MARTINIQUE IS DOOMED SAY FLEEING RESIDENTS

Most Recent Eruption of Mont Pelee Ten Times as Violent as Former Ones.

Fort de France, Island of Martinique, May 21.—Yesterday's eruption from Mont Pelee was violent in the extreme. It was ten times as violent as any previous eruption of this volcano, which destroyed St. Pierre. Columns of volcanic matter were ejected from the volcano, which rained down on the ruins of St. Pierre and the country near it, from an enormous elevation and with fearful velocity. The volcanic clouds advanced until they reached Fort de France. The rays of the rising sun lighted them until the clouds looked like molten metal suspended in the air and rolling over the city.

An Appalling Spectacle.

The spectacle was appalling and sublime beyond description. The whole population of Fort de France was thrown into a frenzy of panic, during which soldiers, police, men and women, all terrified, frantic, weeping and praying, rushed through the streets, while overhead the glowing, fiery clouds rolled relentlessly, and rained down stones, still hot, amid the swirling ashes. The steam launch of the United States cruiser Cincinnati took some refugees to the French cruiser Souchet, and nearly a hundred persons sought refuge on the Cincinnati and on the United States special steamer Potomac.

Child Three Days Old.

Lieut. McCormick took on board the Potomac 15 refugees, the oldest of whom was 72 years of age, and the youngest three days old. The lieutenant brought the party to Fort de France.

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STRUCK WITH BAR OF IRON.

Windsor 3 Men Reading Room Senses 1000,000

Windsor, May 21.—A mauler, struck Arthur Watkins, colored, over the right temple with a heavy bar of iron at the Malleable Iron Works, Walkerville, this morning. Watkins fell unconscious, and Barclay fled. Watkins was taken into the office of the works and Dr. Story summoned. The doctor succeeded in reviving the patient. It is thought he will recover. Chief of Police Griffith located Barclay, who is employed at the Kerr Engine Works about 11 o'clock on one of the back streets.

The Car and President Loubet Visiting in Saying Nice Things.

Tarskoo-Sno, Russia, May 21.—The Car, President Loubet, the Czarina and the Dowager-Czarina attended a great review of troops to-day. His Majesty on horseback, and M. Loubet, the Czarina, the Dowager-Czarina and the Grand Duchess Sergius in a carriage, passed down the front of the troops, attended by brilliant eunuchs. The Imperial and Presidential cortege received an ovation from the large crowd of people which assembled to witness the military display.

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LINDSAY'S \$35,000 FIRE TEN FAMILIES HOMELESS

Mrs. Connolly's and Mr. Hamilton's Terraces Completely Gutted—Insurance Co.'s Affected.

Lindsay, May 21.—Lindsay suffered a heavy fire this afternoon, which is said to have originated from some workmen setting fires in the rear of Mr. Hamilton's terrace. Several barns and stables in the immediate vicinity quickly caught fire, which spread to Mrs. Connolly's and Mr. Hamilton's terraces, which were completely gutted. Fortunately, the wind was not high, else the loss would have been much greater, as the Presbyterian Church and several large terraces were in the direct line of the fire. Nine or ten families are homeless, with much of their effects ruined. Messrs. Sutcliffe & Sons, and R. B. Allan & Co. merchants dry goods store, suffered considerably from smoke and water.

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AGAINST DEERING BY-LAW.

Vote in Hamilton Fell 1000 Below Required Number.

Hamilton, May 21.—The city is not to have the Canadian branch of the Deering Harvester Company of Chicago, according to the votes cast by the taxpayers to-day. A by-law was submitted, granting the company a bonus of \$50,000 on certain conditions. Voting went on quietly all to-day, and 3858 votes were required to give assent to the by-law. The actual vote in favor fell more than 1000 below this, it being 2810, with 622 registered against the by-law. The Trades and Labor Council worked against the by-law, but the vote shows that passive indifference more than active opposition, had to do with the by-law's defeat.

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C.P.R. STOCK'S ACTIVITY BREAKING ALL RECORDS

Over Nine Thousand Shares Changed Hands Yesterday—An Opinion on the Cause.

The excitement on the local stock exchange over Canadian Pacific continued unabated to-day. The business broke yesterday's record, 9,055 shares, all having been bought by a army of traders. In the morning, before the opening, brokers' offices were crowded with people eagerly making enquiries as to what it would likely be at. On Tuesday it closed at 133 1/2, but before our market opened, London had been trading in it for several hours, 10 a.m. here being equal to 3 p.m. in London. It had risen there, and when our exchange opened it sold at 134 1/2. A good many people hurried to realize profits on the quick advance of 2 points over night, and the price receded to 134. Just before the close of the noon hour it sold at 133 1/2. At 2 p.m. under further large offerings it receded to 133 1/2. At that price it appeared that the profit takers had sold all their stock, and as the demand seemed to increase the price gradually advanced, first 133 1/2, then 133 1/2, 133, and soon after 134. There was great excitement on the floor of the exchange as the prices mounted up, and all day long the galleries were crowded with spectators.

