# **Armistice Day Celebrated** by the Allied Countries

Irish Free State to Adopt Protective Tariff--British Artisans en Route to the Humber---Derelict Sighted May be Leif Ericcson.

REMEMBRANCE DAY AT LONDON. five minutes to cheering. They also hooted one of the busy photographers who had forgotten to take off his hat.

London gathered to-day around the Cenotaph in sorrowful yet proud remembrance of their one million kin who died in the war that came to an end six years ago. Whitehall was thronged its entire length by subjects of the farflung British Empire, most of whom wore red popples bought with pennies and pounds to help the men who came away halt, lame and blind from the fields of Flanders and from other battlefields of the great war. At the core of the crowd stood the King. He and his two elder sons, the Prince of Wales and the Duke of York, placed wreaths at the foot of the Cenotaph. Just before Big Ben in his tower rising above the Houses of Parliament toiled the eleventh hour which ended the greatest of wars. On the echo of the tolling of the great bell there came a hushed silence, and for two minutes the crowds stood in reverent quietude. Throughout the British Isles the same two moments were given over to silent remembrance of the empire's dead.

ARMISTICE DAY CELEBRATED IN IRELAND.

DUBLIN, Nov. 11.
For the first time since the end of he war Armistice Day to-day was generally celebrated throughout the Free State with memorial demonstraions in Dublin and elsewhere. Thousands of poppies were sold, and the wearers included Republicans as well B Free Staters. The day's programme n Dublin included a parade of ex-Service men and placing of a wreath on a cross in College Green by General Hinkle, who commanded the Irish 16th Division. So dense was the crowd in College Green that the tramway traffic was suspended for more than an hour. Some members of the crowds carried Union Jacks and a Union Jack replaced the Free State Tri-color over the Bank of Ireland building, formerly the old House of Parliament. The Government offices suspended business during the cere-

ARMISTICE DAY OBSERVED IN

NEW YORK, Nov. 11. The observance of Armistice Day was general throughout the United States to-day, the day being a legal holiday in some states while in others special ceremonies were carried out under the auspices of patriotic oranizations. In Washington the day was marked by special ceremonies at the tomb of the unknown soldier in the Arlington National Cemetery. Thousands of persons joined the annual pilgrimage to the National Shrine led by President Coolidge and other high Government officials. A service in memory of Woodrow Wilson was held in the National Cathedral. The day was not a holiday in the

FRENCH CELEBRATE ARMISTICE

PARIS, Nov. 11. Armistice Day this year is for the first time a full holiday in France. Although Parliament voted it a legal holiday long ago, the application of the law has been suspended hitherto mainly for economic reasons, with business only interrupted for the one minute of silence. To-day everything is closed except places of amusement. The main feature of the celebration in Paris was at the tomb of the Unknown Poilu in the Arc de Triomphe, with President Doumergue, Premier Herriott and his Cabinet, Marshals, Generals and members of the Diplomatic Service in attendance. Two hundred and fifty tattered flags of disbanded regiments were carried by reserve officers headed by General Gourand and his staff from the Invalids to the Arc.

MORE TROUBLE IN CHINA.

The Chinese here expect hostilities etween the Christian General, Fon Yu Hsiang, who is in control of Peking and Chang Tzo Lin, the Manchurian War Lord. The city was thrown into a panic yesterday when an ammunition train caught fire and prompt action enabled 210 of the 216 cars to be removed beyond the danger zone and the flames burned themselves out. There was one casualty and some damage. The fire broke out about 500 yards from the Central Station. The munitions had been left by Wui Pei Fu when he fled from this part of the country after a coup de-tat had ousted him from his position as head of the Peking Government army. The explosions caused a frantic exodus into the foreign concessions. Fen, who was erroniously reported here, had not arrived this evening. He was last reported at Yangtsun, 21 miles to the west. Chang had passed thru' Tangshan, 81 miles to the Northeast to-day, and was expected to reach Mentsin. An Allied train, bound for Peking was held at Kofa where the Manchurian forces had gone. Feng Fu Siang was reported to have ended the war with Manchuria when he seized Peking, set up a military regommander Wu Pei Fu, who has fled conference in Peking. ASTONISHING CUTS IN ST. JOHN ENERGY RATES.

