MONTREAL PROTESTANT ORPHAN ASYLUM.

SEVENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the Ladies of the Protestant Orphan Asylum was held at the Institution, 93 Cote des Neiges Road, on Wednesday, the 10th of Jauuary, 1900, the Rev. J. Edgar Hill, M.A., B.D., presiding, when the following Annual Report was submitted and adopted:—

Again, it becomes our duty as well as pleasure, to present to the subscribers and friends of the Montreal Protestant Orphan Asylum a record of what has been accomplished during the past year, the Seventy-eighth, in its history.

To those already familiar with this Institution and the place it fills among Montreal's numerous and varied charities, a brief reference to its work may not be devoid of interest, but an opportunity is also afforded us of bringing its claims for support to the notice of those who are strangers to its usefulness and requirements.

The past year has been marked by no special feature; the work has gone on quietly from day to day, sometimes amid trials and discouragement, for the care and education of children under the most favourable circumstances, is always attended with a great deal of anxiety and responsibility, yet we acknowledge with gratitude that, under the Divine blessing, we have been the recipients of an unusual amount of prosperity, and, in a spirit of thankfulness, we look forward to a bright New Year.

In January, 1899, there were 50 children in the Home; since then eighteen (18) have been admitted, nine boys and nine girls, making a total of sixty-eight (68) who have benefited by the Institution during the year. Nine have left; some being returned to relatives while others have been placed in situations. It is satisfactory to be able to state that all the children placed out in the last few years, under the new system, are doing well and receiving wages.

The past has been a record year as regards the number of children benefiting by the Home, viz., sixty-eight. From the Annual Reports as far back as 1860, we gather that in the majority of years the number ranged between thirty and forty, while in 1889 and two following years it fell among the twenties. Larger premises and an increased number of children, naturally entail extra expenditure, and we can but repeat what we have said at former meetings, that we earnestly hope those who have contributed for the first time this year, will remember us in future and place this Institution on the list of charities to which they annually subscribe.

After nearly eleven years freedom from any serious infectious disease, scarlet fever broke out in the early spring, and ten cases developed within 48 hours. The Civic Hospital being in a very unsatisfactory condition, the patients, by order of our Medical Adviser, Dr. Finley, were immediately removed to the upper flat of the Home, which was originally designed for an Infirmary and fitted with special arrangements for such an emergency. Two trained nurses were put in charge of the sick children, a strict quarantine established, and everything done to prevent the spread of the disease. The situation was further complicated by two cases of measles which appeared at the same time. These, however, were successfully isolated, and contagion from that source prevented. A few weeks later, two more cases of scarlet fever developed and one other, some time after the Home had been thoroughly disinfected by the Health Officers. This last case, a boy of eleven, was nursed at the Civic Hospital, where he received every attention. We record with thankfulness, that with careful nursing, all these children, thirteen in number, made a good recovery, and are suffering from none of the after effects, so common in such cases. The Infirmary, with its special arrangements for the isolation of patients suffering from an infectious disease, proved as near perfection as possible, and elicited the praise of both physician and nurses.

All the children receive an elementary education, up to the age of twelve years, when less time is spent in the school-room, and more devoted to training for domestic service. Under the personal supervision of the Lady Superintendent the girls are instructed in cooking, household and laundry work. The boys also take their share of the housework, make their beds, clean boots and knives, shovel snow in winter, and work about the

grounds in summer. Lessons in carpentering have also been given to the older boys with considerable success. The lame boys, of whom we have four suffering from hip disease, have been taught chair caning and proved very apt pupils. Two of them can also knit mitts and stockings as well as mend their clothes very neatly. We are most anxious to find situations for these boys, as some or them are now old enough to leave the Asylum, but their infirmity will prevent their ever earning a liveliaood at any active work. Typewriting and telegraph operating would be within their capabilities, but lessons in these branches are more expensive than we can afford. Would any charitably disposed person consider this matter, and, if possible, assist the Managers in solving a serious difficulty which has confronted them for some time past?

We may mention that all the clothing required for this large family is made in the house, and includes boys' suits and heavy winter over-coats for both boys and girls. Each child on leaving the Asylum is supplied with a good outfit sufficient for his or her requirements for at least one year. This has been an established rule since the foundation of the Institution, and when several children leave in the same year makes quite a substantial addition to the amount expended on clothing.

Mrs. George Redpath's resignation from the Board of Management, after a membership of ten years, was received with much regret, also that of Mrs. Stancliffe, who is leaving Montreal to reside in England. The vacancies will be filled by Mrs. John Dunlop and Mrs. David Denne.

