**THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES**  
The Emperors Separate.  
**Accident at the Hoosac Tunnel.**  
Berlin, Sept. 11—midnight—The Emperor Francis Joseph left Berlin at eight o'clock to-night; he was accompanied to the Railway Station by the Emperor William, Prince Frederick William and many officers of the army and court; he repeatedly embraced the German Emperor and the Crown Prince before stepping from the platform to the car.  
Little Rock, Ark., Sept. 11.—Williams, Deputy Sheriff, who was shot some time since, is not yet dead as reported. It is stated that, thinking he was dying, he made a confession in which he says the killing of Hall and Tucker by the Sheriff's posse was planned at headquarters.  
Springfield, Mass., Sept. 11.—Two men were killed at the west end of the Hoosac Tunnel this morning by the premature discharge of a blast.

**The Search for Livingstone.**  
John Livingstone's Confidence in Stanley's Statements.  
(From the New York Herald.)  
The below-given letter and enclosures, from Acting Secretary of State Hale, have been received at the office of the New York Herald. It will be recalled that Mr. John Livingstone stated to the Herald correspondent, who had called on him at his house in Canada, that he had taken the course indicated in the Acting Secretary of State's letter before he had any idea that the Herald attaches would visit him:  
ACTING SECRETARY OF STATE HALE TO JAS. GORDON BENNETT, DEPARTMENT OF STATE, WASHINGTON, Sept. 7, 1872.  
James Gordon Bennett, Esq., New York:  
Sir: I enclose for your information copies of a despatch this day received from Mr. Freeman N. Blake, Consul of the United States at Hamilton, Canada, and of a letter addressed to him by Mr. John Livingstone, which accompanies the despatch.  
An original letter (David Livingstone to John Livingstone) also accompanies the despatch, and is held by the Department subject to Mr. John Livingstone's expressed intention to ask its return.

MR. JOHN LIVINGSTONE TO UNITED STATES CONSUL BUREAU, LISTWELL, August 24, 1872.  
F. N. Blake, Esq., United States Consul, Hamilton, Ontario:  
Dear Sir: Would you kindly oblige me by conveying in your official capacity to Mr. Bennett, proprietor of the New York Herald, and also to Mr. Stanley, the leader of the "Herald's Livingstone Search Expedition," my warmest congratulations on the successful issue of that expedition.  
I have noticed a number of articles in the public press reflecting doubts on the veracity of Mr. Stanley and the Herald. I am glad to be able to say that I place most implicit confidence in Mr. Stanley and the Herald.  
I can only assure you that Dr. Livingstone holds the American Government and people in the highest estimation, principally on account of the late abolition of slavery in the United States, and I trust that his persistent efforts to check the nefarious traffic in slaves in Africa will be crowned with success.

**SALE OF LEICESTER SHEEP.**—Mr. W. Whitelaw, Guelph Township, has sold a very superior Imported Leicester Ram, one Ram Lamb and three Ewe Lambs to Mr. Thomas Nichol and another farmer, of Blenheim.

**FARM SOLD.**—Mr. Henry Hatch this (Thursday) morning sold the farm belonging to Mr. Israel Lush, of Eramosa, to Mr. W. C. Wilcocks, of Toronto Township, for \$4,500. The farm consisted of 90 acres. Mr. Wilcocks is a man of considerable means, and will be quite an acquisition to the township.

**Y. M. C. A.**—The regular meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association will be held in their rooms, Day's Block, this evening. Mr. W. T. Jones will give an essay "Past, Present and Future." It is to be hoped there will be a good attendance, especially of the members. The library will be open as usual for giving and receiving books.

### Local and Other Items.

**Rev. Mr. Ebb, formerly pastor of the Congregational Church at Ottawa, has received and accepted a call to become permanent pastor of the Congregational Church, Galt, Ontario, Wisconsin.**

**The Galt Reformer** wants to know now that the grading on the Railway from Galt to Doon is finished, why the Grand Trunk Company does not proceed with the track laying. There is a hitch somewhere.

**The base ball match** between the Clippers of Iion, N. Y., and the Silver Stars, of Port Hope, on the 11th inst., resulted in favor of the Clippers. The score was 57 to 8. Time, two hours and twenty minutes.

**A French capitalist** has opened an establishment for the preparation of sardines, at River Ouelle, P. Q. The little fish are equal to the best of France, and large orders have been received from Quebec and Montreal.

**REAL ESTATE** is gradually rising in Toronto, particularly in the western and north-western parts. Building operations continue very brisk, and the number of new buildings erected this season has been unusually large.

