# CLAIMS DIPLOMATIC VICTORY.

Berlin Officially Rejoices Over Settlement of Morocco Affair.

Berlin, July 10.—The agreement between France and Germany on the subject of Morocco, which will be made public in both Paris and Berlin to-day, cannot but be regarded here as a diploamatic victory of the first importance over both Great Britain and France, altho it is expressed in terms of great moderation, the agreement being referred to as "an accord based on full appreciation and recognition of each government's rights and aims."

Yet, officially, the issue is regarded as a triumph for Emperor William and Prince Von Buelow that will strengthen Germany's diplomacy everywhere on the continent. The attitude of the American government towards the Moioccan controversy was altogether satisfactory to Germany.


