Food for Sick Children.

In dangerous illness, when the hospital nurse has control of the sick room, a well ordered routine is quickly established, but in less serious cases, where trained help is not sought, and during convalescence, a few practical hints on the home nursing of children may be offered.

To begin with, food or medicine should never be prepared or dispensed before the little patient, nor should the doctor's opinion or the child's symptoms be talked over. Children often catch hold of phrases and misunderstand what is said.

Persons and so form terrifying anticipations of their illness and its treatment. As drinks are sure to be in constant demand, weak innocuous ones generally given, but children often prefer pure water. It is best to use a small glass, and only give the exact quantity allowed.

Children, as a rule, are more often guided by their eyes than by their palate, and many prevail strongly in the young. Even in health very imaginary dislikes are taken which an alteration in appearance, or even in name, will remove.

High flavoured dishes are seldom liked by children, and are quite unwholesome for them, but a pretty appearance will make simple, nourishing forms of diet inviting.

The portion of custard or milk pudding which is most attractive if sent from the nursery table consists of a little of each in a tiny dish, and the food of helping oneself will possibly lead to a joyful supply being consumed.

The bread and butter which is most liked at tea time, made into thin sandwiches, then cut into narrow fingers and built up crosswise on the child's plate, lead to the interest to demolish the pyramid to help to return it, but a glance at the clean-cut, angular hand-writing induced him to read it.