The Home continues in affiliation with the Local Branch of the National Council of Women, and one or more members of the Committee have attended their meetings during the year.

From the Treasurer's Report it will be seen that the total expenditure for the maintenance of the Institution has amounted to six thousand four hundred and sixty-eight dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$6,468.67). The expenses have been heavier than usual for many reasons. Among them, the greater number of children to provide for, eighteen admissions, requiring eighteen complete outfits of clothing, also extra beds, blankets, desks for the school-room, etc.; the outbreak of scarlet fever, which necessitated hiring trained nurses for the patients, an extra supply of coal to heat the Infirmary and the re-tinting and whitewashing

of the entire building after the epidemic was over. The girls' dormitory and the boys' playroom required new plastering and other repairs. Bad construction and defective work in the plumbing, when the Home was built, are responsible for the large item of expenditure in that department. Insurance for three years, amounting to nearly three hundred dollars has also been paid this year.

The condition of the land supporting the fence between the Asylum and the adjoining properties on Macgregor Street is still a source of trouble in spite of the expenditure of the large sum of \$65.00 last year for repairing it. The surface water continued damaging the bank, as we feared it would, and the playground was always damp, especially after heavy rain. Though aware that the law obliges the inferior land to take the surface water from the superior, we were sanguine enough to hope that the wealthy owners of the adjoining properties might possibly feel disposed to construct a small drain on their side of the fence, to carry off the water by way of the main road. This could easily have been accomplished at very little individual expense, and would have effectually relieved the Managers of an annoyance and of a serious menace to the children's health. Our hopes in this direction, however, were not realized, so we have been obliged to repair and turf the bank at considerable further expense.

There are two indentured children in the Province, for whose benefit the Treasurer has deposited, at interest, the sum of fifty four dollars and seventy-nine cents (\$54.79). She also holds in trust for eight orphans who have completed their Indentures, or had money left them, the further sum of one hundred and seventy-two dollars and one cent (\$172.01).

With pleasure we note the addition of four new names to our list of Life Members: Mrs. Henshaw, our First Directress, Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, Colonel Henshaw, and Mr. Hector Mackenzie, having each given the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00). A legacy of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) from the Executors of the estate of the late Miss Miller and a donation of sixty dollars (\$60.00) from Miss Catherine Wurtele have been added to the Endowment Fund and are gratefully acknowledged.

By the kindness of friends, the children, as in former years, have enjoyed several drives and pic-nics. Mrs. John Macdougall, Mrs. Henshaw, Col. Henshaw, and Mr. McCuaig contributed money for this purpose, and "Teas" of Ice-cream and Cake

were provided by Mrs. E. B. Greenshields, Mrs. A. W. Stevenson and Mrs. McCuaig. A two hours' ride in the Electric Cars on a summer's day was much enjoyed. Treats of this description are greatly appreciated by the children, and make bright spots in the routine of their daily life.

To Miss McGiverin, who will shortly enter upon her seventh year as Lady Superintendent, we owe even more than our customary tribute of praise. The year just closed has been to her one of exceptional care and responsibility; the has had charge of a larger number of children, and, in consequence, a larger establishment to supervise. The prevalence of scarlet fever entailed an enormous amount of additional work as well as anxiety, and we feel that it was mainly owing to her attention to details in establishing and carrying out a strict system of quarantine, that the disease was kept within bounds, no easy matter in a household comprising between sixty and seventy persons. Her watchful care and personal interest in the children has contributed largely to their health and happiness. It is a fact worthy of remark that during her six years tenancy of the position she holds, only one death has occurred, that of a young child, of spinal meningitis, who had been a sufferer, more or less, from the time he was admitted. Her business capacity and economical management in household matters has materially assisted the Ladies in carrying on the work of the Institution, and the benefit of her influence upon the whole establishment cannot be overestimated.

The Managers regret that Miss McInnes, who for three years has successfully and conscientiously taught the children, resigned her position as Governess in November, with the intention of entering a hospital in Baltimore to train for a nurse. Her successor will not be appointed till after the holidays.

The Ladies take this opportunity of thanking the Bishop of Montreal for his kindness in allowing them the use of a room in the Synod Hall on several occasions, when during the prevalence of scarlet fever, they were unable to hold business meetings at the Home. To the Dean and Clergy of St. George's Church we are also much indebted for their continued interest in our children, an interest which has extended over a long series of years. It being thought unadvisable for various reasons, for them to attend Sunday School at present, the Dean, with his usual kindness and consideration, arranged that the Rev. Mr. Johnson

should hold class at the Home on Sunday afternoon. The Rev. J. F. Renaud, who also takes a warm interest in the welfare of the children, gives them a Scripture lesson every week.