**In chess circles** there is a good deal of talk just now of a congress of Canadian chess players to be held during the Provincial Fair week at Hamilton. Such a meeting would probably be attended by a representative from all the leading clubs in the Dominion.

**THE GALT REFORMER** announces the death of Mrs. John Smith, formerly Mrs. Givan, in Scotland. She lived in the Township of Dumfries some years ago. She has bequeathed to Knox College, Toronto, the sum of one thousand dollars, and the same amount to the Edinburgh Infirmary.

**CATTLE AND HOGS** have the full run of the streets in Belleville. At about three o'clock on summer mornings some thirty or forty head of cattle parade the principal thoroughfares, making more hideous with their bellowing. As they only cease about nine at night, six hours in summer is the utmost limit of anything like tranquil repose which is granted. The fathers of the corporation do nothing to stop the performance of the Belleville Horn Band.

**DURHAM IN ILLINOIS.**—There was a sale of Durhams recently in Illinois, belonging to Mr. Cyrus Jones, Towanda, which was well attended and the bidding spirited. Forty-two cows and heifers were disposed of at an average of \$418.45; and the bulls and bull-calves at an average of \$251.34, making a total of fifty-eight head, and realizing \$21,094. Some of the cows reached as high as \$1,150, \$1,025, \$1,010 and \$1,000; and the highest price bull was \$530.

**THE ENGLISH CRICKETERS.**—The match at London was finished on Wednesday. The second innings of the twenty-two was finished at half-past 12; for a total of 65. The Eleven won the match by 130 runs. The St. George's New York Club have picked their twenty-two men to play the English Eleven, who will leave Canada on the 17th, and play in New York on the 18th and 19th.

### Political Items.

**The Galt Reporter** frantically asks, "Who struck Billy Patterson?"—Write to Hinks and he'll tell you all about it, and the result.

**A Dutchman on Mr. Charlton's side,** during the election in North Norfolk, owed a note to a leading gent on the other side, which was to be given up and twenty-five dollars with it, on condition of his voting for Mr. Walsh, but "Hans," after getting the cash played sharp, and bought three votes with \$15 for Charlton, and pocketed the remaining ten for his own benefit, and, worse than all, spoiled his own vote for Walsh.

**When it was first announced** that Sir John A. had been appointed a Privy Councillor, the organs added with an air of authority that Sir John would be entitled to one thousand pounds sterling a year while he lived for services in the capacity named, but now it is stated that there is no salary whatever attached to the appointment.

**The Mail** says that "twenty-five thousand bogus votes were recorded in the Province of Ontario alone." The Mail ought to be good authority on the "bogus vote" question, as we presume the precise number polled for the "union and prog" party has been returned to his head quarters at the Mail office. The Mail ought now to enlighten the "great unwashed" as to just what each bogus vote polled for "prog" cost. We pause for a reply.

**It is very amusing says the Kingston Whig,** to read the comments of the Ministerial press upon the election of Sir Francis Hinks by a British Columbia constituency. Instead of acknowledging what every sane man in the Dominion well knows—that he was elected by the British Columbians simply because he could not secure a seat in Ontario, the Tory journals try to cover up his retreat by stage nonsense about the death of sectionalism. There is only one authorized version of the story, and that is the Heaven-born Minister was repelled by this province, where he was best known, and found refuge owing to his official position, in a province where he never put foot, which is strongly alive to the benefit of having a friend at Court.

### At It Again.

**Sir John A.'s organs** are great on "howling." First they set up a howl because they supposed Mr. Mackenzie did not intend to resign his position as Treasurer of the Local Government, and would thus refuse to give them an opportunity of defeating him in his election for the House of Commons! Then, after he has been elected to the House of Commons by a majority of over 600, they howl because he did resign, and because he is still discharging the duties of Treasurer without a seat in the Local House—forgetting all the time that "ze little Frenchman," who was defeated in Montreal by a majority of over 1,200, is still Minister of Militia, and that he is without a seat in the Ottawa House! Surely the rule they apply to Mr. Mackenzie in Ontario ought to be applicable with equal force to Sir George E. Cartier in Quebec. But like all great sinners they neglect to take the beam out of their own eye before attempting to remove the mote from the eye of their neighbor. We venture to predict that Mr. Mackenzie's successor to the Treasury of Ontario will be appointed and elected to a seat in the Local long before Sir George Cartier resigns or gets a seat in the Commons; and meanwhile, until Sir John can complete his little arrangements in Quebec and patch up his dilapidated Cabinet, it might be just as well for the organs to cease their "howling" about the Treasurer of Ontario.—Dundas Banner.

