Fighting Unionism.
Columbus, O, July 15.—A special from the Hocking valley mining district states that the operators who went in with the Italian laborers yesterday as yet had no trouble with the strikers. Soon after Pinkerton's detectives went on duty the miners telegraphed the governor, asking him to order out the state troops to protect attiens from the "Chicago sharpsheoters," or compel them to lay down their arms. The governor replied that he could not order out the troops until there had been some boisterous demonstrations, which he hoped oisterous demonstrations, which he hoped could be averted. The miners have taken legal advice, with the hope of having the detectives disarmed. Investigation now going on has demonstrated that one merchant has robbed the government, through collusion with government employes, of over \$190,000.

A Chance For Trinity. The idea of Trinity college and univer sity falling in with the provincial univer sity is gaining ground. It some such scheme is adopted, there is a certainity of Trinity filling an important part in our educational system, of her becoming a power in the land, of her taking a due share in moulding the policy and tone of

the national university.

The upholders of Trinity are beginning to see more and more every day that she teaching of literature and science while ity as if she saddled herself with the expense of maintaining an arts faculty. supporters are beginning to see that if Trinity college was in the park a large and well tained, and in connection with it a first class college residence for anglican students be provided, where all the social and other advantages that the residents in college are supposed to get, would be gained by those who came within its walls. If Trinity were affiliated with the provincial university and her graduates made graduates of the provincial univer ity, as would be the case, the anglican church would then have a voice both direct and indirect in the regulation of the provincial university and University college, and in general in the whole educational system of the country. 
