the polls between the Borden party and the Laurier party; that is to say, between those who are intent upon supporting the Canadians on the firing line and those who are intent upon party politics. All the most patriotic people in the country stand with the prime minister. All the enemies of Canada and the British Empire and the world's democracies look to Sir Wilfrid Laurier. The election will decide whether Canada is to prove worthy of the men who had died for it and who are dying for it in the trenches or to be guilty of the basest desertion with which a democracy can be charged.

WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES IN THE FIELD, September 28—Germany today has 6 800 000 men as "human material" with which to furnish her demand for "a place in the sun." This "man power" that remains out of a total of 14 000,000 men who have figured on German military lists and passed through the hands of Germany's military arbiters. Of 6 800 000, approximately 5 500 000 are actually at the front and 600 000 more are in reserve. The remaining 500 000 constitute one of the greatest tragedies of the war. They are boy soldiers of classes of 1919 and 1920. They constitute the only resources of human material on which Germany has to draw. They must fill up the losses in the German army which, with no major allied offensive in prospect normally total from 70 000 to 80 000 monthly. To date, however the German general staff has not succeeded in imposing on the German people its right to seize these youths before they are 18. Therefore this last drop of potential German manhood cannot pass into the army except in piecemeal lots as the boys attain the age of 18. The figures cited herewith are based upon the highest and most accurate sources of information.

AN APPEAL TO THE WOMEN OF CANADA.

By W. J. Hanna, Food Controller.

Every woman in Canada is required for food service. Our domestic consumption of flour, wheat, beef and bacon must be reduced by 25 per cent. If this is not done by us the armies on the battlefield will be greatly handicapped in their struggle for victory. There must be concerted effort on the part of the Canadian people to release storable food for export.

The women in Canada have met every appeal that has been made to them so splendidly have confidence they will respond to this latest call upon them.

Germany is trying to starve our Mother Country and your boys at the front.

What are you going to do about it?

Ways are before every housewife of the Dominion in which she can help the food situation materially. Some of these are:

- 1—By signing the Food Service Pledge.
- 2—By personal saving of bread and flour in her own home.
- 3—By personal saving of beef and bacon in her own home.
- 4—By using perishable foods. (Save the garden truck which has been produced so abundantly this summer. Preserve, can, dry and store).
- 5—By serving her family more fresh fish instead of beef and bacon.
- 6—By substituting other cereals like cornmeal, buckwheat flour, rice and oatmeal in place of wheat products.
- 7—By carefully seeing that good is not thrown into the garbage can. Every year in this country \$50,000,000 worth of good food is wasted by kitchen carelessness.
- 8—By preaching in her home the good old-fashioned doctrine of the clean plate. Do not let the children waste food at their meals. Do not waste it yourself. Waste is war time is a crime.
- 9—By casting aside the foolish notion that carelessness in serving food with out waste is "stringiness." It is not. It is common sense and a duty to the country.
- 10—By organizing with other women in your community to carry out the regulations suggested by the Food Controller.

... Women of Canada, your work is of vital importance, and the kitchen dress has become a uniform in which you may serve the Empire and humanity even as your men in the King's Uniform. Their service cannot become effective without your help.

Sign the Food Service Pledge. Organize your household for victory.

A CAR OF LIQUOR SEIZED

SYDNEY, C. B., Sept. 28—A freight car, full of liquor valued at some thousands of dollars was seized by Chief McCormack and several police officers this morning the raid being one of the largest off in Sydney in years. The car that contained the liquor was labelled "hey" but one of the police officers discovered a stove wagon transporting a considerable quantity of wet goods from the car early this morning.

German airplanes have won another notable "victory" by attacking open towns in England. They gained no military advantage, but they killed some innocent non-combatants. As the London Daily Telegraph said recently, "the war moves forward to its inevitable conclusion and even the deluded subjects of the Kaiser cannot imagine that such cowardly acts as have been committed by their armies in this country and France will defect the Allies from their purpose, while they will certainly constitute the Germans the pariahs among the people of the world in the long days of peace which will at last dawn."

BIG CONTRACT GIVEN TO CANADA.

New York News Record says: Military contracts is 12,000,000 pairs of woolen gloves to be worn by the United States army and navy, and possibly by the soldiers and sailors of our allies have slipped away from fabric glove manufacturers in the United States and will be filled by Canadian firms.

Glove men this side of the border, who have been figuring on securing a part of these big contracts for many weeks past, are inclined to be reticent about the loss of this great amount of business, but admit it is one misfortune of war and a great American wool famine.

