City Solicitor Johnston reported to the board of works yesterday that as the Toronto Railway Co. had failed to build that line on Danforth which they had been requested to do, the city could now build there. The board of works passed the recommendation that the line be built, and it was sent on to the council. A bylaw will be submitted to the ratepayers on Jan. 1 if the council passes it. When the tube system is built, and the Bloor-street viaduct is finished, it is altogether likely that an extension of the tube will be made easterly

INCREASING STORAGE FACILI-TIES FOR CANADIAN WHEAT.

TIES FOR CANADIAN WHEAT. In order to meet the big demand which is being caused by the increase in the grain output of the west, the Canadian Northern Rallwax Company will shortly increase the storage plant to their elevators at Port Arthur. The Canadian Northern elevators at Port Arthur are the largest in the world and have a total storage capac-ity of 7,000,000 bushels. They consist of an original structure and two an-nexes. The receiving capacity of forty cars, shipping capacity .120 cars and cleaning capacity fifteen cars per hour. Each house has eighty circular tanks and sixty-three intermediate spaces, and the grain storage construction is of fireproof tile. The Canadian Northern Rallway han-died, in 1910, thirty-two per cent, of western Canada's crop. This shows a twelve per cent increase in five years, as compared with 1905, when the com-pany only handled twenty per cent. This year the Canadian Northern ex-pects to handle forty per cent. of the yield. Last year the Grand Trunk Pacific handled about seven per cent. and the Canadian Pacific sizty-one per cent.

and the Canadidat Facilite sixty-ones, per cent. In Manitoba there is an elevator ca-pacity of 22,000,000 bushels, an increase of 772,000 bushels over the year 1003. The number of elevators erected in Saskatchewan in 1910 was 219, while the storage capacity was increased from 17,924,500 to 24,279,000 bushels. In Alberta, the elevator capacity has al-most doubled; it being at present 8. 050,400 bushels, as against 4,092,400 bushels in 1908. In the western proy-inces, west of Winnipeg, there are ap-proximately 1,763 elevators in active operation, with a storage capacity of 54,234,900 bushels, an increase of 11,-197,500 bushels.

OTTAWA, Nov 3.-A number of enumerators, who were engaged in taking the census in this city have re-ceived sheets from the census depart-ment asking that corrections be made and omissions filed in. The letter, which was signed by Dr. Margaret Gordon, strongly recommended that the gov-ernment should consider the question an grant the women their rights. It read as follows: "Sir,-Having observed, with deep regret, that your election address, containing the announcement of the platform and of the policy of the party of which you are the leader, does not refer to any proposed extension of the parliamentary franchise to the women of this province, tho' a number of re-solutions and petitions as well as two large deputations, asking for such a measure, have been received by you during your present parliamentary term of office, we respectfully beg to urge again that such a measure may be included in the program of the Conservative party, should it be re-turned to power by the electorate of this province."

Rowell, under date of Nov. 1, is also addressed by the association, asking for the entranchisement of women. With the exception of a brief re-view of history of male suffrage, the letter read as follows: "At last night's meeting of the Re-form Association of Ontario, the ques-tion of woman suffrage was brought forward as a possible plank in the Liberal platform, but was met (or dis-missed?) with the well-worn argu-ment that "it was sufficient time to take action when the women them-selves asked for it." "But it is not true that the women of this province have not asked for

"But it is not true that the women of this province have not asked for the franchise. The National Council of Women carried a resolution claim-ing the franchise for women at their annual meeting of last year. The Women's Christian Temperance Union a few days ago at their Dominion convention passed a unanimous re-solution to the same effect. There are several woman franchise organ-izations in this province which have repeatedly sent petitions and deputa-tions on the same behalf. Petitions and resolutions in support of Mr. S.udho me's Bill (which was read a second time in March of last year), came from all parts of Ont arlo, show-ing that a large number of women not only want the vote, but even ask for it.
