The Prince of Wales will be the arst member of Britain's royal family to set foot on the West Indian Islands as a formal visitor. As it may now be taken for granted that King George's globe-trotting is at an end, and since at least two other visits for the Prince of Wales are projected, he is fikely to set up a mileage record that will remain unbeaten for many a day.

The record altitude biplane flight -36,000 feet-was made by Major R. W. Schroeder, U. S. A. This is 5000 feet more than the world's record, and to make it the major flew into such a cold zone when seven miles from earth that his oxygen tanks became exhausted and he behat almost froze him to death. His lane, uncontrolled, shot down and he major recovered in time and brought his ship to a landing safely. He was dressed heavier than any Arctic explorer.



France is said to recognise that the opposition to its action was based upon the immediate question involved.



#### The Burning of Magdala.

On Easter Monday, April 13, 1858, Magdala, the chief city of Abyssinia, was stormed with great force, and captured by a British army, which lost only two killed and twenty wounded. while the defenders lost about five thousand. On the 17th of that month Magdala was burned to the ground by the British Abyssinia is a very remarkable country, extending southwards from Egypt and the Red Sea. along the east coast of Africa, covering 300,000 square miles, and with a total population of 7.000,000. Its Hebrew name is Cush (meaning "black"). but the Greeks called it "Ethiopia," or "burnt faces," each referring to the complexion of its natives, but where that latter name first occurs in the English Bible (Gen. ii. 14), it could not refer to this African country, but means the country, still called Khusistan, on the east bank of the rivers mentioned in that chapter, when they have united before entering the Persian Gulf. OPEN DAY AND NIGHT.

Forty-One Years in the Public Service—the Evening Telegram:

A copy of the "Report of Public Schools under Methodist Boards" for the year ending Dec. 31st, 1919, is to hand. In it the Telegram finds many hundred and eighty five (385) schools n increase of 7 over the year previs, were in operation; 391 teachersincrease of 7-were engaged; 15,ed school. The amount of fees collected in the 385 schools was \$10,502.-15, and in both departments of the College, \$8,458.31, or a total of \$18,-960.46, showing a decrease of \$666.38. In other words, the College, with 561 pupils, pays fees amounting to \$8,458, and all the other schools, with 15.890 pupils, pay \$10,502 a year. In other vords, the pupils of the College contribute, on an average, \$10.50 per year each, and the 15,890 other pupils contribute 66 cents per year each. The total number of passes in the C. H. E. Examinations was 724 out of 1,770, or

40.9% of the whole. "The cost per pupil to the Governnent has been increasing somewhat rapidly," says the Report, "and last year was \$9.41 as against \$7.62 in the previous year—an advance of \$1.79. In 1913 it was \$6.11 per pupil." A total of \$138,328.21 was paid in teachers' salaries, an increase of \$29,677.00 over the pear previous. For first grade teachers, male, the highest salary is \$1,395; the lowest, \$477 and the average \$751-or \$26, \$14 and \$9 per week respectively. That is male teachers, first grade. The weekly salaries of first grade female teachers are: Highest, \$15; lowest, \$5 and average \$8. Then there is a second grade. The weekly salaries of Third Grade teachers are: Highest, male, \$7; female, \$8; Lowest, male, \$5; female, \$3; Average, male \$5; female, \$5. That means that the average salary of the three grades of teachers, (and there are three subgrades for each grade) is about \$400 To be even more explicit, the teachers' average yearly salary in Newfoundland is \$400-or \$7 a week. And flour is \$17.25 a barrel and sugar 25 cents a pound. In 1919, 67 teachers retired, mostly permanently; in 1918, 74 retired—141 teachers in 2 years. And new this corner of a foreign field for ever recruits are not arriving in numbers sufficient to make good the loss.