FEAT OF ITALIAN AVIATOR

Carrying twelve passengers in a Capromi triplane. Lieut. Emilio Resnati, the Italian army aviator, attained an altitude of 17,000 feet the other day in Virginia. This was 1,000 feet higher than the previous American record with a single passenger, made by Victor Carleton, an American aviator who was killed several months ago in the fall of his machine and was regarded as a remarkable performance.

New York Maritime Register: A four-masted schooner left Boston recently for a port in the South to load a full cargo of Virginia smoking and chewing tobacco, which she will deliver at French port. This cargo is believed to be the first of its kind ever sent across the Atlantic. The tobacco is intended for the use of the American fighters in France.

WHAT IS THE LONGEST POEM

Which is the longest poem in the world? One generally regards "Paradise Lost" as long and Thompson's "Seasons" and Cowper's "Task." But are short compared with Spencer's "Faerie Queen," which is easily the longest poem in existence, even as it stands and had he attained his object and reached the twenty-fourth book, no other poet would have been in it.

It is only a quarter of the original plan yet it is as long as the Iliad, the Odyssey and the Eneid put together twice as long as Dante's "Divina Commedia," and three times as long as "Paradise Lost" and "Paradise Regained" in one.

The longest novel in the world belongs to Japan. Its author is King Te Bakin.

It was commenced in 1852 and published volume by volume as it came out over a period of fifty years. There are 109 volumes, 104,000 pages, 3,180,000 lines and about 38,000,000 words. A complete copy weighs 180lb.

Shelburne Gazette: Previous to being struck by the train a week ago last Saturday, Mrs. Olive DeChamp was very deaf, in fact it was almost impossible to make her hear any sound at all. Since the accident, strange to say, her hearing has improved considerably.

6,000 attended the first day of the Lunenburg County exhibition on Wednesday at Bridgetown. 260 autos were on the grounds at one time and the fair was the best ever held in the County.

THE "MELLOR"

The following note of the "Mellor Glove" may be interesting to Red Cross workers in Annapolis and throughout Nova Scotia—

Among the ardent workers in the British Red Cross Society of Manchester England is Miss M. L. Mellor, (a first cousin of the Rev. T. C. Mellor, Rector of St. Luke's church, Annapolis Royal) a lady who has given much time and thought to the sailors and mine sweepers and others engaged on war ships guarding and protecting our shores from invasions. Her patriotism and love of country led her to invent a glove, different entirely from anything else used by men in the Watch Dogs of the Empire.

The following different classes of sailor men have asked for and received gloves of the Mellor pattern—mine sweepers, mine layers, oil tank crews, engineers on Government colliers, ammunition ships crews, destroyers crews, battleships crews, and other men who do rough work with machinery. One machinist said, "This is about the only sensible protection for us chaps I have ever seen."

A Red Cross worker said, "I can only say that the gloves have proved the most popular of the many gifts which have been sent us for distribution."

Thousands of pairs have already been sent for the comfort of the sailors. There is a growing demand for them, by the use of them many men are saved from torn hands, blood poisoning and even frost bite. Ordinary gloves though welcome for officers and for men on look-out duty, will not stand sea wear and tear. A Mellor glove being reversible, will stand hard sea service for months.

Urgent appeals are being made for more and yet more for sailor made "Mellors." It would not be surprising if the appeal comes to the various branches of the Red Cross Society throughout Canada.

4000 TURKS CAPTURED

On the northern front in Russia, in the region of Riga, the Russians are keeping up their offensive against the Germans. Following up their attacks of Sunday in which gains of from 800 to 1000 yards were made the Russians again have surged forward and beaten back the enemy for a distance of one mile south of the Kronenberg-Spital-Groundull sector. Quiet still prevails on the eastern front farther south and in Galacia and Roumania. In Mesopotamia the British victory over the Turks at Ramed, west of Bagdad, was greater than at first reported. In addition to capturing the town, nearly 4000 Turks were made prisoners and large number of guns and quantities of war stores captured. Besides heavy casualties were inflicted on the Ottomans. British and French airmen are continuing their raids against German positions behind the lines and the French airmen are carrying on further reprisals against German cities and towns for the bombardment of open French settlements. Large quantities of explosives have been dropped by French airmen on Struttgart, Frankfurt on Main, Coblenz and Treves while in conjunction with British aviators, railway stations, airdromes, munition depots and military encampments have been effectively bombed.