### NEWS ITEMS.

**They allude to bald-headed men in Colorado** as "persons with their heads above the timber line."

**Immense lace collars,** such as our grandmothers used to wear, are coming into fashion once more.

**It is gratifying to know** that among the pensions granted by the English Government this year is one to Mrs. Wood, widow of the late William Wood, inventor of the process of weaving carpets by machinery.

**SHARES** are making use of the Suez Canal for improper purposes. They find a short cut through it from the Indian sea to the Adriatic, where there is said to be good feeding, especially off Lissa.

**At a fashionable wedding in London** last week, an old custom was revived, and copies of a "protholomion" printed on white satin—the production of a well-known poet—were handed round to the guests.

**Some parties,** described as "First Ward Politicians" of New York, have been detected in a new mode of smuggling cigars from Havana. The cigars were done up in rubber bags ready to be thrown overboard as the vessel approached port. In this case, however, the custom officials came on board sooner than expected and detected the game.

**COAL FOR SOUTH AMERICA.**—Messrs. Birl, Perkins & Jobb, of Boston, agents of the General Mining Association, have succeeded in opening a new market for Pictou Coal at Montevideo and Buenos Ayres. They sent samples out there some months ago which gave satisfaction. The late rise in the price of English coal, which hitherto monopolized the South American market, has led to the sending of several large orders to Pictou. The barques Margaret S. Wier, Peter O'Connell, and Helen Marion have been chartered to take two cargoes from the Albany mines to Montevideo and Buenos Ayres at the rate of \$9 per ton. This is doubtless the commencement of a large trade which will be of great benefit to the coal and shipping interests of Nova Scotia.

**PERE HYACINTHE'S WIFE.**—Mrs. Emile J. Meriman, who has married Pere Hyacinthe in London, will be remembered by many persons in New York and Brooklyn as one who has led a very eventful life. She was separated from her husband some years before his death, sold a small house and couple of lots in Brooklyn, which he had decided to her, and went with her daughter to travel abroad, acting as agent for a "patent" corset, and endeavoring to act as correspondent to papers, in which last she was not successful. Mrs. Meriman was converted to Romanism while on this trip. After her husband's death she returned to this city in order to obtain the money for an insurance upon his life, which he had presented to her during their early married life, and which she had kept paid up while abroad. While here she became reconciled to Protestantism under the ministrations of the Rev. Joseph Thompson, of the church of the Tabernacle; but finally left New York and went back to Paris, where Pere Hyacinthe converted her back again to Romanism, and was converted by her to matrimony.

**Australian exchanges** bring information respecting the growth of population in Victoria and New South Wales, as shown by the census returns for 1871. The latter province has progressed in this respect far more rapidly than the former. In 1861 the population of New South Wales was 350,860; in 1871 it amounted to 503,981. During the same decade the population of Victoria increased from 140,000 to 751,528, the rate per cent in the latter case being about 13 less than in the former.

**The Parliamentary return** compiled from particulars furnished from the county and borough prisons of England & Wales, show that in the year 1870 expenses amounting to £4,220 were incurred for the maintenance of prisoners for debts not exceeding 40s. The total amount of debts was but £7,673.

### The Meeting of the Emperors.

**Prince Bismarck to-day** received from the corporation the honorary citizenship of Berlin. In his reply to the Mayor he said the meeting of the Emperors strengthened confidence in peace, which was almost as absolute as peace itself. He wished history would now remain at a standstill for a while.

**The Emperor of Austria** has conferred the cross of the Order of St. Stephen of Hungary on Prince Bismarck. Prince Gorischehoff, Gen. Manteuffel and Count Andriass have been decorated with the order of the Black Eagle by the Emperor of Germany, and with the order of St. Andrew by the Emperor of Russia. The Emperor William has made the Emperor of Austria Honorary Colonel of Schleswig Holstein regiment of Hussars, and the sons of the Prince Imperial of Germany have been appointed to Colonelcies in the Russian army.

**The meeting of the Emperors** is drawing to a close. His Majesty of Austria paid a farewell visit to-day to the Czar at the Russian Embassy.

**The Emperors of Austria and Russia** to-day gave audience to Countlet Biron, the French Minister to Berlin. Their reception of the ambassador was friendly and satisfactory, and assurances were given him as to the object of the imperial visits to Germany.

