At the Court of Revision in Amaranth, Judge Macdonald spoke in severe terms of the careless manner in which assessors are in the habit of doing their work. Very often they do not go to see the property which they assers, and content themselves by entering a name without taking any means of ascertaining whether it is cornect or not. His Honor said that it was the duty of the assessor to leave a schedule at the house for the owner of the property to fill up. Then if any mistalis was made as to the name, it would be easy to find out who was to blame Under the present system, the assessor could only say that some one had told him the name—perhups a little girl in the nouse, or some neighbor. The new law will have a good effect in this particular, as the assessor is made responsible for errors, and is liable for all expenses incurred in the court of appeal. If the Assessor of Amaranth was made to pay all the costs in cases where he has erred, we are afraid his salary would go but a short way in liquidating the debt. As this is the first year that the new act has come into operation it would not be fair to enforce it with great strictness. In future, however, the assessors will have no such excuse, and they must expect to be dealt with according to the strict letter of the law.—Orangeville Advertiser.
