

Forty-Three Years in the Public Service—The Evening Telegram.

Genoa Conference Opened Yesterday.

Nations of Four Continents Represented—Soviet Foreign Minister Made First Attack—De Valera Still in Command of Republicans.

GENOA CONFERENCE OPENED YESTERDAY.

GENOA, April 10. The nations of four continents today began efforts to restore the world to normal conditions. All plans had been completed today for the great economic Conference generally regarded by competent judges the most important and significant assembly since the Versailles Peace Conference. The Conference is particularly to be concerned with plans for rehabilitating Central Europe and the rehabilitation of Russia. The formal opening of the sessions took place at 3 o'clock this afternoon in the historic palace of St. George.

FIRST CLASH AT CONFERENCE.

GENOA, April 10. A clash over the disarmament proposal by George Chitchein, Russian Soviet Foreign Minister, and M. Barthou, of France, threatened to disrupt the Conference. Barthou said France categorically refused to discuss disarmament at Genoa. Chitchein said she ought to be ready to do so because Briand at Washington said the Russians made disarmament impossible. It is reported Lloyd George insisted the Conference would be a failure unless it led ultimately to disarmament, but urged that before disarmament came up there must be a peace basis. He then urged the Soviet Minister to confine himself to the agenda lest he wreck the Conference. The matters on the agenda, Lloyd George said, were of enormous importance, and it would be criminal to destroy the hopes of millions by endeavouring to solve more problems than could be managed. President Facta of Italy seconded Lloyd George's appeal and the incident closed though not very satisfactorily.

GERMANY'S REPLY.

PARIS, April 10. The German reply to the Reparation Commission note which fixed the conditions of a partial moratorium of reparations payments says the German Government cannot consent to control of its revenues or expenses, and is unable to impose additional taxes of 60 billion marks.

INCORRECT.

DUBLIN, April 10. A statement issued by the Irish Republic publicity department today contradicts the rumors that Eamonn De Valera had been deposed as leader of the Republicans at a secret meeting of the Irish Republican army in Dublin yesterday.

24 KILLED.

BERLIN, April 10. Twenty-three French soldiers and one German foreman were reported killed and ten wounded by an explosion yesterday at the Huetton Smelting Works near Gliwicz, Upper Silesia. Latest accounts declare the explosion took place in the family vault of Count Elmsfeld, one of the founders of the Royal Smelting Works in the cemetery connected with the works. Unofficial reports assert a hidden mine detonated during a search for concealed arms.

NEW STEEL DISCOVERY

LONDON, April 10. The construction of telephones and

the making of motor car and aeroplane engines is likely to be revolutionized by a Sheffield discovery of Cobalt Magnet Steel, according to experts. The new steel, the invention of J. Kuehnrlich of the Cobalt Steel Company, contains fifteen percent Cobalt which is said to be enormously superior to Tungsten Steel for making Magneto.

CANADA TO RAISE NEW LOAN.

OTTAWA, April 10. The Canadian Government is contemplating new loan but the amount is not determined. Tax free bonds to the amount \$182,834,600 matured December 1st. The Government does not intend to issue further tax free bonds, the Finance Minister said.

LONGSHOREMEN REFUSE.

MONTREAL, April 10. The Longshoremen have refused to accept wage cuts running from ten to thirty percent, but have not yet declared war.

COOK DISQUALIFIED.

LONDON, April 10. George Cook, Australian, was disqualified in the sixth round of the scheduled 20 round bout here tonight with Joe Beckett, champion of the Empire.

SHOOTING IN DUBLIN.

DUBLIN, April 10. A sensation was caused here tonight by the shooting of Michael Sweeney, 21 years old, who was fatally wounded. It was reported he was trying to escape from an Irish Republican army lorry.



The First Church Organ.

Jan 9, 1818.

April 11 is a memorable date for ecclesiastical musicians, who claim on that day, in A.D. 787, King Pepin placed the first organ—which he had procured from the Byzantine Emperor—in the church of St. Cornelius at Compeigne.

