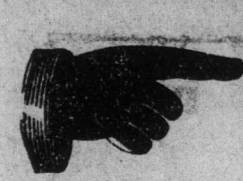

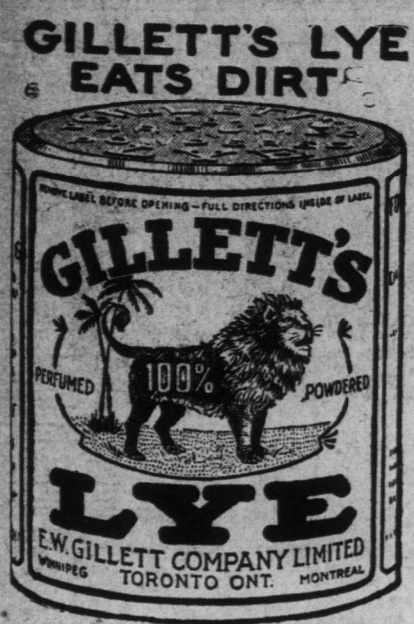

Special Legislation May be Desirable.

Yesterday we made reference to the Court of Enquiry, under Lord Mersey, which is to investigate the casualty to the Empress of Ireland and the attendant loss of life. The Commission is to begin its sittings next week. In the meantime, there has been an inquiry, and a preliminary enquiry is going to prepare matter for the Commission. Moreover, special legislation has been put through to constitute a Court suitable for so great a disaster. On the Commission there are three judges and four naval assessors. All these arrangements have been completed in a short time. The constitution of a suitable Court was possible because the Canadian Parliament was sitting.

There are difficulties in connection with the appointment of a suitable Commission to enquire into the disasters to the crew of the Newfoundland and to the Southern Cross. But unfortunately there is no legislature in session to overcome them by special legislation. The loss of the Southern Cross could be gone into under the provisions of the law on a Marine Court of Inquiry or by the tribunal which may be substituted under the provisions of the same statute. The case of the loss of life in connection with the Newfoundland appears not to come within the purview of this statute. The statute appears to be limited to the loss, abandonment, damage and casualty to a ship, whether attended by loss of life or not. The loss of life of the crew of the Newfoundland did not ensue from any loss, or abandonment of, or damage or casualty to the ship Newfoundland, as contemplated by the Marine Court of Inquiry Act.

The Public Inquiries Statute does not cover the case, as that statute relates to matters of Government, Government Departments and Institutions and the like.

The Governor in Council might of course appoint a Commission to deal with the disaster fully. But they could not confer on the Commission power to compel witnesses to attend, nor compel witnesses to answer questions or produce documents, or to give evidence on oath and subject them to trial for perjury for false swearing. The Commission, it would appear,

would be dependent on the good nature of witnesses for attendance and testimony and on their desire to further the investigation.

We may explain that one of the reasons why we made extensive use of the Inquest before Judge Knight to obtain testimony on oath was that we anticipated the difficulty which the Government has placed before the Justice Department.

So far as we can see at present, but we speak subject to correction, the course the Government can pursue is to have a Marine Court of Enquiry into the loss of the Southern Cross, as provided by Statute; then to appoint a Commission to inquire extensively into the whole sealing venture and depend on the willingness of witnesses to testify and to produce documents; or to call the Legislature together to deal with the matter during the fall or wait till next January; or to waive self-government in the matter, a course somewhat objectionable for obvious reasons, and invite British Parliament to put through a special Act speedily as the Canadian Parliament has done in the case of the loss of the Empress of Ireland.

The Sardinian-Adventure Collision Sunday.

The amount of damage done as a result of the Sardinian running into the Adventure on Sunday evening, is greater than at first thought. Not only a section of Harvey's pier was torn asunder, as already referred to, but in fact practically the entire pier will have to be rebuilt as every pile in wharf was removed from its position. Besides the damage to the bow plates of the both ships, the Adventure had four hawseas and other gear carried away on her. It is difficult, we were informed to-day, at this juncture, to even approximately estimate the damage wrought. We understand that right at the very outset the Allan Line Company prepared to assume all liability of the collision. The Adventure has a number of plates loosened almost amidships besides those that were battered in pieces near the forecastle head. She is now undergoing survey so as the extent of the damage to her can be ascertained. To-morrow she will sail for Philadelphia to be dry docked for repairs. Temporary repairs to the Sardinian are now being made. The hole at the bow is being closed by a large plate, which is secured by bolts. The Sardinian will sail to-morrow for Halifax and Philadelphia. It is not known whether permanently or not on the return of the Sardinian to the Old Country, as she is 44 years old, and in a short time may likely be consigned to the scrap heap.

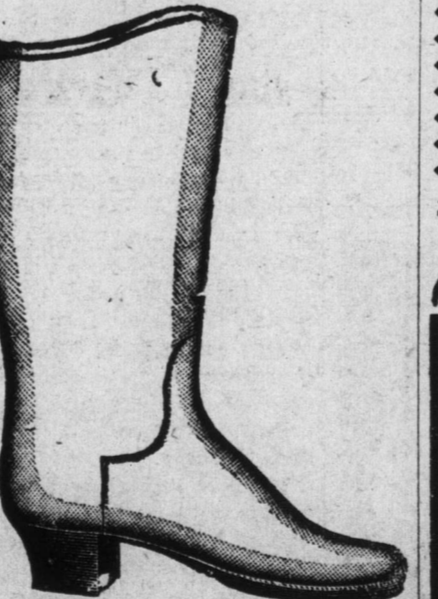

The very cruel practice of catching
 gulls on "glys" is now indulged in by
 some person in town, and on Saturday
 two of these, with birds fastened to
 them, having become detached from
 the moorings floated out the harbor,
 the poor birds fluttering about, no
 doubt in great agony. The method of
 catching is by placing a piece of
 tempting bait with a hook embedded
 in it, on a piece of board, and as the
 unfortunate bird swallows the bait it
 is firmly caught. This is bad enough
 if it could be put out of its misery at
 once, but to be allowed to remain
 there any time seems to us and no
 doubt to others very cruel indeed, and
 should not be permitted.

 for 15 cents per lb., and the latter for
 19 to 12 cents per dozen.

Complaint has been made that
 some people who were so enthusiastic
 about the capture of foxes last win-
 ter, and had traps set in different
 parts are not nearly so enthusiastic
 now as to the protection of cattle
 from getting caught in these firmly
 fastened steel fox traps. If there is
 not a law compelling trappers to re-
 move their traps at this time of the
 year, there should be one, and it
 should be enforced.

The Nfld. British Society, through
 its Secretary, Mr. J. M. Carbery, sends
 to the Conception Bay British Society
 a very hearty letter of thanks for
 what it considers kindness shown by
 the members of its sister society
 while on excursion here on Wednes-

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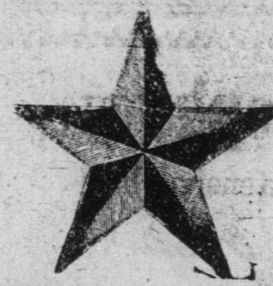
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
