Army Officers Riding between the Capital  
of the two countries to make a

BERLIN, Oct. 3.-The long distance ride

miles, in 35 hours. But two have dropped  
out.

Toronto Debentures Have Bought More  
Than They Were Wanted Here of  
Bonds in London.

"How did you find the financial aspect  
on the London market?" queried the  
reporter.  
"It was very dull, ship building is  
bad and so is the cotton market. In fact,  
depression is everywhere apparent.  
Money is plentiful and accumulating, but  
no one seems to have the heart to take  
up anything new."

"What do you conceive to be the cause?"  
"They cannot get over the six or  
eight months' depression like those  
of the South American securities."  
"I gave some little help. The fact is,  
the strong people who are  
carrying them have simply got to wait until  
there is an improvement, either to sell them  
or to invest in anything else."

"You assisted, did you not, in placing  
the Toronto bonds on the London market?"  
"How is that a better price than was  
obtained?" ventured the newsmen.  
"The fact is, there are too many  
bonds on the market that it is  
impossible to place fresh bonds  
at too high a price. The fact is,  
Toronto has been getting too high a  
price for her bonds during the last two or  
three years. The fact is, the people  
who were working, buyers being unable  
afterwards to sell them at the figure they  
had given for them. Anyhow, I do not think  
there has been a sale of £2000 worth of  
Toronto bonds on the London market for  
some time."