It was a pneumatic organ, with leaden pipes, played by an Italian priest, who had taken lessons at Constantinople. But about that time the "King of Instruments" was quite familiar to our Saxon ancestors, who had some clever organ builders, notably St. Dunstan, who erected an organ "with brass pipes," made by himself at Malmesbury Abbey, and presented other churches or convents with similar instruments.

The Brazilian Centenary Exhibition.

A Reply to Exporter.

H. F. SHORTIS.

You are aware, Mr. Editor, that I notice a correspondent who identifies under the hedge of anonymity, but in this instance I make an exception. In Saturday's issue of the "Trade Review," correspondent signing himself "Exporter" has an article, appearing in a few days ago, that Newfoundland should be represented at the coming Centenary Exhibition to be held in Rio de Janeiro on the 7th September next. The correspondent is entitled to his opinion, and to my mind, he endeavors to state the interests of the Gaspe fishermen more strenuously than those of Newfoundland. I quote from his article: "The Rio de Janeiro Exhibition takes place next September, and interest for Newfoundland in what Mr. Shortis wrote in the Telegram last week. I fear Mr. Shortis allowed his zeal and optimism to outrun his knowledge of the subject, unless he had in mind that Newfoundland exports of fish should make a drastic change in the methods of packing and shipping codfish. These come on for over a hundred tons. We practically no fish but with Rio de Janeiro, and can hope to do so, unless we completely change our own system. Rio de Janeiro won't take our fish, as it is dried to Pernambuco and Bahia. It is good enough, and not packed the same way in which they get it. Small packages from Gaspe and Scotia, put up in tubes and boxes. Gaspe fishermen have held this for years and years, and are not going to give it up or allow us to sway their market. It would be a loss for us to attempt to do so."

It will enable them to compete or improve on the methods of those in the same line of business. And so it should be with Newfoundland in this instance. "Exporter" says that "the thought in mind that exporters should make a drastic and radical change in the methods of curing, packing and shipping codfish that have gone on for over a hundred years." I answer, "why not, if the old system has played itself out, and that the trade requires a better cured article, put up in suitable packages?" Surely our fishermen can put out of hand an article that will do honor to the proud boast that we have held from time immemorial, as being the first fishing country in the world, and surely our tradesmen can manufacture tubes, boxes or any other packages that will be equal or superior to those of the Gaspe or Nova Scotia Shippers. If the packages, after a hundred years' trial, do not meet the requirements of the present day, then in heaven's name let us make others that will meet the requirements of the trade. "Exporter" says that "the Gaspe fishermen have held this trade for years and years and are not going to give it up or allow us to take away their market. It would be useless for us to attempt to do so."

A STRAIGHT QUERY.

May I ask "Exporter" who informed him that Gaspe fishermen always held the trade with Rio Janeiro? I can assure him that such is not the case. It is true that I was never in business, but I had opportunities for watching how our great business men conducted their affairs in the past that few people had, and, without egotism I may say, I took a deep interest in such affairs and stored it up in my memory as well as having committed it to paper. "Exporter" has much to learn when he hands over exclusive rights to the Gaspe fishermen in the control of the Rio de Janeiro market or any other market. "Exporter" that over sixty years ago, and since, we have had quite a large trade with Rio de Janeiro. I can name several St. John's vessels that were employed for years in conveying cargoes of our fish to Rio de Janeiro. To go back seventy years or so, the enterprising firm of Barnes & Co., whose business premises were situated immediately west of Messrs. Job Bros. & Co., for years had the brig Guitania, Capt. Axwell running in the fish trade between St. John's and Rio de Janeiro, and I may add that the captain's daughter, who accompanied him on some of his voyages, was struck by Cupid's dart, surrendered her affections to a young man of the city of Rio, got married, and I presume lived happily ever after. So much for that.

FISH SHIPPED TO RIO.

