# LIQUOR BANNED ON ALL SHIPS FOR **U.S. PORTS**


Under a sweeping opinion render ed by Attorney-General Daugherty, and confirmed by President Harding the sale or transportation of intoxi-cating beverages on all American ships, public and private, is prohibships, public and private, is promited, while any foreign vessel entering an American port with liquor on board as cargo or in stores, or even in a sealed bar, will be regarded as violating the prohibition enforcement

law and dealt with accordingly.

The far-reaching character of the new Government policy is emphasized by its applications to foreign vessels calling at American ports while in transit. This means, for example, that a foreign vessel leaving a foeign port for another foreign port would be violating the Volstead Act if it stopped en route at an American port, provided, of course, that it carried intoxicating beverages. Thus a British passenger vessel sailing from Vancouver for Sydney Australia, and calling en route at Honolulu, Hawaiian Islands, would he amenable to seizure at Honolulu. The new ruling applies to all American vessels even on the high seas and to all foreign vessels within the three-mile limit of national territorial jurisdiction.