URQUHART IS GETTING BETTER

Four of the Toronto Candidates Address Large Gatherings in Their Respective Territories.

URQUHART AND THE CORPORATIONS.

Proved to be a Supporter of Monopolies—He Promises to Make Revelations To-Day.

Why the electorate of West Toronto should rally to the support of Thomas Crawford, the Liberal-Conservative candidate, was explained by that gentleman and by a number of his admirers at a meeting in Euclid-avenue Hall last night.

Peter Whytock presided, and among others on the platform with him were ex-Ald. J. R. Starr, Ald. P. H. Woods, Ald. Dunn, J. F. Foy and Mr. Crawford, the candidate.

Ex-Ald. Starr criticized the policy of the Ross administration and commended Mr. Whytock and his followers on the course pursued by them.

Ald. Dunn said the ministers and the members of the government were so closely identified with the different monopolistic institutions of the Province that it was impossible for them to faithfully represent the people.

Mr. Crawford took for his first theme an editorial in The Globe, referring to his relationship with the corporations. The writer of the article, in his opinion must have had timber in his head when he penned it.

He has explained the connection with the ranch deal, and he did not intend repeating it. Those who heard him were thoroughly satisfied that he was not interested in the enterprise.

It was just like The Globe and Mr. Ross to insinuate nothing further should be said about the matter, since they were stating what was not true.

The statement of Mr. Ross, on any question were seldom in accord with facts, and if his words were taken literally, they would be found to convey a meaning that they should not.

Continuing, Mr. Crawford dealt with the statement of Ald. Urquhart, alleging that he applied to the Grand Trunk Railway for an extension of a pass to visit Chicago, in connection with the Dakota ranch business.

That statement was misleading, every person in West Toronto knew that he was the friend of the people, as against the monopolies of corporations.

In spite of the fact that Mr. Urquhart was furnished with communication by that railway company, with a view of defeating him (the speaker), he denied being unduly friendly to the corporation.

He proved himself a supporter of monopolies by his course, and would, therefore, have no objection to the questions on May 23. This was a fight of the people against the machine.

Liberalism through the ages has been a sufficient and true indication that they themselves believed it was time for a change in the administration of our affairs.

In conclusion he said there were some suspicious characters around, and some movements on the part of some who were not electors in Toronto, which indicated that an attempt was being made to carry on crooked work, and if he behaved them as honest citizens he would be suffering the consequences.

J. F. Foy then entered the hall and was welcomed with hearty applause. Mr. Foy in an admirable speech discussed the action of the city members in dealing with the municipal legislation.

stating that Mr. Crawford and his associates forced the government to accept amendments offered by them to certain bills proposed at the instance of solicitors of corporations.

Napier followed with a vigorous attack upon the government.

URQUHART AT BROCKTON HALL.

At 8.30 last night Chairman J. W. Mallon pointed out to the two score electors who had spread themselves around Brockton Hall to do honor to the Liberal cause that these long days make the crowd turn up late.

W. J. Reid supported Ald. Urquhart from a labor man's standpoint. He had watched his record in Council and was well satisfied.

G. G. S. Lindsey, K.C., defended the government against the charges of the opposition. He challenged the Conservatives to put their finger on any sum of money that had been misappropriated by the government during their thirty years' tenure of office.

Mr. Urquhart personally, but would not stand in the name of the rest of the hypocrites. He was cried down, and when he interrupted the speaker, he was severely rebuked.

Ald. J. Graham briefly testified to the good qualities of his colleague and spoke the praises of the Ross government.

The opposition's financial criticisms, he said, were confined to petty items, and Mr. Crawford shared his rebukes therefor.

Concerning the Dakota ranch, he said he had sent a stenographer to get a verbatim report of Mr. Crawford's defence last Friday night.

Mr. Urquhart's chief point was that Mr. Urquhart had opposed every measure of the government looking to opening up New Ontario. He also said Mr. Urquhart had done nothing for East Toronto of the province at large while he was in the legislature.

MR. NESBITT AT AYRE'S HALL. Dr. Beattie Nesbitt invaded the northeastern portion of the riding he is contesting, and in Ayre's Hall last night prosecuted his campaign with characteristic vigor.
