DRUMCRAIG'S HULL. Submerged Wreck Seen Off Farallones Which May Be Lost Victoria Ship.


Which May Be Lost Victoria Ship. A San Francisco despatch says Capt. Reese of the British ship Morven, re-ported that on March 9, while seventy-five miles southwest of the Farallones, he saw what he states was a submerged wreck. Marine men say that it possi-bly was the hull of the missing Drum-craig. In its present position the wreck is a menace to navigation. The Drumcraig of this port sailed from the Columbia river last September for Manila. Capt.
