





"The note which Mr. Mayes gave me was on account of professional services, for which he owed me a large sum in connection with several mat-ters in which I had been his legal advisor, including the matter of getting the dredge in without duty, and also on account of the suit of Mayes v. Connelly, and also Mayes' suit against the government in connection with the

office." It seems, according to advertise

ments, that the reason Mayes was unable to secure the contract on the first call for renders was because of the original stipulation that the dredge registered in Canada. The second call omitted this.
