



The Royal Gazette contains notice hat a strict rule with regard to the censing of all public entertainments t which an admission fee is charged ther than those which are exclusively for patriotic purposes, has been passed by the Provincial Government The new regulation is in connection

with the Amusement Tax and is as follows: "No entertainment of whatever sort or description to which an addmission fee is charged and the proceeds of which are not wholly for patriotic purposes shall be held permit allowing the said entertain

ment to be held, and providing at the same time for a supply of amusement tax tickets necessary in nection therewith: If such enter tainment is held without a permi from the Amusement Tax Inspector the promoters of the same shall be liable to the penalties provided for in the 11th section of the Theatres and Cinimatographs Act."




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

The length of the new dock will be 1,150 feet, and its width at the bottom 125 feet, with 40 feet of water over the sills. The control of the enterprise is in the hands of the Canadian Dredging Co., Ltd., of Mid-land Ont a strong and wealthy

The enterprise is in the hands of the Canadian Dredging Co., Ltd., of Mid-land, Ont., a strong and wealthy corporation which has acquired con-trol of the stock of the St. John Dry-dock & Shipbuilding Co. It is ex-pected that steel shipbuilding will form an important part of the enter-prise, provided arrangements now in contemplation are consummated, and that keels for two 10,000-ton vessels will be laid within the next year or year and a half. The work on the new drydock and certain dredging operations in the harbor of St. John which the com-pany has contracted for will, it is ex-pected, be started within sixty days, and both should be completed within three years. The contracts call for an expenditure of close upon ten mil-lion dollars.


