THE HIGHEST EXPENSIVE MAKE SCHOOL BOYS SHOTS

Sir Frederick Borden Announces Intention of Consulting With Provinces to Have Rifle Shooting Added to the School Curriculum.

Rather Important Day in the House—Changes Foreshadowed in Future Times of Session Which Include a New Fiscal Year.

Ottawa, July 10.—(Special).—The government has evidently come to the opinion that sessions stretching away into the dog days are not to be countenanced in the future. The avidity with which the prime minister swallowed the suggestion that hereafter parliament should meet in November and get over by April, shows that the inevitable sessions, lasting from mid-winter to midsummer, are not in the highest cabinet favor. Mr. Borden admitted that he recognized the fact of such an arrangement necessitating the closing of the financial year on June 30. Sir Wilfrid promptly admitted the reasonableness of the suggestion of Mr. Borden and said that such an arrangement had been in the mind of the finance minister for some time. It is, therefore, probable that the next session of parliament will be held in November next, but the following session will be in November of the same year. Incidentally, 60-day, the prime minister referred to the remaining balance of the present session. He alluded to certain other resolutions which were expected to be put thru. Although very explicit, Sir Wilfrid's remarks are highly construed to point to an increase in industry for members.

Head a First Time.
R. L. Borden's bill to amend the act respecting the house of commons was read a first time. It provides that, upon a vacancy occurring after a certain period, the speaker of the house of commons shall issue the writ for the election and appoint a returning officer to whom all writs shall be addressed. This will prevent a government from appointing a returning officer to its own convenience by calling on the minister of justice.

Bandits Seize Banker.
Santiago de Cuba, July 10.—Julian Cendosa, a wealthy American banker and agent of the Ward Line, while dining with his family last night at his home across the bay, was attacked by eight bandits, who covered the members of the family with firearms and searched the house.

TO PROTEST TO-DAY.
House of Commons Will Take Up Acacia Incident.
Ottawa, July 10.—No protest has yet been made over the action of Customs Officer Bump of Rochester refusing to grant clearance papers to the Acacia, a steamer which is being chartered by the United Fruit Company.

Army is Unfit, People to Blame "Bobs" Warns Empire of Danger

Tells House of Lords, as Practical Soldier, That Military is "Totally Unfit to Uphold Britain as First-Class Power."

London, July 10.—Field Marshal Lord Roberts created a sensation in the house of lords this evening when in a lengthy and well considered speech he deliberately expressed his opinion as a practical soldier that the military force of Great Britain was inadequate, imperfectly trained and totally unfit to uphold Great Britain as a first-class power. Lord Roberts did not blame the government, which, he said, was actuated by a national feeling, but he scathingly attacked the people of England, who, he said, showed no national feeling towards the military until danger arose.

THE SPEECH WAS DELIVERED IN CONNECTION WITH A MOTION INTRODUCED BY THE EARL OF WEMYSS AND MARCH (CONSERVATIVE), TRAVELING PREMIER BALFOUR'S STATEMENT REGARDING THE IMPOSSIBILITY OF THE INVASION OF GREAT BRITAIN AND THE NECESSITY OF KEEPING UP A SUFFICIENT LAND FORCE TO REPEL ANY POSSIBLE INVASION.

Lord Roberts said the lessons of the South African war had been forgotten, and that the armed forces of Great Britain were now as unprepared for war as when the South African trouble broke out. He declared emphatically that the choice lay between conscription or some practical system of universal training, and that only by such means would it be possible for Great Britain to possess forces organized and trained to meet the demands of the empire in the event of war.

LIFE OR DEATH OF EMPIRE.
His lordship said that any discussion of the necessity of keeping up a sufficient land force to repel any possible invasion. The country had to deal with a question of infinitely great importance—the question of the life or death of the empire, the issue of which depends upon Great Britain being ready to defend her overseas possessions and at the same time take part in any affair nearer home, either of which necessitated the placing in the field of an army as large and efficient as that of any European country, all of which might be regarded as nations in arms. Lord Roberts appealed to the country to awake to its danger and to take steps to meet the demands of the empire in the event of war.

The militia department officials agreed to resign their offices if Col. Worthington were elected.

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NO OPPOSITION TO GRANT; CONDITIONS ONLY STICKLER

Bylaw Gets to Third Stage in City Council, But is There Checked and a Special Meeting Will Be Called.

The need for a new city hospital was so thoroughly impressed upon the minds of the members of the city council that during all the hours of discussion yesterday afternoon and last night there was not one word of protest raised against the grant. There was a sentiment, a small one, in favor of submitting the bylaw to the people, and a sentiment, one that was almost strong enough to make a tie vote, in favor of such a string being attached to the grant as would be provided in the condition that the city have a representative upon the hospital board.

The final vote on the several divisions, as given below, summarizes the result of a session that lasted from 8 to 4, and from 8 to 11.

The question opened with the appearance of deputations for and against. A Ratsnester Viewpoint. Dr. E. J. The city's gross debentures amounted to \$25,000,000 already, he argued in defence of his plea that the bylaw be submitted to the people. He voted from the good sense shown in the judgment of the council.

DISCUSS GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP.
Detroit, July 10.—In his annual address delivered at the convention of the National Longshoremen, Marine and Transport Workers' Association, which opened here to-day, President D. J. Keef characterized the Chinese exclusion law as a farce in so far as the protection of American labor is concerned. President Keef suggested that the government acquire the control of the life insurance business.

BORUSSIAN COAL MINE ON FIRE AND CAVEING IN—250 ESCAPE, BUT REMAINDER ARE LOST.
Dortmund, Prussia, July 11.—A fire has broken out in the Borussia coal mine, caused by the careless handling of a lamp by boys. The lamp exploded, igniting the timbers of the shaft, which burned rapidly. Two hundred and fifty miners escaped through an air shaft, but 39 were cut off and their death is regarded as certain.
