

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



ANNUAL REPORT,

1855.

The Annual Meeting of this Society was held in the City Hall, on Wednesday, the 16th January. The President, G. W. Allan, Esq., presided. The Annual Report was read by Mr. J. D. Humphreys, as follows:

Your Committee, in presenting their Report for the past year, take the opportunity of expressing the great gratification they feel in being able to congratulate the Society on the very marked superiority of the Exhibitions of 1855 over those of 1854; the increased number and excellent quality of the articles shown exceeded all previous occasions, and fully proves that with energy and the harmonious working together on the part of those to whom the business of the Society may be intrusted, the Toronto Horticultural Society may, ere long, take its position and vie creditably with societies of much older date. The crowded state of the rooms on each occasion was a convincing proof, were any wanting, that the citizens generally take a warmer interest than ever in the prosperity of this society-calculated, as it undoubtedly is, to kindle and foster a taste for that which is in the power of all persons, however humble their means, to accomplish, viz: the cultivation of Fruits, Flowers, and Vegetables.

The May Exhibition was held in the St. Lawrence Hall—a decided improvement, as offering advantages the 1*

Society could scarcely obtain anywhere else; for that portion of the public whose avocations and engagements prevented their attendance in the day time, were thus enabled to enjoy the sight at a very trifling cost in the evening. This exhibition far excelled all previous ones held in that month, for your committee believe, (and they are not afraid of being charged with exaggeration in stating that belief), that there was at least double the number of articles sent in for competition, the quality also of which was such as to call forth general expressions of admiration; and they would beg leave to particularize some of its principal features, thinking that it may lead to the best results, as giving to amateurs of all classes some valuable hints regarding the choice of the finer kinds of plants, fruits, &c., now in successful cultivation among us.

The collection of Roses, of which there was a splendid display, embraced a great number of the best kinds known, and your committee would mention the following :-- "Hybrid Perpetuals," Baron Prevost, Madam Trudeaux, Pious IX., La Reine, Standard of Marengo, Sydonie, Duchess of Sutherland, Jacques Lafitte, Duchess de Praslin, Geant des Battailles, Rivers, Prince Albert, Madam Laffay, Marquis Bocella, General Brea and General Cavaignac. In Camellias, the Double White, Fimbriata, Eclipse, Imbricata, Conspicua, Chandler's Elegans, and several other fine varieties. In Shrubs, the Deutzia Gracilis, Spiræa Prunifolia and Lanceolata, and other fine kinds, Ribes Sanguineum, Wigelia Rosea, Double Chinese Crab, &c. In Stove and Greenhouse Plants, Adamia, Ardisia Crenulata, Armosa Rose, (a lovely plant), and Metrosideros Florabunda, or Bottle Brush, from Judge Harrison, an Azalea Variegata, a Dielytra Spectabilis, and also a very excellent collection, (in which were some splendid varieties of Tea and Bourbon Roses,) in most

excellent order, from Mrs. Bull. In Tulips there was a great display; as also in Calceolarias; whilst nothing could exceed the growth and beauty of the various bedding-out plants.

Your Committee beg also to make particular mention of the Vegetables, which were not only more numerous but of better growth than at any previous show in May; at the same time, however, they cannot avoid expressing their regret that this department was not more fully represented, considering its great importance.

The July Exhibition was also held in the St. Lawrence Hall, and fully sustained the reputation acquired for the Society by the opening Exhibition.

Your Committee, wishing to carry out the principles they have adopted in some of the foregoing remarks, beg to draw attention to several new and beautiful varieties of Green-house Plants, exhibited on that occasion, which are as yet comparatively new to the country, viz:

Gloxinias, Achimenes, Yucca Gloriosa, S.c. ; and in addition, from Judge Harrison, fine specimens of Æschynanthus, Vinca Alba, Tecoma Jasminoides, and Euphorbia The collection of Fuschias was a vast Splendens. improvement on those of former occasions; there were several new kinds introduced, all of which were of superior growth; and here your committee may remark, that generally there was a more successful attempt to show each plant to advantage; hitherto it has been too little thought of; a slovenly habit of sending plants, however, should never be recognized, and they would recommend the giving a prize (as it is done in England) for the most correctly named and best arranged plants, as a further inducement to exhibitors to give these essentials their best attention.