Hydro Competition Forces Private Company to Reduce Domestic Rate from Fifteen Cents a Kllowatt Hour to 21/2 Cents a Killowatt Hour with a 54 cent Service Charge. Failing to reach a satisfactory unerstanding with the New Brunswick Power Company (the tram and power Company of St. John), the citizens of St. John undertook the distribution of the Musquash current—and hydro came into direct competition with the private power cerporation in the New Brunswick city. .

Before the introduction of hydro in St. John, the private company there declared that the power from the new source would not benefit the consumers more than a fraction of a cent in the rates. That fraction of a cent, the private company told the citizens, would be the difference between the cost of steam-geared current from the Musquash development.

Subsequent events tell their own When hydro was introduced in St. John, the private company there was charging a flat rate of fifteen cents per kilowatt hour for domestic light-

Then hydro came and the amazing results.

The private company, up against competition began to cut its rates, until, at March 1 of this year, the following rate for domestic lighting was given by the private company.

From an original flat rate teen cents per kilowatt hour, down watt hour plus a service charge for each house for 80c.

And under this rate established in March of this year the private company in May announced "a satisfactory increase in the company's

But that was not the end of the t. John rate-slashing. Now we learn that another amazing cut has been made by the private company, hard up against hydro competition.

For domestic services the energy rate has been cut from three and a half cents per kilowatt hour to two and a quarter cents per kilowatt hour and the monthly service charge has been reduced from eighty cents to fifty-four cents.

And all the while other rates have been scaled down, as well,

The new rates, the general manager of the private company announces, are lower than the city's own hydro charge on domestic lighting. heating and cooking!

That is what cheap hydro current can do-when it is given a chance. In St. John it has forced the private company to make the astonishing cut of from fifteen cents per kilowatt hour down to two and a quarter cents per kilowatt hour, plus the service charge of 54 cents.

# Steam From Mid-Earth

HARNESSING HEAT FROM UNDER THE GROUND.


What will happen when the earth runs short of coal and oil supplies? This problem was discussed by Professor W. W. Watts, in a paper on "Geology in the Service of Man."

He suggested the possibility of a great new power which humanity may harness to its service—nothing less than the heat of the earth's nether re-A beginning has been made at Vol-

terra, in Italy, where a new source of power has been found in the high temperature steam from Fumaroles, which has previously been used only as a source of borax. Now the steam is being tapped by boring, and its chief heat is employed in running great power stations.

This may be but the beginning of the application of a new and valuable source of power in which the services of geology will be required.

We are haunted by the fear that a limit will be imposed by high temperature to deep mining, while that very heat may provide energy as valuable as the material which would otherwise be mined-just as we dread the gas from certain coal seams. when the gas might, if it could be explofted, give a return equivalent to that of the coal itself.

Through a large number of the men being sent from Gallipoli suffering from dysentry, etc., only half of the Regiment was left to take part in the evacuation of Sulva. After the evacuation of Sulva in December, 1915, the Regiment went to Cape Helles, where they remained until the early part of January, 1915. From there they proceeded to France and occupied a part of the Somme sector of the British line. Their first taste of fighting in France was when 100 men took part in a trench raid on June 27th, for which Capt. Butler received the Military Cross and two others received decorations. NDON, Nov. 11.

THE GREAT FINISH.

Six years ago to-day, says the Daily the Anglican Cathedral at 10.40 a.m. fought their way through Mons, killserved after the lesson. ### BRAZILIAN COMMANDER ABAN-DONS WARSHIP.

MONTE VEDIO, Nov. 11. The mutinous Brazilian battleship Sao Paulo, commanded by a 25 year old Lieutenant, ended her adventure yesterday by putting into Montevideo The warship sailed out of the harbour of Rio Janeiro last Tuesday, with both fuel and provisions nearly exhausted and with a portion of her crew still loyal to the Brazilian Government, and realizing that the vessel eventually would be run down by the pursuing contingent of the Brazilian Navy, the commander of the Sao Paulo decided to enter port here and abandon ship. He brought the Sao Paulo to dock shortly after seven o'clock last evening. Her fate has not yet been decided by Uruguay.

