





Part of the crew were made prisoners and part were drowned. On the ships which participated in the night attack one officer was seriously, and five others slightly, wounded, but two sailors were killed and eighteen wounded. At 9 o'clock fourteen of the enemy's ships assembled before Port Arthur, and a bombardment was begun with the heavy guns of their battleship squadron at long range. This lasted until 1 o'clock in the afternoon. It is estimated that they fired 154 twelve-inch shells. The damage to our vessels was insignificant and they are again ready for battle. Our losses were: One officer slightly wounded and one soldier killed and four soldiers wounded. The illumination of the sea by night by the searchlights was most satisfactory, and several times isolated shots from the batteries forced the enemy's torpedo boats to retire. With the commencement of the bombardment at dawn the guns of the fortress replied to the enemy's fire. The crews of all the ships engaged gave proof of remarkable coolness in action. Below decks the work of the day followed its ordinary course in spite of the shells falling between the vessels and covering them with fragments. Within the last few year Dr. Andrew White, of Cornell university, the Ambassador of the United States in Berlin, published in two volumes his work entitled, "The Conduct of Science and Theology." These books mark stages in a great controversy; they serve as measures of the change which has occurred in man's thoughts of recent years. Dr. Draper's book was polemical; it was an maxted by a spirit resolutely hostile to faith, and, as might be expected, it displayed a very limited grasp of religious history and principles. Practically it took no cognizance of Christianity in its wider and deeper aspects. To Dr. Draper as to Haeckel, the only representative of Christianity was the Roman church. All other phases of Christian faith were practically left out of sight. This vitiated the whole of Dr. Draper's work; if was just neither to science nor to religion; an account of internal administration of the Russian Empire would give us very little idea of European political institutions: a criticism. religion; an account of internal administration of the Russian Empire would give us very little idea of European political institutions; a criticism upon the Buddhism of Thinet would supply a very inadequate idea of the true principles of Buddhism. Parallel was the miscake made by Dr. Draper when he estimated the relationship of Christianity to science by reference to one part of Christendom only. But besides this unfair limitation in treatment, the spirit of the book lacked that calminess and impartiality which justice no less than accience demands. In this, however, Dr. Draper, was not alone; he represented to a large extent the spirit and temper of his time. Scientific feeling at the moment was somewhat resentful, and it inoke in a spirit any acceptable.

It made the same mistake which the church had made in earlier times when she thought that she could destroy pairciples by burning co-called hereitical books. But principles are not so easily destroyed. The destruction of a book whether by material fire or by fire of criticism will never destroy any principle which has a grain of truth in it.


