





The Civic Report.

We observe that the Civic Commis sioners state in their report that they have devoted their work of road-repairing to repairing sections of Waterford Bridge Road, George Street, Gower Street East and Prescott Street. The feature of this work has been an effort to prevent washouts, by the digging of storm-pits and improvements of drains and gullies. Another few months should test the efficacy of the work, and prove what advantage if any, the new system possesses. The Commissioners draw attention to the opening of new streets and the in of land to get a street opened through their property, the City often actually paying for the land taken for the street, and constructing the same at considerable cost. The land is then leased and houses begin to go up. There being no water and sewerage pipes on the street a heavy expense is laid upon the City to keep the locality decent. After a while the occupants of the houses petition for water and of the houses petition for water and sewerage pipes, which petition is finally granted. The total cost of the street to the City is about five or six dollars per foot, and the income of the owner of the field is increased from little or nothing to several dollars per foot, or frontage. It is probably no exaggeration to say that tens of thousands of dollars of the City's money have been spent in this manner for the aggrandizement of land owners."

Britain received to-day through Walter Hines Page, American Ambassador, Germany's offer to with-draw the threat of a submarine blockdraw the threat of a submarine blockade against Britain, if the British Navy would permit the free movement of foodstuffs for the civil population in Germany. There is no expectation here that the offer will be accepted. In fact, Britain is already preparing to retaliate against Germany by placing under more stringent control, ships destined for German ports, and a proclamation is momentarily ex-

ships destined for German ports, and a proclamation is momentarily expected, declaring the blockade of the German coast, or at any rate, the prohibition of foodstuffs destined for Germany. The Cabinet with its naval and military advisers considered this question to-day. It is understood the decision is awaiting the formal confirmation of the Privy Council from which all proclamations emanate. Meantime British and neutral vessels are moying as freely as usual, with the exception of those belonging to a few Dutch lines which have repanies have given instructions that steamers insured by them shall have their neutral colors, name of ship and country of origin painted on the sides. Holland and Italy, like the States, have protested to Germany against her sea war zone threat and have asked Britain not to make a free use of neutral flags. They are also apparently falling back in North Poland, for the Germans to-day announced they have occupied Plock and Bielsk, which the Russians re-captured from them a short time ago. While the Germans claim to have inflicted heavy losses on the retiring Russian armies, military men here and newspaper correspondents in Petrograd continue to refer to the Muscovite movement as a strategical retirement to a fortified strategical retirement to a fortifie line which lies along the Niemen River through Kovno Grodno and Lomza. and thence southwest to the fortress Novoe Georgiwesk. Heavy fighting also continues in the Carpathians and Bukowina. In Bukowina the Russians also are falling tack, but they ontinue to hold the Carpathian Passes further west and are putting up a stubborn resistance to the Austro-German offensive in that region. 




