

Want Housebuilding Department of City Council and Combines Probe.

Platitudes, extended discussion and reattudes, extended discussion and topian ideals well sustained by vote featured last night's session of the Central Council of Ratepayers, held at the city hall under the chairmanship of George Shields, who wielded judgment with an impartial hand. J. M. Skelton's report upon the housing problem, or rather that of the committee of which he is chairman, dealt at some length with details touching. at some length with details, touching upon the need of individual independence of the Canadian citizen, who should not accept government-built homes, but should build his own. The report emphasized the need first of all of investigating the machinations of combines and finally dealing a deathblow to their prestige. The resolutions of the report summarized were as follows: Ask city council to assist in the organization of a homebu''ding department; 2. Get the Toronto housing commission to show the effect of combines upon the problem; 3. Have Commissioner Bradshaw and Commissioner Chisholm instructed to present a report upon the situation in Toronto, the housing commission to defer building until the report is submitted; 4. Government to disbourage municipalities from spending public moneys on homes until the combines have been investigated.

PRESENT FIGURES **ON IMMIGRATION**

Total 57,702 for Fiscal Year -Total From States a Decrease.

Ottawa, March 3 .- (By Canadian Press.)—A total of 57,702 immigrants to Canada during the last fiscal year is reported in the annual report of the department of immigration and colon-ization, tabled in the house of commons today. Of these, 40,715 came from the United States, 9,914 from the United Kingdom, and 7,073 from other European countries. This compares with immigration in the preceding year of 71,314 from the United States, 3,178 from the United Kingdom, and 4,583 from continental countries. The decrease in immigration from the United States is, therefore, 43 per

cent, over that of the preceding year.
The immigration of unaccompanied British children is expected to be re-sumed this year, after being suspendchief merit. 



DIVORCE LAWS LACK UNIFORMITY

Bar Association President Shows Need for General Legislation.

The Ontario Bar Association opened their fourteenth annual meeting yesterday afternoon at Osgoode Hall. For a first day meeting there was a fairly good muster of members. A big variety of subjects from a legal standpoint were brought forward and will be fully discussed today. Divorce, the Ontario compensation board, the bankruptcy act, solicitors' costs, judges' salaries, privy council appeal court, county court judges and their work, crown attorneys, and police magistrates, were but a few of the numerous subjects touched upon.

During the meeting a point came to light which shows that even learned lawyers can make a slip. To bring the constitution of the association up to date it has become necessary to amend or alter some of the rules. The original framers of the constitution failed to frame a clause by which this could be done according to the constitution. But as lawyers are lawyers some of them will easily find a way out of the difficulty.
