NOTABLE EVENTS OF 1887.

A retrospective glance over some of the occurrences that have made 1887 notable, will be interesting to our readers.

On the 4th, a collision between a limited express and a regular train on the Baltimore and Ohio road took place and thirteen persons were killed.

On the 9th the famous Alcazar palace at Toledo, Spain, which had recently been restored at a cost of \$1,000,000, was totally destroyed by fire.

The U. S. Congress passed the Pension bill this month, appropriating nearly \$70,000,000 for this purpose.

The Quebec government was appointed by Mr. Mezieris, the premier. Dominion Parliament was dissolved on the 18th.

The restoration bill was passed in the U. S. Congress. British Parliament opened on the 27th. Fighting took place at Masowah between Italian and Abyssinians on the 25th and 26th.

On the 22nd, news was received that a Chinese steamer had sunk and one hundred persons were drowned.

London advised that, by the sinking of the British ship Kapunda, 280 emigrants lost their lives.

The Fishery Commission commenced its labors. 7000 miles of Chinese territory reported flooded and millions of people homeless.

The year has been a peaceful one as a whole, but with the exception of a few minor wars, there has been no warfare.

The Irish question continues to absorb the major part of England's attention. A satisfactory settlement is apparently far distant as ever.

Russia and Austria have been in a continual state of tension. The inter-provincial conference took place at London on the 18th and 19th.

The great event in the political world this month was the election of the President and Vice-President.

Thirty persons were killed and one hundred injured on the Boston and Providence Railroad by the train going through a bridge between Rosindale and Forest Hills.

A mine explosion at St. Etienne, France, killed 144 lives and destroyed a large amount of property.

A fire in the Richmond hotel, Buffalo, killed ten persons and destroyed the hotel.

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Borneo, by the wreck of a French steamer, 11 persons were killed by a railway accident in Indiana. A great fire in Hsiao-tow, China, destroyed 2000 lives and 2,000,000 taels worth of property.

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OUR NEW POWER.

A great deal of curiosity has been felt among a large number of the friends and townspeople regarding a new motor power which we purchased as soon as our mains were laid.
