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



There are five vacant seats for the Commons, four caused by recent judicial appointments and consewent changes in the Cabinet. The Government is quite naturally a lit tle anxious, for in four centests it is on the defensive, and has to contend with a lot of dissatisfaction both with what it has done, and what it has failed to do. Unionists too, are making a determined fight in every constituency and are aided in some by candidates who always draw votes from the Liberals. The greatest interest centres in the contest for the Reading seat which Sir Rufus Isaacs gave up to take the Lord Chief Justiceship here; the Unionists have the best chances in making a break in the Government defense; Isaacs, although a resident of the city, was otherwise popular and a strong canidate and always held his seat by only narrow majorities which at the last election dwindled to 99. Captain Leslie Wilson, who fought him last election is again Unionist candidate. George Peabody Gooch, is Liberal candidate. Keighley Division of Yorkshire, where Stanley Buckmaster has to seek re-election after his appointment to the position of Solicitor General, does not give the Government much concern. Buckmaster was returned only a year ago at the byeelection, receiving 825 over the Unionist candidate in a three-cornered fight. This time it is not expected there will be any official Labor canlidate, so the new Solicitor General has to contest only against the Unionist, Viscount Lascelles, son and heir of Earl Harewood. Two Scottish elections will be fought, largely on Scottish issues, in both cases the Liberals are pretty certain of success. Robert Monroe, on account of his apcointment as Lord Advocate for Scothave his appointment endorsed. He represents Wick Burghs, where he defeated Sir Arthur Bignold in 1910 by a majority of 211. No Unionist candidate has yet been selected. The other Scottish contest is for Linlithgowshire, which Alexander Ure vacated to become Lord President of the Court of Sessions. He had represented the constituency for twenty vears, always being elected by large majorities, last time by 2070, so it ought to be safe for a Liberal again this time. The candidate chosen by the Government Party is Mr. Pratt, mer Bailie of Glasgow, a strong emperance advocate: his opponent will be James Kidd, Solicitor. There will be no contest at the bye-election for the Northern Division of County Cork where John Guiney has been

Provided by Nature. The Maoris of northern New Zeaand enjoy cooked food to a far greater extent than other natives, but they ever bother with fire. They build their huts on the edge of some "friendly" geyser, where they may ccok in nature's kitchen. On a spot which superstition would associate with death and the devil, the huts of about 200 Maoris lie scottered - the remnant of the once war-like tribe of Tuhourangi. Nature has built for these simple folks the best of all cocking appliances and saved then endless trouble with the stove, gas

ompany or coal merchant. A pond of boiling water lies in the middle of the settlement. In this the Maori woman puts her water kettle to boil, or hangs the widemeshed flax bag filled with potatoes and waits until thew are cooked. True, the potatoes cooked in their skins taste a little of sulphur, but that is the right flavor for a Maori palate the haut-gout for the brown gour-

For the cooking of meats the fumaroles, or holes through which steamescapes from the ground, are used. A box with a wooden grating for a bottom is placed on the ground over the hole. In this the Maori woman places the meat, well covered with tin or iron pots. An old sugar bag is then spread over the box, and the crude apparatus is left until the imrisoned steam has completely cook-