It is not so many years ago that the iron barque Helen Isabel, Capt. Vine, owned by the enterprising firm of Baine Johnston & Co., and chartered by Bowring Bros., conveyed a large cargo of codfish from St. John's to Rio de Janeiro. This fish was made up in different packages from the regular drums. They were made of soft wood, something similar to that used in fish crates—wide in the bottom and tapering to the top. Now another instance out of many that I know of. The famous brigantine, Ida, Capt. Harris, which was built by Michael Kearney on the ground at the easter corner of the General Post Office, opposite Crosbie's arch, and launched across the street into the waters of the harbor on the 30th January, 1855, was employed in the trade with Rio de Janeiro, taking a cargo of codfish direct to that port—discharged and took a cargo of coffee to Trieste, Austria, as it was then. I knew several vessels running between Harbor, Grace and Rio de Janeiro in the days of Ridley & Sons, Panton & Munn and later Tessiers barque Camelia, Capt. Richard Harvey, barquentine Silver Sea, Capt. Hoburg, and others went to Rio de Janeiro about twenty-five years ago. Some would call at Pernambuco for orders and others sail direct under sealed orders. The captain had much to do with the disposing of the cargo in the past, and, as a rule, the merchant had full confidence in his ability, honesty and discretion.

WHY ADVERTISE GASPE?
"Exporter" as the advocate of the

Gaspe fishermen, concludes his epistle with the following words, after foretelling that "it would be useless for us to attempt to take away the Rio de Janeiro market from the Gasperos and Nova Scotians," forgetting the advice of the late Artemus Ward that "a man should never prophesy unless he was sure it would turn out correct."

"It is possible, however, that all these objections may be overcome and I do not want to throw cold water on Mr. Shortis' enthusiasm, or to oppose the idea of sending fish exhibits to Rio de Janeiro next September, and, should in this connection like to get the opinion of Mr. C. R. Duder on the subject." That is exactly what I advocated in my letter to the Evening Telegram, because we have now a grand opportunity to bring our exhibits of fish and other products before the business and other people of the world. For years we have been advertising our chief products and industries through the columns of foreign journals, which may or may not be of benefit to our country. Probably not more than one in a million has ever read or seen these advertisements, and yet they must have cost the country a considerable amount of money in paying for the space. But now we have the chance to exhibit our products before representative business men and people generally from all countries who will visit the Exhibition in their hundreds of thousands, and they will be in a position to judge for themselves as to the superior qualities of our codfish and other products. If we do not show the Gaspe traders that we can put out of hand as good an article as they can at the Centenary Exhibition in Brazil, our people of the future will gasp (e) with amazement at the lack of enterprise on the part of our people of the present day, in permitting such an opportunity to pass without taking full advantage of it.

TRADE ON N. F. PRODUCE.
Did it ever strike "Exporter" or any other business man in St. John's or elsewhere that for years Nova Scotia fish dealers have been purchasing our fish by telegraph, and sending down their agents here to purchase cargoes, chartering vessels, extra handling, insurance, etc., shipping the fish to southern markets and making handsome profits? Breach of Promise.

Rumour says that the engagement which existed between the young man and the daughter of a well-known business man was hurriedly broken off yesterday, and the parents of the jilted maiden are urging her to take the matter up before our Courts. The rift in the lute occurred over the failure of the intended bridegroom to purchase tickets for the first performance of Hazel Kirke after he had solemnly pledged himself to do so, and this breach of his promise will no doubt cost him dear when the matter is aired in court.

Lecture at St. Patrick's.

SERIES CONCLUDED.

The concluding lecture of a series in aid of St. Patrick's Memorial School Building Fund was delivered by Rev. Fr. St. John to a crowded house, in the Convent Schools last evening. The Reverend lecturer was introduced by the Chairman, Mr. J. Fitzgibbon, and taking for his subject, "Deacon Lights of History," with the eloquence of expression and grace of diction for which he is noted, held his audience enraptured from start to finish. Following the trend of history, and touching in different phases, the speaker showed clearly by the light of past events the necessity and importance of moral guidance in the educational sphere. At the conclusion a hearty vote of thanks, proposed by J. J. Rossier, was tendered by acclamation. During the evening, choruses by the pupils and solos by Misses Dicks and McCarthy were delightfully rendered. As these lectures have become very popular, it is to be hoped that the Rev. Pastor will see fit to inaugurate another series in the near future.

