



Sir:—In an article on cost of dredging in St. John in your issue of last evening, you ask the question "Why Mr. Mayes was given the second contract at 90 cents per yard," and feeling that perhaps your readers may infer that it was given to me without tender I beg to state:

As the city of St. John had asked the Dominion government, during the summer of 1906, to dredge Rodney slip 30 feet wider than the first contract called for, and also that dredging to permit the extension of No. 5 wharf 100 feet towards Union street, the government through their officers asked me for a tender which I gave, viz.: 90 cents per cubic yard. The reason why my tender was 90 cents against 55 cents for the former contract was in consequence of the tremendous difficulties encountered in digging