NEW HIGHWAY ACT IN NOVA SCOTIA IN FORCE.

HALIFAX, Sept. 28.—A Royal Gazette extra, issued today contains a proclamation bringing section of the new provincial roads act into effect on October 1. The proclamation says:

"The provisions of this act relating to the collection of the provincial highway fund, the organization of the board, the power to make any appointment rules or regulations, to give notices, prescribe forms or do any other thing deemed necessary for the bringing of the act into operation, shall become effective on from and after a day to be named in a proclamation by the governor-in-council; such sections and acts shall respectively become and remain in force or be repealed according to the tenor of such proclamation; the remaining provisions of this act shall become effective on from and after a day to be named in any subsequent proclamation by the governor-in-council."

FIRST TRAIN OVER QUEBEC BRIDGE ON FRIDAY, OCT. 19.

MONTREAL, Sept' 30.—The first train will cross the new Quebec bridge on Oct. 19 so it is announced here. It is understood that the directors of the Dominion Bridge Company with a number of guests, will attend the opening ceremony.

ENORMOUS WASTAGE OF FOOD

The enormous wastage in food throughout the Dominion is indicated by statistics compiled by the food controller. It is estimated that, owing to carelessness and inefficiency, there is wasted in garbage every year food to the value \$56,000,000 or about \$7.60 per total population. By complete organization and rigid economy it is thought the cost of living can be reduced by five cents per day for each individual.

Counting in the elimination of garbage waste this would mean an annual saving of \$25.55 per head, or a national grand total saving of \$204,400,000 enough to feed an army of one million men a year.

Mr. Ford's friends, however, claim that although the new Ford tractor is an inexpensive machine it will do the work in competition with the more expensive ones. For this reason the demonstration of the machine is being watched with interest.

At Government Experimental Farm.

Mr. Comeau says the tractor will be able to meet the situation of plowing our fruit. But it must be worked with cars fully loaded with manure as soon as possible for the best results.

Officers appointed by and under the direction of the Food Controller have been selected to assist in every detail in marketing and transshipment of our fruit. Mr. H. H. Schaffer, one of the most experienced railway men in the Maritime Provinces has been detailed by the fruit and vegetable committee of the Food Controller's office to assist in shipping and he arrived in Kentville yesterday and will have an office here forwarding to central and western Canada. Mr. Schaffer will work in co-operation with Mr. G. E. McIntosh, traffic officer of the Dominion Fruit Commissioners' Office, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and George Spenser, chief operating officer of the Canadian Railway Commission. Both these men were in Kentville yesterday in consultation with Manager George E. Graham, Mr. Comeau and other railway officials here. They will also interview some of the principal shippers of fruit while in the valley.

While we have not as large a crop as first expected it is a crop that will bring a large amount of money to the valley. Buyers are bidding sharp for the fruit and Chief Inspector Vroom stated yesterday that he believed fully 80 per cent of the fruit outside of that controlled by the Fruit Companies had been sold.

Prices are now ranging higher, being \$3.25 and \$3.00 for No. 1's and No. 2's and \$2.50 per barrel for tree run.

SOMETHING SPECIAL AT KENTVILLE NEXT WEEK

Nova Scotia Farmers will have a splendid opportunity to see the modern light tractors at work at Kentville on October 9th and 10th. Through the efforts of Professor Cumming, Secretary for Agriculture, Henry Ford's new farm tractor which is now attracting so much attention in America, and still more in Great Britain, will be seen at work on this occasion, together with other standard makes. It is estimated that machines to the value of \$30,000.00 were manufactured in the United States during 1917, and a larger number will be produced in 1918. This large production would seem to indicate that the light farm tractor has proven a success in many farming areas. It will be interesting to know how they are adapted to the province of Nova Scotia and it is for this reason that a special effort has been made to let the farmers see these machines for themselves.

The programme at Kentville or addition to the demonstration of the Plowing Tractors provides for an immense Ploughing Tournament and the best ploughers of the Province will meet to compete in the art of plowing. Generous cash prizes have been donated by the Dominion Atlantic Railway management. This demonstration will attract not only the best plowmen of the province, but thousands of spectators interested in the work of the tractors and the skill of the plowmen. Other Farm Saving Machinery will be on Exhibition and demonstrated, including manure spreaders gasoline potato diggers and the Famous Smith Forma trucks.