Our Agricultural Returns.

VALUATION INCREASED BUT NOT PRODUCTION.

In looking over the value of our Agricultural produce as shown in the Budget Speech one is at first glance struck with the remarkable increase shown during the last 20 years. According to the report in the Budget Speech the total value as taken in the 1901 census was \$5,930,825.55, but from this account there was apparently omitted about one million dollars worth of milk, so that the total should be about \$6,830,825.55. In 1911 the returns show a value of \$7,137,238.25. In the census taken last year the total value is given at \$14,252,090.37. The increase is not due as may at first appear to increased production, but to increased valuation. The facts are that all root crops show a considerable decrease from the year 1901. Horned cattle, goats and swine show a similar decrease. There is an increase of about 7000 in horses. Poultry show an increase of about 20,000 head, but in comparison with the 1911 census there is a decrease of 75,000 head. Viewing the facts it is seen that despite all the boasted agricultural policies agriculture is not on the increase. From the census returns of 1921 it is computed that the share of each man, woman and child in Newfoundland, of the following was:—Cabbage, 2 1/2 doz, Milk, 12 1/2 gallons, Eggs, 3 dozen, Meat, exclusive of poultry, 15 lbs., Potatoes, 2 barrels. This bill of fare, it must be understood, is exclusive of imported produce. One other fact brought out by the returns is that although we have by the census over 45,000 horses and horned cattle and 100,000 goats and sheep that only 50,400 tons of hay was raised to feed them on for the seven months of winter.

Cantabs Beat Oxford.

PUTNEY, Eng., April 1 (By A. P.)—Cambridge defeated Oxford by four and one half boat lengths in their annual boat race over the Putney-to-Mortlake course on the Thames today. It was the fourth consecutive victory for Cambridge. The time was 19 min. 27s.

Race One-Sided

The race was a one-sided affair lacking the thrills of last year's contest when the rivals sea-sawed the entire distance. The Oxford crew finished in an exhausted state, five of the men including the stroke, appearing much distressed, while only one man in the Cambridge crew was visibly affected. Cambridge won the toss and chose the Northern end of the river. This gave the Cambridge a great advantage with the best of the wind and the water throughout nearly the whole course, owing to the strong north-easterly wind. After a false start the crews got away, Oxford rowing 35 and Cambridge 38. At the end of the first mile Cambridge was leading by a quarter of a length. When they had rowed approximately two miles Cambridge had increased her lead to a full length, rowing 37 and Oxford 36. The light blues were fully two lengths ahead at the end of the third mile.

Oarsmen Injured

The Cambridge crew averaged 173 1/2 pounds and the Oxford rowers 172. There were five veterans in each boat. As a precaution against drowning or damage to the boat, Cambridge insured the life of each member of the crew for £250 and the boat for £125. This is the first time in history that such a precaution was taken.

Oxford backers before the race claimed that April Fool's day was a good omen for their crew, as within the past forty years the race had been rowed on April 1st and Oxford won each time.

In addition to the intense rivalry between the two institutions, interest was stirred up this year when C. C. Drinkwater inaugurated the American system in the preliminary training for the Oxford crew. R. P. P. Howe, succeeding Harcourt Gold of pre-war fame was the coach in charge of the dark blue.

Cambridge won the last race before the war in 1914, and when the series were resumed in 1920, took the measure of Oxford, repeating again last year. Oxford has enjoyed two long periods of winning crews, taking each contest from 1861 to 1869, and duplicating this record in the 1890-98 period. The best string for Cambridge covered the five years, 1870-74. Not once has the contest been postponed or cancelled, regardless of choppy waves or other unfavorable conditions.