**Latest from Manitoba.**  
FORT GARRY, Sept. 11.  
The nomination day is on Saturday, Sept. 14th, the elections takes place all over the Province on the same day, the 19th of September.  
At a meeting a few days since a hot discussion between Attorney-General Clarke and Riel ending in Clarke's challenging Riel to fight a duel.  
Carriage is to be nominated for Provencal. The Bishop and clergy are in favor of Carlier.  
There is no opposition yet out against Smith for Selkirk.  
Commissioner Simpson is back from paying the Indians at Lake Manitoba, their annuities. They are well satisfied with the Treaty.  
An Ottawa exchange, in complaining of the dearth of household servants in that city, says it is something distressing to house-keepers at least. Wages are offered from \$4 to \$8 per month. In one street of private residences, no less than nine families are without domestic help.

This list shows that the Association has succeeded in enlisting the services of prominent men from the chief Protestant churches, and no doubt the proceedings of the Convention will be both interesting and instructive. Last week no less than three large three masted vessels were lying at one time discharging grain and loading salt, besides a number of smaller vessels. Large quantities of salt are being shipped daily, in bulk, principally to Chicago. The Elevator is kept busy and things in general wear a brisk appearance.

Mr. J. B. Thornton Not Dead.

We are very much gratified by the receipt of a letter from Mr. J. B. Thornton, in which he, of course, gives a flat contradiction to the report of his sudden death in Detroit. He writes from Chicago that he is alive and well, and says he is doing well, and is travelling agent for the well-known wholesale booksellers and stationers, Jansen, McClurg & Co., of Chicago. Mr. Thornton first learned of his reported death a few days ago, on his arrival in Chicago from the far west, where he had been travelling, and took the first opportunity of writing and contradicting the report, which came to us through what we considered a well authenticated source. We congratulate Mr. Thornton's friends and relations that it has turned out to be false, and trust that this contradiction will be as widely circulated as the report of his death.

Visit of the Governor-General.

The Globe states that Lord Dufferin will visit Ontario in the course of a week or so. It is expected he will be present at the Provincial Exhibition, and it is understood that he would be well pleased if suitable arrangements could be made for him to remain some weeks in or about Toronto, during which time he might have an opportunity of becoming personally acquainted with the people of this important section of the Dominion, and with our industries and resources. We trust that such arrangements will be made, and we are sure that wherever Lord Dufferin goes he will receive a hearty welcome. We would suggest that the Directors of our Central Exhibition should send him an invitation to visit Guelph some day during the week of our great Show.

Monck Nomination.

The nomination of candidates to represent the County of Monck in the Ontario Legislature took place on Wednesday at Welland. Dr. Haney Messrs McKellar, Lee, Edgar, Rykert and a number of others received nominations. The meeting was overwhelmingly in favor of Dr. Haney, the Reform candidate, who is an able man, highly esteemed throughout the division, and is sure of election. His opponent, Mr. Lee, though personally respected, is an old man, utterly incompetent to fulfill the duties of a legislator. Mr. McCallum, late member for the County in both the Dominion and Ontario Legislatures, and now without either seat, was prominently troublesome. During the speeches of Mr. McKellar and Mr. Edgar, he was constantly interrupting, and all the efforts made by his "coach," Mr. Rykert, did not avail to keep him quiet. The latter gentleman, himself needing some correction, his ejaculations during Mr. McKellar's remarks being more numerous than elegant. He several times blurted out the word "liar," and once varied it by the epithet "ass!"

Stringency in the Money Market.

The stringency which has lately prevailed in the money market, has been a fruitful source of embarrassment to merchants and business men generally throughout the country. Many have been the conjectures as to the true cause of this unfavorable state of affairs, and serious apprehensions have begun to be felt that this stringency, if it continued much longer, would seriously affect the Fall Trade, if it did not result in disaster to some of the weaker houses. It is well known that the banks have been raising their rates, narrowing down their line of discounts, and resisting the demand for these where in many cases they were freely granted before. The Montreal Witness, in a carefully written article, professes to give the reasons why the banks are pursuing this policy. After explaining the connection between the banks and the Government, and pointing out that our currency is only available for home circulation and valueless outside, it goes on to show how the banks have for some time past been holding a much larger amount in Government notes than they are required to do by law. They held nearly 80 per cent. of the issue in gold, and about 32 per cent. in Government notes. "When, however," the Witness says, "they sought to realize for a portion of this reserve what would be available in payment of their customers' purchases abroad, they found they were met by a counter movement to restrain this exchange. The Government, fearing their gold would be brought to an awkward minimum, sought to checkmate the banks by withdrawing their funds on deposit, and large sums, un-

precedented in Canadian banking, were called for without notice. It is a matter which will, no doubt, be discussed by the banking administrators, in view of this possibility, it will be prudent to utilize the deposits of the Government for the extension of accommodation; and it will certainly re-open the discussion as to the desirability of having our main currency based upon another currency which it is felt necessary to protect from the operation of redemption, when the holder requires gold for the necessities of his business, by withdrawing it from circulation, so as to disturb the ordinary routine of commercial finance.

