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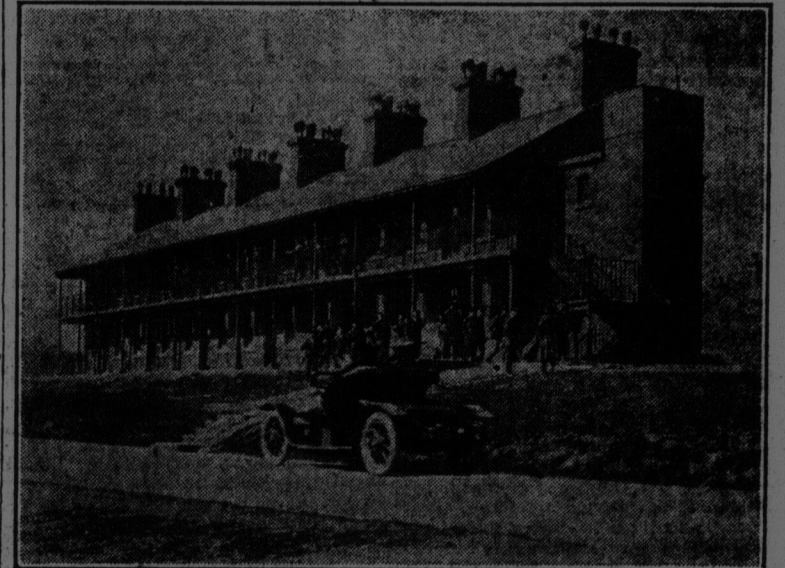

THE WAR NEWS

The disquieting report which came over the cables yesterday to the effect that German warships had bombarded Dunkirk turns out to have been incorrect. So far as any effective work on its part is concerned, the German navy, apart from the submarines, is still in hiding.

It is reported that German airmen dropped bombs in an effort to destroy the American steamer Cushing, which was en route to Rotterdam, flying the American flag and displaying her name in huge letters on her sides.

Word comes from Ottawa that two complete army divisions will be sent to training in this country, so that there will be no difficulty in sending forward reinforcements of properly trained men as they are needed to fill up the ranks of the Canadians at the front.

SPAIN ASPIRES TO SECURE GIBRALTAR

Paris, April 30.—Public men of Spain are now beginning to discuss the possibility of that country realizing its territorial aspirations in view of the probable reconstruction of Europe after the war.

Senator Ascarate, first vice president of the Spanish Chamber of Deputies, in an address which has aroused wide comment declared his country should take advantage of the present opportunity to complete the integrity of her territory by obtaining the cession of Gibraltar from England.

"I do not share the general enthusiasm for Tangier," he said. "Its possession would be a burden to us, but we could exchange Ceuta a seaport town in Morocco, seventeen miles southeast of Gibraltar for Gibraltar, and in that way England would continue to dominate the straits, the thorn of Gibraltar would be removed from our flesh and the bonds of friendship binding us to England would be made closer."

Meantime British factories go on. British ships sail the seas, British trade gains time to supplant German in the markets of the world.

WAR NEWS BY THE MORNING CABLES

Allied Fleets and Land Forces Busy at Dardanelles — Dunkirk Bombardment Was From Land Side—Zebrugge Attacked

London, April 30.—The allied fleet is now engaging the enemy's batteries along the Dardanelles, in addition to five different detachments of soldiers landed to dislodge the foe from their positions. Heavy fighting has occurred, but the Allied troops have behaved splendidly. The Turks have fought hard and the casualty list on both sides is lengthy.

It is reported that the American steamer Cushing, from Philadelphia for Rotterdam has been attacked by German submarines in the North Sea.

The Admiralty announced last evening that there was no truth in the report that the Germans were shelling Dunkirk from the sea coast. The shells which had fallen were from a land gun. Allied warships yesterday bombarded the coast batteries at Zebrugge, Belgium, where the Germans have their submarine base.

MacLaren's hospital; \$100 sent by the Women's Institute of the chapter; \$100 to the Belgian orphan fund; \$50 to the Allies' hospital behind the lines in France; and it was decided to send the \$25 sent in by the M. Club to Colonel Shillington to furnish linen for the New Brunswick ward in the hospital at Le Touquet, France. This amount will go forward with the \$100 sent by the Women's Institute of the chapter to provide two additional beds in the New Brunswick ward.