Your Committee cannot help again remarking upon the several collections of Roses, which, for the season of the year, could scarcely be excelled. It will be borne in mind that a special prize was offered by the President of the Society for the three best named collections, and although (as before remarked) the season was somewhat late for the display, they were considered worthy the occasion.

Your Committee would also beg to call attention to the superior collection of Strawberries exhibited on this occasion. They embraced some of the best varieties known as producing good crops in this climate. These were Hovey's Seedling, (a splendid dish of which was shown by Mr. F. W. Coate), Boston Pine, Burr's New Pine, McAvoy's Superior, Crimson Cone, Black Prince, Keene's Seedling, Alice Maud, Genesee and Large Early Scarlet. And in Cherries, although the season was rather early for display, the following may be selected as of first rate quality, viz :- Reine Hortense, Belle d'Orleans, Belle Magnifique, Napoleon Bigarreau, Early Purple Guigne, Elton, Yellow Spanish, Bauman's May, Black Tartarian, Black Eagle, May Duke; and the Currents worthy of note were, the White Grape, Red Grape, (a fine dish of which was exhibited by the Hon. Robert Baldwin), Victoria, Red Cherry, Red Russian, Prince Albert, Magnum Bonum and White Victoria, (excellent samples of which were sent by the Hon. Robert Baldwin and Mr. Bilton.)

The Vegetables, though excellent in quality, were scarcely so numerous as they ought to have been; considering, however, the few competitors there were, your committee cannot help awarding due praise to those who did compete.

The Fall Exhibition was (as the two previous ones) held in the St. Lawrence Hall, and was a most gratifying

There was an evident desire on the part of all concerned to render it in every respect worthy of its predecessors; and your committee are most happy to have it in their power to say, that the efforts made on the occasion were crowned with complete success. There was, as usual, a large collection of Greenhouse plants; the principal novelties, a Rosa Russellianus and Pentas Carnea, from Judge Harrison, a Hoya Bella, and a magnificent specimen of the Ficus Elasticus, or India Rubber Tree. There was also a fine collection of Scarlet Geraniums and Herbaceous Plants; and a very superior assortment of Annuals from Mr. J. M. Hirschfelder. The Native Plants shown at this, and indeed the several Exhibitions, more particularly the second, where Mr. Hope's special prize was contended for, far surpassed all former years ; there were upwards of one hundred varieties, all named, classified, and described-many well worthy of cultivation; and your committee cannot too strongly recommend that some inducement be held our for the encouragement of the study of Native Botany, and that, in addition, application be made at the ensuing session of the Legislature for an annual grant for the encouragement of Horticulture.

Your Committee now come to what may be considered a matter of even greater importance than anything yet enumerated. Canada at no distant period must become a great fruit-growing country, and they would urge the necessity of measures being taken to establish in connection with this Society a Pomological Society, some of whose chief objects should be to correct the names, select and describe the best varieties of Fruit suitable to the climate.

The splendid display of Apples presented at the Autumn Exhibition plainly shows that this valuable fruit is commanding an increased share of attention; nearly all the varieties worthy of cultivation have already been introduced, and on this occasion we observed fine specimens of the following, that could not well be surpassed either for size or flavour, namely:—Rhode Island Greening, Holland Pippin, Gravenstein, St. Lawrence, Ribston Pippin, Red Astrachan, Fall Pippin, Golden Russet, Yellow Bellflower, Roxbury Russet, Red Canada, Spitzenburg, Swaar, Sweet Bough, Northern Spy, Belmont, Nonsuch, Maiden's Blush, Newtown Pippin, Alexander, Hawthornden, Kentish Fill Basket, §c., §c.