### Here and There.

To The People of Newfoundland: The Great War has been over so 16 months, Peace has been signed, but the ravages of war still remain, and our work is not finished. No doubt you have all lately read in the newspaper the vivid account of the field of Bean mont Hamel, the scene of the heroisn of the greatest self-sacrifice of the flower of the youth of this Dominion. This land in France, this last restingplace of so many gallant sons of Newfoundland was to be taken over for agriculture, but was saved this desecration by being secured for \$10,000. We are all now given the great

privilege of making good this purchase, and of honouring our dead by unitedly contributing to defray this expense. Our boys lie there and we cannot fail them. As Rupert Brooke

There's none of these so lonely and poor of old, But, dying, has made us rarer gifts There laid the world away; poured

Sweet wine of youth; gave up the years to be years to be
Of work and joy, and that unhoped

That men call age; and those who Their sons, they gave, their immor-tality."

We can never forget that day, four years ago, when the blow fell, and we heard that on July 1st the Newfoundland Battalion was practically wiped out at Beaumont Hamel, not ten escaping death or wounds. Impossible at that time to see to the burial of the dead, there they lay, and that is their present resting-place, and we are now asking to help to hold sacred this corner of Newfoundland in France. Again I quote Rupert Brooke in his

poem "The Soldier," who says:-"If I should die, think only this of me That there's some corner of a foreign

That is for ever England." We will substitute the word New foundland for England; we will shelter our sons who lie there and make Newfoundland

Dear Sir,-A writer in yesterday's Telegram, signing himself "Caution," and dealing with the demand of the Longshoremen and others for increas-St. John's." This is intended to frighten the Longshoremen from pressing their reasonable demands and should not be taken too seriously. It is a fact that on two or three occasions within the past eighteen nonths, 'longshoremen of this city had to go to outports to load and unload vessels for which they were paid the Union rate of wages plus meals and their expenses to and from. Again, the past winter has demonstrated very forcibly that shipping fish from some outports is not so rosy as "Caution" would have us believe. With cargoes of fish frozen up and vessels requiring to be cut out by steamers, which in the case of one firm means the payment of fifteen or twenty thousand dollars on one cargo alone, it demonstrates that shipping fish for some outport merchants is a

rather costly affair. Apart from all this, Mr. Editor, it nust be admitted by right thinking eople, that when we see the many donations given out by our merchants for churches, orphanages, hospitals, colleges, monuments, etc., and which total many times more than what the longshoremen are asking, and on which we hear no complaint from the merchants for the giving, surely any hundreds of homes and brighten the lives of some thousands of men, women and children, should be given a least equal consideration. I venture the assertion that there is not a mer chant on Water Street who would not be the happier for having thought less of himself and more of his workmen, and who would not be the richer in heart, mind and soul for his thoughtfulness. His income may be affected, but that may be questioned. Most, if not all, our merchants have investents other than the fishery, ropewalk, tanneries, biscuit factories, outter factories, boot and clothing actories, etc. Now the larger the wages paid to workmen the more

Dear Sir .- I do not want to pose as supporter of the party of which Hon. H. J. Brownrigg is an Executive Member, but personally I hold a high opinion of him as a man who will tand for nothing that is unclean or shady in politics. That opinion is generally held by his supporters and on-supporters. Up to the time of his election he had no opportunity of proving that he possessed these qualiman in public life, but nevertheless the opinion was that when occasion called for independent action in doing the square thing, H. If he knows the charges to be false he should immediately insist upon his leader proving his innocence before the country. No good is being done by silence. Hon. Mr. Squires stands to-day in an unenviable position. The entire country awaits with the greatest interest his answer to the charge. people are in earnest, more so than ever they have been in my experience. and no shuffling will be permitted to pull the wool over the eyes of the electorate. Public spirit is not dead in this country, and it is indeed refreshing to find that the people of both sides of politics want a cleaning up of any trickery that may exist in ublic life to-day.

I therefore respectfully ask Hon. Mr. Brownrigg to insist upon his leader, Hon. Mr. Squires, to give the facts of the case publicity immediately. 
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


### Lectured to Llewellyn Club.