But another and stronger reason for the banks pursuing their present policy, is in the fact that the discounts to traders have during the last two years swelled to an enormous extent. In order to show this, our contemporary gives the official banking returns for two years from which we find that in these two years the traders in the country have had an increase of bank accommodation of forty million dollars, and that since July, 1869—only three years ago—their discounts have increased fifty-three million dollars, or over one hundred per cent. This is the sequel of the excessive importations for the past two years, and of the general tendency to trade beyond capital and to the utmost verge of credit. The present check to trade may, therefore, if not carried too far by the over-cautiousness of the banks, have a most salutary effect in opening the eyes of our financiers and traders to the risk run by such an inflation of credit as has lately marked our monetary transactions. The country is at present in the full career of prosperity, but in the midst of it we are too apt to overleap the limits dictated by prudence, and rush heedlessly on, unmindful of consequences till the crisis inevitably comes, and along with it disaster and too often financial ruin.

PROPOSED NEW COUNTY.—Notice is given in the Ontario Gazette that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, for an Act to erect the municipalities of Orangeville, East Garafraxa, Luther and Amaranth, from the County of Wellington, Melancthon from the County of Grey, and Mulmur and Mono from the County of Simcoe, into a new county for Municipal and Judicial purposes, with Orangeville as its county town; and also for an act to incorporate the village of Orangeville as a town.

ROWDYISM IN CHICAGO.—There is great excitement about the lawlessness of roughs in Chicago, and a call is out signed by the most prominent business men for a mass meeting to consider means to preserve the security of life and property. A ruffian named Rafferty, found guilty of murder, was sentenced to be hanged on Wednesday.

**The Corporation of the County of Wellington.**

**BY-LAW No. -**

A By-Law to provide for the Erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, the Repair of the Registry Office in Guelph, and to assist in making certain Roads and Bridges in the said County, and for issuing Debentures to the amount of \$20,000 for these purposes.

WHEREAS it is necessary to provide for the erection of a Registry Office for the North Riding of the County of Wellington, which Riding has been set apart for Registration purposes, and it is also necessary to provide for the repair and improvement of the County Registry Office in the Town of Guelph; and whereas it is expedient to grant aid by way of a grant of money, payable as hereinafter mentioned, to the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph hereinafter mentioned towards opening and making the new Roads and Bridges hereinafter mentioned in the several Townships and Villages and the Town of Guelph in the said County hereinafter mentioned, and to grant the sums hereinafter mentioned to assist in making and maintaining the Township County Lines hereinafter mentioned; the Council of the Corporation of the County of Wellington deeming the County at large sufficiently interested in the said works to justify such assistance, but not sufficiently interested to justify the Council in at once assuming the same as County Works, namely:

To the Township of Maryborough towards making the road known as the centre side road in that Township. .... \$600

To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the north-western road in that Township. .... 800

To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making the road between the third and fourth concessions in that Township. .... 200

To the Township of Pilkington towards making a bridge across the Grand River at the fifth and sixth concessions. .... 400

To the Township of Minto towards making the road known as the Minto and Normandy town line \$800, on condition that the County of Grey grant an equal amount. .... 800

To the Township of Luther towards making bridges over rivers and streams crossing the road known as the side road between lots thirty and thirty-one in that Township. .... 600

The Village of Elora towards making the road in that village connecting the County roads. .... 200

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road known as the extension of the Fergus and Douglas County Road to Waldemar Railway Station. .... 500

To the Township of Arthur towards making the road known as the Centre side road in that Township. .... 800

To the Township of West Garafraxa towards making a bridge over the Grand River on the road between the second and third concessions of that Township. .... 500

To the Village of Mount Forest towards making the road known as the town line east of Main street, and the bridge over the river Mainland. .... 800

To the Town of Guelph towards making a bridge over the river Speed, on Wellington street, by Mr. Gow's mill in Guelph town. .... 500