In Pears also there was a very marked improvement; they may be considered next in importance to Apples, and no pains should be spared, and every means adopted, to improve their cultivation. Your committee were glad to notice fine specimens of the following varieties, viz:—Bartlett, Belle Lucrative, White and Grey Doyenne, Seckel, Stevens' Genesee, Beurre d'Aremburg, Beurre Deil, Swans Orange, Beurre d'Amalis, Napoleon, Doyenne Siealle, Louis bonne de Jersey, Flemish Beauty, Henry the Fourth, Duchess d'Angouleme, Glout Morceau, Brown Beurre, Buffam and Gansell's Bergamot. Some of these your Committee beg leave to state were the produce of dwarf trees planted in 1853, thus placing within the reach of all, however limited the "patch" they may own, the power of growing this most delicious fruit.

In Peaches there were but three samples. The one most worthy of notice was presented by Mrs. Proudfoot; this was grown under glass, and was not only large, but appeared to be a fine kind. Your Committee fear that the neighbourhood is not favorable for their production in the open air—although old residents state that in former years Peaches of good quality were produced quite abundantly. The one rs. Proudnot only Committee for their lents state were proof place here for your committee to recommend, that (with a view of making a commencement regarding a Pomological Society) papers be read during the next season, having for their object the diffusion of a more general knowledge of Horticultural matters, and particularly bearing upon the best culture as yet known of the three last-named fruits.

The Plums that were exhibited, and which your committee deem deserving of special notice, are the following, viz: Bolmar's Washington, Brevoort's Purple, Jefferson, Reine Claude de Bavay, Goliah, Greengage, Prince's Imperial, Huling's Superb, Imperial Gage, Lombard, Duane's Purple and Lawrence's Favorite. There was a large collection; and some fine specimens shown by the Rev. E. Baldwin, Mr. McCord, and Mrs. Coxwell.

In Grapes, under glass, there were but few shown; these, however, comprised some good specimens of the Black Hamburg, Golden Chasselas, Zinfindal and White Assyrian. There was one well-ripened dish of the White Sweet Water, grown in the open air, from the Rev. E. Baldwin. Thus Grape culture would almost appear as yet to be in its infancy; why it should be so, your Committee are at a loss to determine, for those who have given their attention to the culture of this exquisite fruit find the climate suited in every respect for producing abundant crops, both under glass and in the open air.

In Melons, we had but two new kinds; the one most worthy of mention was exhibited by Mr. E. C. Jones; the seed was imported from England.

The show of vegetables on this occasion fairly deserves, and should claim, more than a passing notice at your Committee's hands, did they not fear that their Report might be found already too long; the importance of the subject, however, must plead their excuse, and in justice they must at any rate advert to the magnificent display of Potatoes, grown by Mr. Goodenough—and to the Cauliflowers from Mr. Cheney, each of which was worthy of any exhibition.

On reviewing the past season, your Committee think they are justified in stating, that it has been eminently successful; and they cannot close this Report without gratefully acknowledging the many obligations they are under to their Secretary and Treasurer, Mr. Robert Beard, whose untiring energy on all occasions in the Society's behalf, is beyond all praise. Nor must they omit to state, in addition, that to his exertions, most ably seconded by the Assistant Secretary, Mr. J. Small, (who, your committee trust, will also accept their best thanks), a large portion of the funds was procured, thus enabling your Committee to bring the monetary affairs of the Society, as will be seen by the Treasurer's statement, to so successful a termination.

In conclusion, your committee feel that they cannot do better than copy the closing part of the well-written Report of last year, as embodying most closely their own sentiments in the matters referred to. It "urges upon the Society the necessity that still exists for more active and strenuous exertions on the part of all the members, whether professional or amateur; it recommends that steps be at once taken to increase the subscription list, by an early appeal to the public, by a committee appointed for that purpose; and that additional efforts should be made to induce as many competitors as possible to contribute articles for competition during the ensuing season ;" and moreover, almost spoke prophetically for the season of 1855, when it said: "A decided step in advance has been made during the past year, and your Committee are convinced that it only requires a little additional exertion to secure for