AUCKLAND GEDDES SAYS COL-ONIES AND U.S.A. ARE MAKING EYES AT EACH OTHER.

LONDON, Nov. 11. In a lecture describing the United States as one of the greatest stable empires of the world, Sir Auckland Geddes, former British Ambassador to America, this p.m. told an audience of 3000 at Westminster Hall how profoundly American thought was influencing the United Kingdom, and to an even greater extent the British Dominions. The British Dominions that look out on the Pacific, he said. feel that at Washington there is an instinctive understanding of their difficulties which when they come to London they have to explain laborously in Downing Street. The speaker seemed to surprise some in the audience with the remark that when the Dominions looked to the Mother Country and found no satisfactory understanding, they are apt to look to Washington, and Washington with inviting eyes looks back on them. The far-flung British Empire, Sir Auckland said, has yielded the leadership of the world in many respects to the compact desire of the U.S.A. He cited the Washington Arms ence as an example.



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### On the Trail of Livingstone

BOY EXPLORER'S ADVENTURES IN AFRICA.

Only recently have the journals of Alfred Dolman been published. Alhough only twenty-four when he ied in 1851, he made four visits to Africa. References to his journeys are to be found in the records of the toyal Geographical Society.

He was within a few miles of Livngstone, whom he was anxious to oin, when he met his death; whether the hands of natives or in an encounter with a lion has never been

That he was a man of great courage and determination is evident from his book, "In the Footsteps of Livingstone" (John Lane, 12s. 6d.), which contains some of his diaries and notes and is illustrated by his clever drawings.

### Impressions Of The Dutch.

Dolman's first visit was to Cape Colony. He was not favorably impressed by the Dutch. Here is an entry in his journal when he was making an excursion, in 1844, at the age of eighteen:-

There was among the Dutch Boers here one who last night had refused us any forage for our oxen that were dying for want of food, even though we offered him double price.

As he was leading his wagon along the hard road we had the infinite satisfaction to see it capsize, and all the cat-hay, many hundreds of bundles, strewed upon the road and no one to

assist him. But there was another side of the story, which is faithfully recorded. He received very kindly treatment at the house of Mynheer De Wet, and also at Henrick Buyer's:-

Our kind entertainer would not only not receive any recompense for his trouble, or for various feeds of forage for the teams, but sent one of his servants as a guide, while his son drove our waggon for some distance (this is a great mark of respect), though he was one of the wealthiest farmers in this part of the Colony.

### Pretorious At Ninety.

It is interesting to find how the names with which we were destined to become familiar fifty years later figure in these pages. De Wet, Du Toit, Pretorious. Pretorious called on the author.

This old man is upwards of ninety years of age, and still enjoys good health and strength: he has 13 children and 130 grandchildren. He fornerly served in the Dutch service when the Cape of Good Hope was tak-

en by the English in 1795. That young Dolman had abundance of courage, if no great discretion, is proved by an incident concerning arge snake.

### An Encounter With A Snake.

I quickly dismounted, but before that I had he thrust his head and body into a hole, leaving only a small portion of his tail visible. I stamped ugon him with my boot, but, not wishing to injure the skin, I caught him by the tail, and, by dint of pulling and hauling, at last got him out.

Immediately he raised his body in the air, and blew out his neck as large as a cocoa-nut, but before he could do any mischief I lent him a thwack on the head that stunned him. After a few more blows I tied a small piece of rope round his neck and carried him home, a distance of eight miles. The snake proved to be a cob-

The fact of the matter is that although great political and social changes have taken place in England, this is still a country of masculine domination, albeit the women received the vote during the war. What the women must overcome is the traditional prejudice which men have agains feminine competition in the

various callings of life. Sir Neville Macready, former head of the London police force, thinks that London alone might usefully employ 200 women police constables, whereas at the present time there are only 110 women on the police force of the whole country.

Although women who are carrying on the fight over here to win recognition for women of all the rights which men enjoy, hail the police commission's report as a victory, they realise that much ancient prejudice must be overcome before the English 'coppette' can enter into the fullness of jobs which were so long the exclusive property of the sterner sex.

