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



#### Tuesday's Messages.

RECONSTRUCTION AND BUSINESS

LONDON Dec. 23. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)-There will be an increased deman for credit facilities during the recor struction period and the ability trade and industry generally to pr vide for itself in all needs will depend largely on the amount of reserves has been possible to accumulate, says the report of the committee of the provision of financial facilities for trade after the war, issued to-day the Ministry of Reconstruction. Th committee is under the chairmanshi of Sir Vassar Smith, Chairman Lloyd's Bank. There are three main divisions under this head, the repor says. They are firms engaged upon war work from a date soon after th beginning of the war, firms who be came engaged on war work at a late neriod and new firms created as a re sult of the enormously increased de mannd for war material. The chie financial difficulty, according to th report, will be in connection with the third group. 

Count Karolyl told the Assembly he had sent message to President Wilson expressing adherence to the President's principles and protesting against what he declared were violations of the conditions of the armistice he was confidently awaiting the President's

WILL ACCEPT WILSON'S TERMS.

PARIS, Dec. 25. All the belligerents have accepted resident Wilson's points and the only nuestion to be discussed is this interpretation, said Count Von Bernstorff, former German Ambassador to the United States in giving his opining to the Geneva correspondent of the Matin, "Germany," declared the Count, "will keep to the President's programme, which grants each people of an ethical group the right to dispose of itself." Asked if he thought the President's programme would furnish the basis for a lasting peace, Count Von Bernstorff shrugged his shoulders. This is the only one which can be proposed, he added, and the attempt must be made to apply it. At furnish the basis for a lasting peace, any rate we shall support it. When asked by the correspondent what attitude Germany would adopt towards the east, he replied all the questions concerning the new states which have sprung up on the Russian frontier are the affairs of the Allies. ### **Murder Case** Opened.

Sydney, Dec. 19.—The preliminary hearing of Francis Andrea, who is charged with the murder of Guy Mac-Donald of North Sydney, began before Magistrate W. R. Hearn at 2,30 this

The first witness called was Mrs. Wetmore who boards at the Albert Hotel, and mother of Frank Wetmore who was with MacDonald on the night of the murder. On being cross-ex-amined by A. D. Gunn, K.C., witness swore she was awakened that night by two men coming in the hotel. After this she heard some one call out, "Let me in" and then a cry of distress coming from the street in front of the hotel.

Should consumers pay more for Chocolate and Cocoa if the threatened shortage of raw material is artificially Peculiar conditions exist to-day in the Cocoa and Chocolate industry.

All during the war Cocoa and Chocolate have been in the highest favor and justly so on account of their great food value, and the boys in all branches of the service have consumed anor-

es of the service have consumed enor-mous quantities. In spite of numerous difficulties, chief among them the shortage of sugar manufacturers' prices on their standard brands of Cocoa and Chocolate have not been advanced.

Now, owing to a regulation that the manufacturers shall be allowed to purchase only 64 per cent of their normal amount of raw cocoa, it would seem that an advance in prices would be necessary if this 64 per cent restriction should be allowed to remain in force long enough to constitution.