To the Village of Orangeville towards making a bridge over the river Credit in that village. .... 200

To the Township of Erin towards making the road from Brisbane to the town line at Guelph. .... 400

To the Village of Arthur towards making a road between the village of Arthur, township of Arthur and Luther, to Arthur railway station. .... 200

To the Township of Peel towards making the road known as the centre side road in Peel from Ar- ... 1000

To the Township of Amaranth towards making the road known as the seventh concession line in that Township. .... 1000

To the Township of Eramosa towards making the road in that Township from Rockwood to the town line at Guelph. .... 200

To the Township of Maryborough towards making a bridge over the Spring Creek on the road known as the Kilgore's road in that Township. .... 400

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the road between the fourth and fifth concessions of that Township. .... 500

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of Amaranth and Luther and East Garafraxa. .... 400

To the Township of Arthur towards making the town line road between the townships of Peel, Maryborough and Arthur. .... 300

To the Township of East Garafraxa towards making the town line road between the townships of East Garafraxa and Erin. .... 200

To the Township of Peel towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough from Drayton to Drayton station. .... 100

To the Township of Maryborough towards making the townline road between the townships of Peel and Maryborough at the hill at the fourteenth concession. .... 100

To the Township of Luther towards making the townline road between the townships of Arthur and Luther. .... 400

And whereas it is necessary to rebuild the bridges at Arthur: at the Four Mile Creek and across the Irvine River on the road assumed by and belonging to the said County, known as the Guelph and Mount Forest Road, and the sum of four thousand, two hundred dollars is required to rebuild the said bridges.

And whereas for the purposes aforesaid it is necessary to create a debt of twenty thousand dollars to be raised in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas it will require the sum of three thousand and nineteen dollars to be raised annually by special rate for the payment of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars and interest.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said County of Wellington, irrespective of any future increase of the same, and irrespective of any interest in or income from the said office, and the said County Roads and Bridges, and also irrespective of any interest to arise from any temporary investments of the sinking fund hereinafter mentioned, or any part thereof, was according to the last revised and equalized assessment rolls of the said County of Wellington \$13,896,296.

And whereas for paying the interest and creating an annual sinking fund for the payment of the principal of the said sum of twenty thousand dollars it will require an equal annual special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar to be levied in addition to all other taxes.

And whereas the amount of the existing debt of the Corporation of the County of Wellington is for principal the sum of \$99,649.00, and for interest the sum of \$90,680.32.

And whereas there is no interest in arrear.

And whereas the Corporation of the County of Wellington hath not in the municipal year contracted any debts of loans over and above the sum required for its ordinary expenditure which, including the said sum of twenty thousand dollars, exceed twenty thousand dollars. And whereas a copy of this By-Law hath been duly published according to law, Therefore the Corporation of the County of Wellington, in pursuance of the powers in it in that behalf vested, and by the Council thereof enacts as follows: That the Warden of the said County for the time being, be, and he is hereby authorized, empowered, and required for the purposes aforesaid, to issue in due form of law the sum of twenty thousand dollars in debentures of the said Corporation of the said County in sums of not less than one hundred dollars each, payable in twelve years at farthest from the day on which this By-Law is appointed to take effect, at the office of the Treasurer of the said County, and that every such debenture shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date of its issue, payable half yearly at the said office, and shall be signed by the Warden, and countersigned by the Treasurer for the time being of the said County, and shall have attached thereto coupons for the payment of said interest, which debentures the Warden is hereby authorized to negotiate and dispose of.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of said debentures, and interest, an equal special rate of one-fourth of a mill in the dollar in addition to all other rates be raised, levied, and collected in each year upon all rateable property in the said County during the continuance of the said debentures.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, the proceeds of the said debentures shall be applied and apportioned to the several purposes hereinafter mentioned, and in the amounts and proportion aforesaid, the grants of the said local municipalities to be paid to the Treasurers thereof respectively, to be applied by them strictly to the purposes aforesaid, and an account of such application to be returned by each Reeve to the Council of the said County, at the next December Session of this Council.

No person lending money upon or purchasing said Debentures shall be bound to see to the application of the proceeds thereof.

AND BE IT ENACTED that, this By-Law shall take effect upon, from and after the first day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two.

The above is a true copy of a proposed By-Law to be taken into consideration by the Municipality of the County of Wellington, at the Court House, in the Town of Guelph, in the said County, on the first day of October, 1872, at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon, at which time and place the members of the Council are hereby required to attend for the purpose aforesaid.