Professor Cumming has been particularly fortunate in securing one of the Ford Tractors. Henry Ford has been perfecting this tractor for a period of three years. At the present time he is not selling any in America but is delivering 6000 to the British Government for use in England. In many Provinces and States efforts have been made to

SIR ROBERT BORDEN HAS ACCOMPLISHED TASK OF FORMING A UNION GOVT.

Announcements from Ottawa yesterday were of special interest. A telegram had reached town Wednesday stating that Sir Wilfrid Laurier had resigned the leadership of the Liberal party and the daily papers yesterday confirmed that though the resignation will not be accepted for a week.

Sir Robert has commenced his union government by the swearing into office of Lieut. Col. C. C. Ballantyne, a Montreal Liberal and a most prominent figure in business circles. He will be Minister of Public Works. Hugh Guthrie Liberal M. P. for Ontario will be sworn into another office right away and there will follow a number of appointments to portfolios of prominent Liberal politicians of the west.

The Morning Chronicle says:—"Apart altogether from the question of the physical hardships of the 'Old Chief' which would be entailed by a winter campaign, it is this desire of Sir Wilfrid's to avoid if possible this racial discord which might centre around his leadership, however unjustly, that is moving him to ask the party to consider his retirement. It may be noted in this connection that Sir Wilfrid has repeatedly offered to resign ever since the election of 1911."

Does the enemy know that he must win or lose all?

Haig's men have that hope in their hearts and fight more grimly and with higher spirit because of it. The success of the last two battles has deepened the hope, and the men come back from the line to the rest billets with the old conviction, newly revived, that at last they have the enemy down and under and very near hopelessness.

The first class of recruits to receive their call under the military service act will be called upon Oct. 13th. A proclamation will be issued on that date notifying men in class one that, within a specified period, they are either to report for military duty or to file a claim for exemption.

**HUNS ESTABLISH LOW
MARK IN SINKINGS**

London, Oct. 3.—Eleen British mer-
chantmen of more than 1600 tons each
and two vessels under 1600 tons were
sunk by mines or submarines last week
according to the British Admiralty
statement made public this evening.
The above statement of the British
Admiralty again lowers the aggregate
of British merchantmen sunk by mines
during any week since Germany began
her intensified submarine campaign. As
against fifteen vessels sunk the previ-
ous week, which was the low record
since February only thirteen merchant-
men are shown to have been sent to the
bottom last week.
The shipping summary follows—
"Arrivals 2680; sailings 2742."
"British merchant vessels sunk by
mine or submarine over 1600 tons in-
cluding two previously, eleven; under
1600 tons two; fishing vessels sunk,
none."
"British merchant vessels attacked,
including seven previously sixteen."

German Aviator Killed

found in the British lines. The Lieut.
was killed in a combat with British
airmen. He died fighting. The death

REGNANT SENTENCE

The reply of President Wilson to the appeal of the Pope for peace, contains the following lang but most expressive sentence:

"The object of this war is to deliver the free people of the world from the menace and the actual power of a vast military establishment controlled by an irresponsible government which having secretly planned to dominate the world, proceeded to carry the plan out without regard either to the sacred obligations of treaty or the long established practices and long-cherished principles of international action and honor; which chose its own time for the war; delivered its blow fiercely and suddenly; stopped at no barrier; either of law or mercy; swept a whole continent within the tide of blood—not the blood of soldiers only, but the blood of innocent women and children also, and of the helpless poor—and now stands balked but not defeated, the enemy of four-fifths of the world."

Last spring when the increased production campaign was being conducted here the council participated, purchasing seed and planting several acres in potatoes at the trotting park. The crop will soon be ready to dig. Potatoes will be sold in limited quantities at cost, not less than one hundred nor more than ten barrels to each applicant.

MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917
Explanatory Announcement by the Minister of Justice

THE MILITARY SERVICE ACT has received the assent of the Governor-General and is now part of the law of the land. It will be enforced accordingly, and the patriotic and good sense of the people can be relied upon to support it. Resistance to its enforcement, however, by word or act must and will be repressed, as resistance to any other law in force must be.

Reinforcements under the Military Service Act immediately required

It is the intention of the Government immediately to exercise the power which the Act confers and to call out men for military service in order to provide reinforcements for the Canadian forces. This is necessary since the military authorities report that the reserves available of in sight for reinforcement will shortly be exhausted unless this step be taken.