### New Form of Twilight Sleep

NEW YORK, Oct. 80-(By Canadian Press)-A new and safer form of twilight sleep" is being used at the Lying-In-Hospital under the direction of Dr. James T. Gwathmey, it was learned recently at the convention of the Eastern Society of Anaesthetics, at the Hotel McAlpine,

Within the last few months, 1,000 bables have been brought into the world without pain to the mother, and without the danger of pelsoning the child, which was the cause of the 'blue bables" under the first method using "twilight sleep."

Dr. Gwathmey's discovery consists the use of scopolamin and morine in a solution of Epsom salts. he Epsom salts make it possible to btain the same degree of immunity rom pain with one-fourth to onesixth the quantity of scopolamin, hus reducing the danger of toxic efects on the child. The treatment is mpleted with ether and oil.

In "twilight sleep" the doctors used copolamin and morphine in a large number of repeated doses, which was harmful to the child. By the use of one-sixth the quantity of scopolamin, Dr. Gwathmey finds the psychic relief and the freedom from pain as complete as it was before, while danger to life virtually is eliminated. The use of the term "twilight sleep" is frowned on by the inventor of the new system, as it conjures up pictures of "blue bables.

Dr. H. H. Johnson, of Hampton, Ia., reported somewhat similar method, in which he has been successful in approximately 1,000 cases. He uses copolamin, with the addition of oneeightieth of a grain of strychnia, five minutes before the baby is born, hereby reducing the chance of a 'blue baby." He amused the convention by reporting that, when he gave larger doses of strychnia, the babies were so frisky that they were hard to

Dr. R. E. House, of Ferris, Tex., an authority on "truth serum," described his experiments with inmates of prisons, who were reduced by scopolamin to a state in which only their memories functioned. While in this state, they were asked questions, which, in the absence of a conscious will power, they answered out of their fund of pure memory, and truthfully, Dr. House expressed a belief that ruth serum would be part of the equipment of every court and prison of the future, especially for the nemories of amnesia victims. He prophesied that in the next war every spy would be treated to a dose of the



WEATHER THAT MAKES YOU WELL.

Have you noticed how the weather affects your health? Doctors are realizing more and nore that change of weather cause changes in the human body. They say that sunshine and rain, cold and heat. are important factors in our health. The study of the relations between health and weather has become a new science, which is called "climatology." Another discovery made by "clinatologists" is that sunshine has a wonderful healing effect in such diseases as tuberculosis and rickets. The direct ray of the sun on our odies form a treatment which is

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### Historical Records About Harbor Grace

ONE HUNDRED YEARS AGO. (H. F. SHORTIS.) Article IV.

From the old records in my posession I shall endeavor to give the principal firms in Harbor Grace, Carponear and Brigus, the most of which sarried on important business, trading direct with European and foreign markets generally, on their own acount, possibly in a more personal and intimate manner than the most of he St. John's merchants do at this

When Thomas Ridley started as a oung man in the trade of our coun-, he was employed as supercargo, oking after the fish as it was loaded the vessels, and he often went to oreign markets on the sailing vesels, when he became proficient in the exact requirements of the different places, and in this way he formed an ntimate acquaintance with the principal merchants in Portugal, Spain and Italy, which enabled him to find ready sale for his fish at the best prices, and with his desire to please, repeated orders came quickly, as they could depend on getting suitable quality, which meant satisfaction to all concerned.

You will have seen from these reords that it was quite a common ocurrence for vessels to clear from rigus and Cupids for Oporto and Spain, and I shall give records later of the manifests of these cargoes or the West Indies and the United States, which cannot but help to how how trade has changed, and St. ohn's is now practically doing the whole of the business carried on formerly by the outports. There were nerchants in Adam's Cove and Lower sland Cove shipping their fish to oreign countries.







It was not until 1899 that the Murray Seam was discovered by the late Geologist, Mr. Howley. 'The St.. George's Coal Fields posses many more seams of coal than those from which samples are exhibited, but time and other matters did not permit of a full dis-