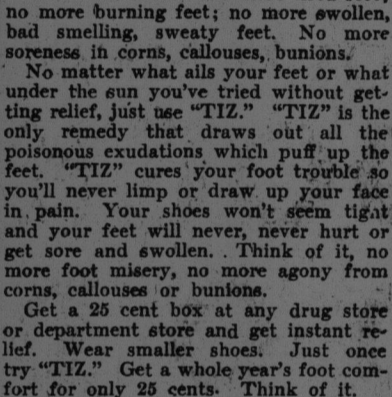

The Story of Some Good Skating Races

McCORMICK CHALLENGED

Speed Artists From the Narrows— A Visit From Frederick Curriers Disastrous as Both Local Clubs Defeated Them

On Wednesday evening January 20, 1886, the skating season was auspiciously ushered in by a race of much local interest. The race was held at the rink on the corner of the street and the judges, Col. J. R. Armstrong, and Captain George B. Seely, with the starter and timer, D. C. Clinch, and the distance judge, W. E. Wood, took their positions on the ice and called out the contestants. The race was run in four heats of one mile each. There were four starters in the first heat, Samuel Akerley, Craft, Estabrook and Rubins. The men got a good start and Rubins in front with Craft second and Akerley third. Estabrook fell before he had gone many feet and in the third lap was distanced. Rubins continued in the race until the twelfth lap, when he fell out. The race for the last two laps was quite exciting. Akerley won, time 8 m. 34 s.

Craft held the lead in the second heat until the twelfth lap when Akerley passed him and won in 8 m. 41 s. A foul was made in the thirteenth lap of the third heat and, although Akerley was in first, Craft was awarded the heat. As the former refused to race the last heat, Craft was sent over the course alone.

McCormick and Akerley

On Wednesday, Jan. 27 more than 2,000 people assembled in the rink for the races. The events were all well contested and in one or two instances created profound enthusiasm among the spectators. McCormick's first appearance on the ice that season, in his contest with Akerley, was greeted with prolonged applause.

McDade won the final in the boys' race, with Dingo second; distance two miles, time 7 m. 1 s. The race was a good one and was well contested.

Craft won the 3 mile amateur event in 10 m. 28 s. Gilbert was a close second. When McCormick and Akerley appeared on the ice they received a perfect ovation. It was not a challenge match, but was for a purse of \$200 offered by the directors. The distance was three miles. McCormick took the start and shot around the track for a few laps at a tremendous rate of speed, closely followed by Akerley. Although McCormick led for the entire race it was a good contest. Time: 1st mile, 8 m. 18 s.; 2nd mile, 9 m. 40 s.; 3rd mile, 9 m. 12 s.

The directors acted as judges and G. B. Seider and Charles Bell as timekeepers.

From the Narrows

On Friday, January 29, a challenge was sent to the Daily Telegraph, from a correspondent of the Narrows, Queen's County. It read as follows: "Sir, I would like to inform Mr. Hugh McCormick that before he should claim the title of champion of the world he should come here to the Narrows, at which place he would find skaters who would beat him from the start, as we have one who skated a mile, with favorable wind, in 1 minute and 45 seconds, and with no wind in 2:45 and we have reason to think that there are one or two others here who can skate equally as fast as the party referred to."

"We would therefore be pleased to accept Hugh McCormick's challenge whenever he can beat that record; we would also be pleased to be favored with his presence at the Narrows, trusting that he may give us a call, when he will find some ready and willing to skate him at any time. Hoping to see him here soon."

The Telegraph answered: "If 'skater's' record breaker will only come to St. John and skate a mile in 2:45 he will doubtless find no difficulty in making engagements at large prices for the remainder of the season."

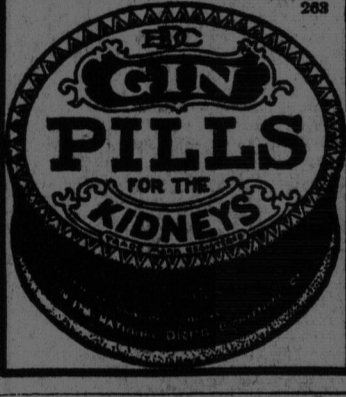

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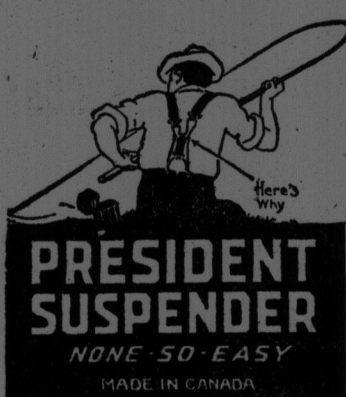