First call limited to men between 20 and 34 who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6, 1917

The present call will be limited to men not in the schedule of exceptions who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6, 1917, and are at least twenty years of age, and were born on or since January 1st, 1883. Of this class all those will be entitled to conditional exemption whose services in their present occupations, agricultural, industrial or other, are essential in the national interest, and whose business or domestic responsibilities are such that serious hardship would ensue if their services be required. Conditional exemption based upon a prohibition of combatant service by the articles of faith of the religious denomination to which men belong will also be respected. The men first required to serve will consequently be those who can be called upon with the least disturbance of the economic and social life of the country.

Civil Tribunals to deal with exemptions

Questions of exemption will be determined, not by the military authorities or by the Government, but by civil tribunals composed of representative men who are familiar with local conditions in the communities in which they serve, who will generally have personal knowledge of the economic and family reasons which those whose cases come before them have had for not volunteering their services and who will be able sympathetically to estimate the weight and importance of such reasons. Provincial Appellate Tribunals constituted from the existing judiciary of the respective provinces will be provided to correct mistakes made by Local Tribunals, and a Central Appeal Tribunal for the whole of Canada, selected from among the present Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada, will be constituted in order that identical principles may be applied throughout the country. In this way every man may rest assured of the fair and full consideration of his circumstances and the national requirements both civil and military.

Proclamation will announce the day

A proclamation will issue calling out the bachelors and widowers referred to and fixing a day on or before which every man must report for service to the military authorities unless he has before that day made an application for exemption.

How to apply for exemption

Applications for exemption may be made by written notice on forms which will be available at every post office, and will be transmitted free of postage. They will not, however, be required to be made in this way, but may be presented by the applicants in person to the exemption tribunals. The cases of those who have given written notice in advance will take precedence, and appearance in person will therefore be likely to involve considerably more inconvenience and delay to the men concerned, so that it is recommended that advantage be generally taken of the facilities for written application.

Eleven Were Killed In Saturday's Raid

London, September 30th. — Eleven persons were killed and 82 injured in last night's air raid, it is announced officially. The material damage was not great. Four groups of German airplanes attempted to attack London in the course of last night's raid, but most of the machines were driven off. Bombs were dropped in the northeastern and southeastern districts of London and at various places in Kent and Essex. The casualties are believed to be comparatively light.

ESSEN IN REVOLT

London, Oct. 1st.—A demonstration against the German Government on Saturday at Essen, home of the Krupp works, in consequence of the decision of Chancellor Michaelis not to state Germany's peace terms, is reported in an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Amsterdam. Women formed a majority of the demonstrators says the despatch, breaking windows in the Town Hall and shouting demands for more food, for peace, and for the return of their men folk.

The police and military were called out to quell the riot. Two women were injured and several were arrested. The whole of Essen is reported to be in a state of ferment.

London Raided By Four Hostile Air Fleets

Germans Fly Over Capital For Sixth Attack in Eight Days--Numerous Bombs Dropped

London, Oct. 1st. — The strongest air attack yet attempted on London and the coast towns by the Germans was carried out to-night by four groups of hostile airplanes. Some of the machine guns got through to London and bombed the southwestern district. A traffic barrage was sent up from the defence guns, and the roar of battle lasted intermittently for two and a half hours.

The Germans bombed coast towns as they passed over and proceeded towards London. Two of the groups succeeded in getting a number of machines through the sky barrage. Numerous bombs were dropped on the southwestern district, which is thickly populated with the homes of upper and middle classes. The fire from the defending guns was longer and louder than ever before. A rain of shrapnel fell in all sections of the town, and the streets were virtually deserted save for a few police. The weather was perfect for air operations, as there was a bright full moon with no clouds or wind. The people of London expected a raid and were waiting for signals. Soon after seven o'clock, motors of the volunteer corps sped through the streets blowing their sirens and displaying an illuminated notice, "Take Cover." The telephone exchanges notified their subscribers and other measures were put into execution to inform the populace of the pending air raid.

Many of the theatres were continuing their performances despite the raids. At the conclusion of the performance in one of the leading London theatres to-night, the manager came to the stage and invited the audience and stage hands to vote on the question of continuing the night performances. All voted in favor of carrying them on as usual.

POTATOES LOWER
PORT HOPE, Ont., Oct. 1.—Food controller Hanna evidently was not aware of the extent of the potato crop when he fixed the price at \$1.25 per bag. Potatoes are selling here at \$1.00 a bag and the chances are that they will be cheaper.

Permission is granted for the importation from Canada of 4000 boxes on the Niagara early in October and 6000 boxes on the Niagara for the late November sailing.
